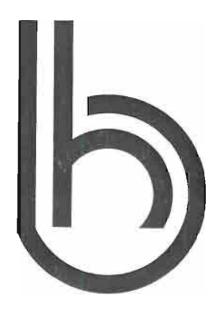

The Hospital Background

The foundation state for the original 42 bed hospital was laid on the existing site on 25th December, 1855. Ballarat at that time had a population of between 40 000 and 50,000 people, with the demands on hospital services being mainly for medical attention resulting from mining accidents. Medical, Nursing and General care were provided by a Resident Surgeon, Matron and Wardsmen. Financial support depended on donations from churches, masonic lodges, the public and bequests.

The hospital today provides centralized health services and specialist medical, surgical and ancillary assistance to the communities in the Central Highlands Region. The trend in hospital financing today has changed and is based to a large extet on State and Commonwealth Government Grants. Contributions from the public remain important particularly in the purchase of equipment and ultimately the services provided by the hospital.

Since 1887 the Ballarat Base Hospital has been an important training centre for nurses. In 1977 the hospital not only coters for general nursing and midwifery training, but also provides under graduate training for medical students.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

The Board of Management presents this Annual Report to Contributors and Life Governors covering activities for the year 1976-77.

Accreditation. During lost year, the Board submitted the Hospital to the scrutiny of occreditation. After a detailed examination which involved all departments and discussion with many staff, accreditation was granted on 14th July, 1976. Essentially accreditation consists of the measurement of activities and procedures conducted throughout the Hospital, against a set of standards. The survey for accreditation was carried out by the Australian Cauncil on Hospital Standards a Conjaint Body, sponsored by the Australian Hospital Association and the Australian Medical Association. The surveyors included experienced Hospital, Medical and Nursing Administrators. One of the intangible benefits to be goined from the survey was an enthusiastic, yet critical self evaluation of all activities, which has acted as a stimulation to the maintenance of high standards.

Medibank. Changes still continue to be mode to the Medibank Programme. During 1976, greater emphasis was placed on the cancept of private insurance with the introduction of compulsory payments for health benefits. Patients retaining the option of remaining with the Medibank arganisation, either as a levy payer, or as privately insured. It is now very clear that the involvement of the Commonwealth, directly in health care at State level through the joint Commonwealth cast sharing agreement, has led to an increasing involvement of Treasury Departments in the direct management of the health care system. Some concern exists that the necessity for cost control in these inflationary times will not be over-shadowed by the necessity to maintain high standards of health care.

Building Pragramme—

Medical Services Black. Following successful negatiations with the Haspitals & Charities Commission, Stage 2 of the Planned Development Programme, which includes the building to replace the existing Radiology and Pothalogy Departments was commenced. The Board let contracts totalling \$2,720,000 to the successful tenderer, Bruni and Bisagni Ltd., of Cobram.

Sub-Contracts for Mechanical Services \$662,650 and Electrical \$195,740 were let to J. L. Williams (Melb.) and T. J. Coutts of Ballarat. The building is planned for completion during February, 1979.

Stage 3 — Medical Wards and Outpatients. Preliminary planning is under way for o building to replace the medical wards presently located in the 80 year old Queen Victoria Block. This project will form the largest stage of the development programme with an estimated cost of \$13 million. Planning will continue for the duration of construction of the Medical Services Block, and the Board trusts that it will be in a position to let tenders in January, 1979. Construction is estimated to take 3 years and be completed to receive patients in 1982.

Children's Ward. During the year the Board has been actively working on one of its long standing promises to the community, and we refer here to the improvement to Children's Ward facilities. The project calls for the exchange in location of the present Children's Ward with the existing Tuberculosis Ward. Both areas will be extensively up-graded and modified of an estimated cost of \$180,000. The Board hopes to be in a position to let tenders before the end of 1977.

Master Planning. The Board is continually reviewing the Master Plan far the total redevelopment of the Haspital. This plan was first proposed and approved by the Haspitals & Charities Commission in 1972. As part of this plan, the Board has approved of a policy to acquire all properties on the west side of Windermere Street North. This additional space will permit services to expand. The Board would like to thank its Architects and Consultants, Stephenson & Turner far the valuable advice received in canjunction with the an-going development programme. The Board would also like to thank the Commission's Architect, Mr. Armstrang, and his staff, for their timely support and advice in the shaping of proposals for Government approval.

University of Melbaurne. Throughout the year the Board has kept the cammunity informed, through the Press, of its plans to affiliate with the University of Melbaurne for the clinical teaching of medical students. The formal agreement of affiliation has been campleted and negotiations are currently under way to obtain necessary capital funds for accommodation and tutorial space. For the first three to five years, temporary accommodation will be provided for students.

Library. One of the highlights of the year was the official opening of the W. R. Griffiths Library an the 26th April, 1977. This Library honours the long and voluoble service given to the Hospitol and the Ballarot cammunity, by Surgeon and Obstetrician, Mr. W. R. Griffiths. Mr. Griffiths has served in many copacities in the Hospital, including Resident Medical Officer, Medical Superintendent, Consultant and Board Member. His service first commenced in Ballarot in 1924. The Library will provide a wide range of services to medical and other prafessional staff in the Hospital. The first full-time Librarian appointed to the Hospital was Miss N. Worswick.

Appaintments to the Medical Staff. During the year, the Board approved the following additions to the sessional medical stoff:—Neuro Physician, Dr. J. O. King; Director Coronary Care, Dr. D. M. O'Sullivan; Regional Supervisor for Post Graduate Training, Dr. D. L. Morton; Consultant Nucleor Physician, Dr. B. Arkles.

Board of Management. During the year the following members retired and were re-elected to the Board of Management:—Messrs. A. L. Byriell, D. C. Gaunt, S. C. McBride, D. N. Punshon. A special vote of thanks is due to these members for the service they have given, and will continue to give, and to the Board as a whale for the canscientious manner in which they have attended to the porticularly anerous task of major decision making in a large Hospital.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

Nursing Education. The Boord con naw advise plans to progressively transfer the formal education of Nurses from the present Haspital based caurse, to a course conducted by the Ballarat Callege of Advanced Education. Although planning has commenced now, it is not expected that this course will commence before 1982. It is important to note that although the formal part of the course will be transferred from the Haspital, the students will continue to receive the same level of clinical experience, and possibly more, at the Bose Haspital. This move is part of an Australia wide programme, supported by the Nursing Profession, and is seen as a way of improving the standard of Nursing Education.

Finance and Statistics. Unfortunately the Board connot report to you that it has been able to stem cost escolation. The daily bed cost for the year rose from \$78.15 to \$96.33. The number of Inpatients treated has risen and there has been a substantial increase in Outpatients and Diagnostic Services provided to patients. The demand for sophisticated services has not abated, and with this demand, has come the corresponding requirement to increase numbers of staff. As the community would expect, this increase in staff numbers, together with general inflationary increases, are the main reasons for the over-all increase in cost. The financial statements attached give a summary of the years activity in financial terms. The Board is conscious of the need to conserve public funds and to design policies to give effect to this without detracting from the Hospital's high patient care standards.

Thanks. The Board would like to pay a special tribute to the Trained Nurses League, the Hospital Younger Set and the Mary-Helen Auxiliary for the work they have put in an behalf of the Haspital over the past year. These organisations provide an important link between the Hospital os an arganisation, and the community, and it is through their effort that much good-will has been generated. The Board would like to also thank members of the Professional Staff Group and local members of Parliament, Mr. A. T. Evans, M.L.A., Mr. W. Stephen, M.L.A., and Mr. R. Knowles, M.L.C., for their helpful and constructive advice in the Board's endeavours to further the Hospital's objects. A special thanks goes to the Press and to B.T.V. 6 for their timely reporting of Hospital activities throughout the year.

Appreciation. The Board would like to thank the Executive Members of the Hospitals & Charities Commission for their support throughout the year, and it is to be hoped that this support will continue with the introduction of the new Health Commission.

The staff under our senior executives Mr. E. D. Macouloy (Chief Exceutive Officer), Dr. J. Acheson (Medical Superintendent), Miss M. S. Ogden (Matron), and Mr. J. R. Bridger (Deputy Manager) are to be congratulated on again providing a dedicated service for which Ballarot has become well recagnized.

Finally to all members of the public, our thanks for their involvement and support over the year.

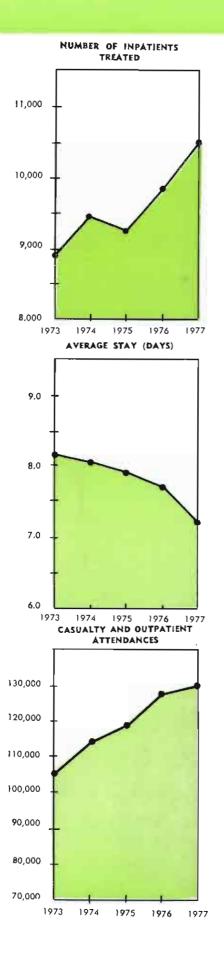


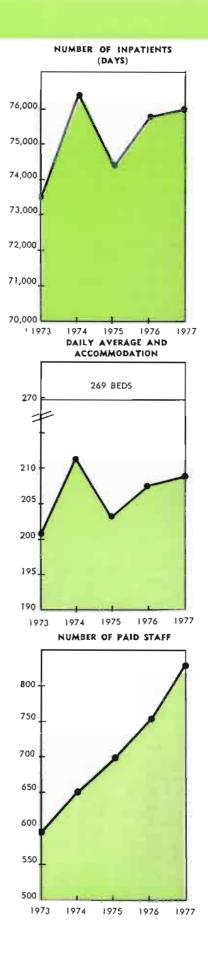

SCHOOL OF NURSING

Bosic Training School: This has been an exciting year in the history of nursing at this Hospital. It has seen the phasing out of the ald programme and now all students are involved in the 1600 hour programme. In addition to this the Nursing Aide School is being wound down as a separate school and in the future this Hospital will provide clinical experience for student nursing aides undertaking the wider programme from the Queen Elizabeth Geriatric Centre. In the School of Nursing, in line with many other secondary programmes, we have tried to use modern methods of selection in order to give us a better student and we hope in the end a better trained nurse giving better patient care. Clinical teaching has been encouraged and same Nurse Educatars are involved in the clinical teaching. The work of all Ward Sisters in the educational pragramme, particularly in the clinical areas is deeply appreciated. Currently there are 157 students in training and intakes are being maintained.

Midwifery: The past year has been a very good year in the Midwifery School. Currently there are 14 Pupil Mid-

wives undertaking the programme.

This year our students have commenced spending a short period of time in the Nea-Natal Paediatric Ward of the Mercy Hospital and our appreciation is given to the Sisters of Mercy for their help in this regard.

School of Nursing: Mr. Max Bitter successfully completed the Diplama in Nursing Education Caurse in 1976 and has returned to the staff. Mr. K. Hondley replaced Miss McKenna as Deputy Principal Nurse Educator on her return to England. Two staff members, Mrs. A. Rowe and Mrs. C. Wirtonen are currently undertaking a part time study course with the University of New England, Armidale, New South Wales. Sisters J. Gilmer and J. Peterkin have jained the teaching stoff as clinical teachers and Mr. J. Adrianns is currently undertaking the Diplama of Nursing Education Course at the College of Nursing Advisors. Sister R. Whitehead has been in charge of the Midwifery School since the retirement of Sister L. Weatherson in December, 1976.

To Mrs. Stevens, Principal Nurse Educator and her staff I offer my congratulations on their contribution to the octivities of this hospital and for nursing in this State and my sincere thanks for their loyalty and dedication in mointaining the Programme.

Student nurses in the new programme have been involved to a greater respect in community activities. I would like to express the thanks of the staff and students to all those agencies and institutions who have helped.

sincere thanks go to all Word Sisters and Word Stoff for the part they have played in this.

MEDICAL SERVICES

Medical Superintendent: Dr. J. ACHESON M.B., B.S., F.R.A.C.G.P.

This year has seen a settling dawn period in the sessional system and on review it was a credit to those concerned that the acceptance of a completely new framework of hospital medical relationships was introduced so smoothly.

Changes in the treatment of patients are becoming increasingly sophisticated, in parallel with this there has been a necessary upgrading of those associated with these procedures. This makes the bosic role of a hospital, that is patient care, more and mare difficult to keep in facus, but if this basic rale is lost hospitals will be much the poorer for it. With this increase in "Sophistication" mare and more equipment is needed and in this regard this Haspital has purchased a fibre aptic gastroscope, fibre aptic calonoscope, electroencephalograph, on aperating miscroscope, Bennett's respirator and many more piecees of equipment.

Medical Departments. Under the efficient control and direction of all heads these departments have flaurished during the year. Casualty and operating theatre, under the excellent supervision of Sister Coad and Sister McMillan, respectively, have functioned smoothly throughout the year as has Outpatients in the capable hands of Sister Boggoley. Occupational Therapy reopened and the new W. R. Griffiths Medical Library also becomes a reality under the guidance of Miss N. Worswick.

Sister J. Doherty has proven an excellent replacement for Sister Meiklejohn and I must pay tribute to the great service given by this lady whose dedication and loyalty to both her job and Hospital could not be surpossed and I wish her well in her well-earned retirement.

Professional Staff Group. I am particularly grateful to this group who, under the capable Chairmanship of Dr. I. Goy, gave both this Hospital and myself loyalty and excellent work support. In this regard I particularly wish to thank Drs. Alexander and Pilbeam for deputising for me an several accosions during the year. In closing, I wish to thank Board members, nursing and other Hospital staff who helped me throughout the year.

PATHOLOGY

Dr. S. T. H. H. PILBEAM M.A., M.B., B.Ch. (Comb.), M.R.C.S., L.R.C.P., F.R.C. Potts, (Eng.), F.R.C.P.A., D.C.P. (Lond.), D.Path. (Eng.).

This year has seen the end of on ero in the Pathology Department, or more correctly the end of its first era, Mr. W. Sorrell retired in January, 1977. Mr. Sorrell was the first laboratory technologist appointed to the Hospital and was responsible for the establishment of Pathology services in Ballarat. For many years he was the sale member of laboratory staff and doubled as radio-aropher.

The number of tests performed during the year was 248,821 an increase of 12% on lost year's work. The annual rate of increase is remarkably consistent. We have purchased several new items of equipment during the year, however due to financial stringency, the total cost of these has been met from the Medical Special Purposes Fund. Our most significant purchase was a centrifugal analyser for for the Chemistry department which although costing \$50,000 has already made considerable sovings in staff time and reagent costs. By easing the burden of routine work on the staff it has enabled us to increase our repertaire of tests performed locally.

As this report is written we are about to move into but another phase of Medibank to meet the recommendations of the Pothology Services Working Party, spansored by the Federal Government. This will increase considerably the work in administration and will probably produce a small reduction in income.

It is gratifying to see work started on the new department, and next year's report will be the lost written from the present department.





RADIOLOGY

This year has been busy with an additional 800 patients being treated over the previous year, making the total 25,326, which is comparable to many metropolitan hospitals.

During the year a new x-roy room has been opened on the ground floor of the Edward Wilson Block adjacent to the x-roy office. This has been fitted out with woiting room, cubicles, trolley space, a complete standard set of x-roy opparatus and a dark room with automatic processor. Many of the inpatients who required to be transferred on trolleys or wheel chairs are now taken to this room for their x-roys, which has contributed greatly to the easing of the congestion that previously occurred in the main department downstairs. The downstairs waiting area has been installed. This now allows for facility in reporting and space and adaptability for demanstration of films to the referring clinicions and clinical groups.

During the year Mr. A. Rombocus has jained us as deputy chief radiographer and two new trainee radiographers, P. Schenk and P. Todd have joined the staff.

We are now looking forward to the time when the new department of radiology will be completed and a comprehensive committee is now functioning to organise the equipment details and the general loyout throughout the department.

The President, Members of the Hospital Committee and Administrative Staff are thanked far their co-operation and consideration of any requests for improvements or equipment that have been needed throughout the year in the Radiology Department.



PROFESSIONAL STAFF GROUP

Chairman: Dr. I C GOY M.B. B.S. (Melb.), F.R.A.C.P., F.R.F.R. (Lond.), F.R.A.C.R.

During the year the Professional Staff Group has dealt with many problems, but on the whole it has been a year without any major changes.

One of the problems presented to the Professional Staff Group was that of providing experience and clinical material for the Resident Medical Staff. A submission was received from the Resident Medical Staff and certain decisions were made including the provision of Resident Medical Staff being brought into the orbit of private and intermediate patients in order that they can assist in their treatment and also at the same time receive valuable medical experience under qualified supervision.

The Annual Nurses Graduation was held on the 8th of July and the Chairman of the Professional Staff Group, Dr. Ian C. Gay attended officially in this capacity.

The Intern Accreditation Committee visited the Ballarat Base Hospital and it is anticipated in the future there will be same exchange of present medical officers with the Queen Elizabeth Geriatric Centre, Ararat District Hospital, Maryborough District Hospital and Stawell District Hospital.

A handsome presentation was made to Mrs. H. D. Drury on her retirement from the Hospital as Honarary Librarian, a position she had held far seven years, and also as a tribute to her great work as Honarary Assistant Director of the Red Cross Blood Bank for twenty years.

The reconstruction of the Children's Ward on the ground floor of Yuille House accasioned a great deal of debate in the Professional Staff Group but finally when certain provisions were made to this plan, it was conceded that this was probably in the interest of the Hospital at this time.

An electro-encephalograph machine was finally obtained for this Hospital and it is expected to be in use very shartly.

A draft agreement for the provision of undergraduote training in the Ballarat and District Base Hospital in conjunction with the University of Melbaurne was discussed and approved by the Prafessianal Staff Group.

There was full discussion of the Syme Townsend Report but no firm recommendations were made.

A report was received by Dr. D. L. Mortan, the Regional Director of the Central Highlands Region on educational facilities for doctors within the Ballarat and District Hospitals. It was noted that there were:

R.A.C.G.P. advanced courses each Tuesday afternoon: Clinical Society on the fourth Wednesday of each month; Paediatric group meetings on the third Thursday of each month; Obstetric group meetings on the third Thursday of coch month; Resident training programme each Wednesday; and Teaching rounds within the Hospital at various times.

It was felt that adequate educational facilities were provided already within the Ballarat and District Base Haspital.

During the year, various Hospital sub-committees were farmed with the approval of the Professional Staff Group. These included a Drug sub-committee, a Theatre sub-committee, a Diet sub-committee and an Infection Control sub-committee.

During the year, the Prafessional Staff Group has tried to work in close harmony with the Haspital Board and we pay tribute to the liaison we have had with the Medical Superintendent, Dr. J. Achesan and the Chief Executive Officer, Mr. Eeon Macaulay.

GENERAL SERVICES

Deputy Monoger: J. R. BRIDGER AASA, LHA, AALM

During the 1976-77 year there was a significant increase in the amount of money expended. The day to day running costs revealed a record spending in excess of \$8.6 million, of which solories and wages comprosed \$6.91 million. Most of this expense was funded by way of Government Grants which totalled \$6.42 million for maintenance purposes, and further Government Grants of \$.73 million which were received towards the purchase of capital items.

Catering Services. Demonds on Hospital services continue to grow and the increased activity has been reflected in all areas of the General Services Division. During the past year the Cafeteria and General Services Block, costing \$1.5 million, was afficially opened and commissioned. The Cafeteria has provided staff with a spacious and comfortable environment and given the Catering Department improved facilities to cope with the increased demands of providing food services. The new conference rooms, housed in this block, have placed additional demands on the Catering Department providing luncheons, dinners etc. as a result of the increased use of these facilities.

Domestic Services. The internal training programme developed a few years ago continued successfully and has continued the high standard of cleaning throughout the Hospital. A further eight staff have undergone the internal training programme during the year just completed.

Engineering Services. Mojor work was recently completed on upgrading the fire protection equipment in the Hospital of a cost of \$20,000. Additional Ring Mains were installed to provide improved water pressure in occordance with the Country Fire Authority regulations. Fire lectures have been conducted on a weekly basis to educate staff an this important safety aspect. Other major works arranged through the Engineering Department included the installation of another dental suite, tagether with the establishment of a well equipped dental technicion's workshop.

Modifications to the medical records filing system, the construction of a temporary x-ray examination room and o temporary martuary, have all involved engineering services.

At the time of writing this report, work is satisfactorily progressing on the construction of the new Medical Services Black which is estimated to cost approximately \$2.7 million.

General Stores. Growth in the Hospital services has been reflected in the General Stores statistics. 4,502 requisitions were processed on behalf of words and departments for the year and collectively these requisitions totalled \$270,000. The range of stores stock has again increased during the year with new technical advances in medical supplies such as the use of disposables.

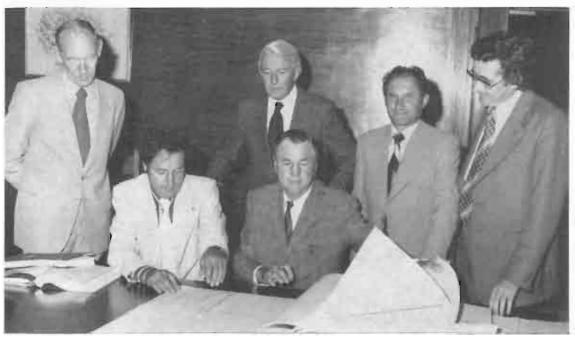
Loundry. The laundry continued to supply the Hospital with good service, especially considering the equipment and facilities available to do the work. Further, progress has been made in the post twelve months towards the construction of the new Group Loundry, and by this time next year final transfer plans will be well advanced.

Personnel Department. As at the 30th June, 1977, 838 employees were attached to the stoff of the Base Hospital, and 74 to Associated Annexe Hospitals. During the year 322 employees terminated their services. Stoff who retired from the General Services Division having 20 years or more service included—

Mr. F. Burnham (Foreman Painter) — 23 years, and

Miss L. Toit (Food Services Assistant) — 24 years service.

Finally I wish to record my thanks ta oll of my Departmental Heads and the Administrative Staff of the General Services Division for their continued support and ossistance. To Mr. Mocouloy, Motron Ogden and Doctor Acheson I express my personal thanks and appreciation for the help and co-operation I have received.

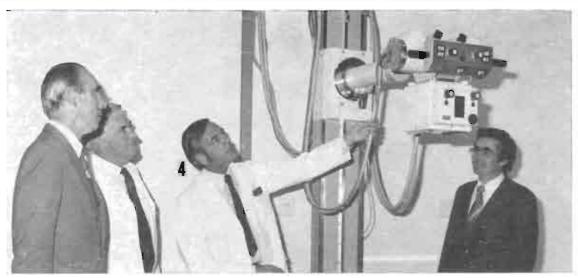
