**PRESIDENT'S REPORT TO THE CONTRIBUTORS**

**To the Life Governors and Contributors :**

On behalf of the Committee of Management, it is my privilege and pleasure to present this, the eighty-ninth Annual Report and Audited Statement of Accounts for the year ended 30th June, 1963.

**Service to the Community :**

During the year—

1. 207 beds were available 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.
2. A total of 2,873 patients were treated.
3. There was a daily average of 122.2 in-patients receiving treatment.
4. 5323 out-patients received treatment having 10,028 attendances.
5. 468 maternity patients were treated.
6. 401 babies were born.
7. 342 major and 855 minor Operations were performed.

**In order to provide this service—**

1. 2963 X-Rays were taken.
  2. 7168 Pathology tests were carried out.
  3. 3862 Physiotherapy treatments were given.
  4. 192,543 meals were served.
  5. 197 persons were employed on the staff.
- All of these show an increase over previous years.

**SERVICE :**

All aspects of service reflect an increase during the year. The daily average of patients from 113 to 122 per day, out-patients treated increased by 1000, babies born by 22. 600 additional X-rays were taken and pathology tests more than doubled with an increase of 3,600. Physiotherapy treatments increased by 400 and 53 additional major operations were performed. All of these serve to highlight the additional services available, not only to Horsham, but to the whole of the region.

**REGIONAL SERVICE:**

The Group Laundry continues a very high standard of service to the hospitals in the region, and it is interesting to note that where the original estimated requirement would be 5 tons per week, the average output for this year has been 7 tons at an average cost of 9.8 pence per lb. This cost includes collection and delivery, laundering and replacements of worn-out linen. During the year Minyip Hospital became a participant and enquiries have been received from Beulah Hospital.

Regional Council meetings have been held regularly and continue to be well attended by representatives from all hospitals in the region. These meetings provide an opportunity for free discussions and mutual help. Advisory meetings, Medical, Nursing and Administrative, have been held each quarter.

## BLOOD BANK:

Blood taking sessions have been held every week and during the year 1505 pints of blood have been donated; of this 655 pints have been used at the Base Hospital and 230 pints in other hospitals throughout the region, the remainder being returned to Melbourne.

This opportunity is taken to express our very sincere thanks to the Red Cross ladies for this continuity in the organising of this service.

## FINANCE :

### Maintenance—

The total income for the year was £245,619 and the total cost of running the hospital was 247,533, resulting in a deficit for the year of £1,934.

Income for the year increased by £29,000 which was made up of additional receipts of £9,000 from Government Grants, £12,000 from in-patients' fees, and £8,000 from out-patients' fees. The increased income from patients' fees is a reflection of the increased daily average, and of payments received under the new pensioner medical service, which was introduced on 1st January, 1963, whereby an additional 24/- per day is received for every pensioner day. The extension of our X-ray and Pathology services have accounted for the rise in out-patients income.

Total expenditure showed an increase of £32,000. Of this figure, the following amounts were directly attributable to the increased daily average—Provisions £1,500, Surgery and Dispensary £2,500, and Domestic £3,000.

The largest increase of £17,000 in Salaries and Wages was brought about by increased award payments to Nursing Staff of £5,000 and £9,000 to newly appointed staff in our expanding ancillary medical departments of X-ray and pathology.

Other increases for the year were £2,000 in repairs and replacements, and £2,500 for travelling expenses for medical and technical staff appointed from England.

### Capital—

Capital works in progress at the present time, include extensions and alterations to the kitchen and the erection of a residence for our newly appointed pathologist.

During the year, expenditure amounted to £25,000 consisting of new buildings £3,500; additions and major alterations £5,000; equipment £11,000, and group laundry equipment £5,500.

Government Grants of £24,600 were received during the year towards these and other works. This opportunity is taken on behalf of your Committee of Management to express our thanks to the Commissioners, Dr Lindell, Mr McLellan, and Mr Thomas, and through them to their Architectural and Administrative staffs, for the co-operation and assistance throughout the year.

## MATRON'S REPORT :

The Annual Graduation Ceremony was held on Friday, March 29th, with Miss V. Bullwinkel, Matron of Fairfield Hospital as Guest Speaker.

The Ryan Prize for 1962 was awarded to Sister J. M. Cotter, with Sister J. M.

Bell as runner-up.

Student recruitment at present is at a very high level, schools being booked until October 1964 and bookings made for 1965 and 1966. It is interesting to note the higher educational standard of applicants, and there has been a decided trend towards girls with leaving and matriculation certificates presenting for nurse training.

## **BUILDINGS AND EQUIPMENT :**

During the year, a progressive policy has been pursued in regard to both buildings and equipment. Probably the most outstanding was the completion of the heating of the public wards, which has been appreciated by both patients and staff. Although this is the first winter after installation, it is already hard to realise that it had not been done years ago and the Ladies' Auxiliary are thanked for their financial assistance in making this possible. Considerable works in the kitchen, requiring a complete re-organisation of the food services, are in progress as this report is written, and through the financial assistance of the Hospitals and Charities Commission a very high standard of food service will emerge from the remodelling and reconstruction of this department. Approval has been received from the Hospitals and Charities Commission for the air-conditioning of the Labour Wards, Nurseries and operating theatre, which will fill a long felt need by all our patients using these facilities. We have completed our program of replacement of boiling water sterilizers with high speed steam units. Thanks to donations from Mr. J. Donaldson and The Trustees Executors and Agency Co., the most modern of labour ward beds are now on order and will be installed as soon as available. All other equipment has been replaced as necessary to ensure a high level of efficiency.

During the year, a continuing policy of painting has been carried out to maintain a high standard of appearance of our buildings, both external and internal.

## **GROUNDS :**

Your Committee is very conscious of the need to maintain the exterior appearance of the hospital as it is felt this could be a contributing factor to the welfare of the patients. All lawns are kept in order, trees are planted; this year a tennis court has been constructed for the nursing staff and at present, contact has been made with the City Council to carry out underground drainage in Robinson Street, outside the Geriatric Units to remove the hazard of the deep gutter, and also outside the Nurses' Homes in Read Street to complete the appearance of the Nurses' Homes.

## **GERIATRIC UNITS :**

This is the first complete year of functioning of these units and we are pleased to report that full use has been made by our patients, and we have a waiting list for admission. Everything possible is done for the comfort of the patients and again we thank the Old Folks Auxiliary for the special interest they have taken in providing outdoor furniture and television for our patients.

## **ANCILLARY SERVICES :**

This year has seen the greatest emphasis on improvement of diagnostic services as an aid to patient care.

## **PATHOLOGY:**

In one single year, we have seen an entire pathology department come into being. With Dr. Geoffrey Leyton, M.D., D.C.P. as Director of Pathology, we have been extremely fortunate in obtaining a pathologist, not only of eminence, but also with the ability and previous experience to initiate a department. We welcome him from England and appreciate his service in Canada and other countries. On his staff he has two qualified technologists in Mr. Kaploon and Miss Heath. Two partly trained assistants and a clerical member completes his team which is competent to give a complete pathological service to the Wimmera region. Considerable structural alterations have been made and necessary equipment, in all costing some £10,000, has been expended to ensure an efficient diagnostic aid to the medical practitioners in the region. Financial assistance received from the Hospitals and Charities Commission has been of considerable importance in the establishing of this department.

## **X-RAY :**

During the year, Dr. Andrews of Glenelg Base Hospital was visiting Radiologist, but he ceased in April and Dr. Hardman of Bendigo assisted us in a visiting capacity, pending the arrival of a full time Radiologist from England—Dr. Vesey, who is expected in October. To Dr. Andrews and to Dr. Hardman, we are indeed grateful for the qualified knowledge they have given to our radiological service on a visiting basis. We hope that with the appointment of Dr. Vesey, that this service will be extended for the benefit of patients in the region.



## HONORARY STAFF :

### Medical—

Once again, we thank our Honorary Medical Staff for the service which they have given to our patients, and also for the service they have rendered through lectures to our nursing staff. So often this service is taken for granted, but this opportunity is taken to thank them for their private time given and devoted to our patients and our nurses.

During the year, Dr. Archie S. Anderson resigned as Honorary Ophthalmologist, and your Committee in recognition of his honorary service to our public patients in this field, conferred on him the high honor of Life Governor of the hospital. In his place, Dr. G. Gaston of Adelaide was appointed Honorary Ophthalmologist and we take this opportunity to welcome him to the Honorary Staff. Some years ago, Dr. Gaston was a resident at this hospital and it is indeed pleasing to see him reach high status in his chosen specialty.

### Chaplains—

Each year we come to appreciate more the need for spiritual care for our patients. This care is very closely allied to Medical and nursing treatment and in our Chaplains we have men ever ready to meet the requests of our patients and we are indeed grateful for their very real help in their spiritual needs.

### Legal—

To our Honorary Solicitor, we say a very sincere thank you for another year of Honorary Service during which his advice has been often sought and very freely given.

### Dental—

On behalf of our public patients, we are grateful for the Honorary Service rendered to them by our Honorary Dental Staff.

## VISITING CLINICAL SERVICES :

On behalf of our patients and those throughout the region who were referred to visiting clinics, we express our thanks to the Peter MacCallum Clinic, The Consultative Council for Poliomyelitis, the Mental Hygiene Authority, and the Victorian Society for Crippled Children and Adults, for the continued excellent service that has been given. It is indeed gratifying to know that an airfield is to be constructed here at Horsham, as this will ensure not only the continuity of these services, but also make possible the maximum specialists time available to our patients.

## AUXILIARIES :

Our sincere thanks are extended to our Auxiliaries—the Ladies' Auxiliary, the Old Folks' Auxiliary, and the Younger Set Auxiliary, for another year of active service on behalf of the hospital. During the year, the following amounts were raised—Ladies' Auxiliary, £500; Old Folks' Auxiliary, £295; Younger Set, £350.

We know and appreciate that all this money is raised by the personal efforts of the members of the auxiliaries and trust that we may look forward to their continued support.

## CONCLUSION :

On behalf of the Committee of Management, I wish to convey our thanks to all members of the staff who, through their co-operation, have contributed towards the happy relationship which exists throughout the hospital to the benefit of our patients. We thank Miss Woolley, our Matron, her Assistants, the Tutor Sisters, the Ward Charge Sisters and all nursing staff, trained and in training, the Administrative staff, the Technical and lay staff, who together form the team. Library service to our patients has been maintained by the Red Cross Ladies and for this continued service, we say thank you on behalf of our patients for this very real service. On behalf of the Committee of Management and the recruitment officers of the Hospitals and Charities Commission, I wish to thank the Headmasters of the Schools and Mother Superior of the Convent, for their assistance in providing opportunities for the recruitment of nurses amongst their pupils.

I am very pleased indeed to express on behalf of the Committee of Management and the Administration, our appreciation of the cordial relationships which we have with the representatives of the press, and to thank them for their assistance during the year.

To my colleagues of the Committee of Management, I thank them for their support, for the time they have given in a voluntary capacity to the deliberations on the policy of the hospital, and for their regular attendance at meetings. To all who have helped during the year, either by financial assistance or personal effort, we say a very sincere thank you and trust that with your continued support, we may look forward to another year of progressive service.

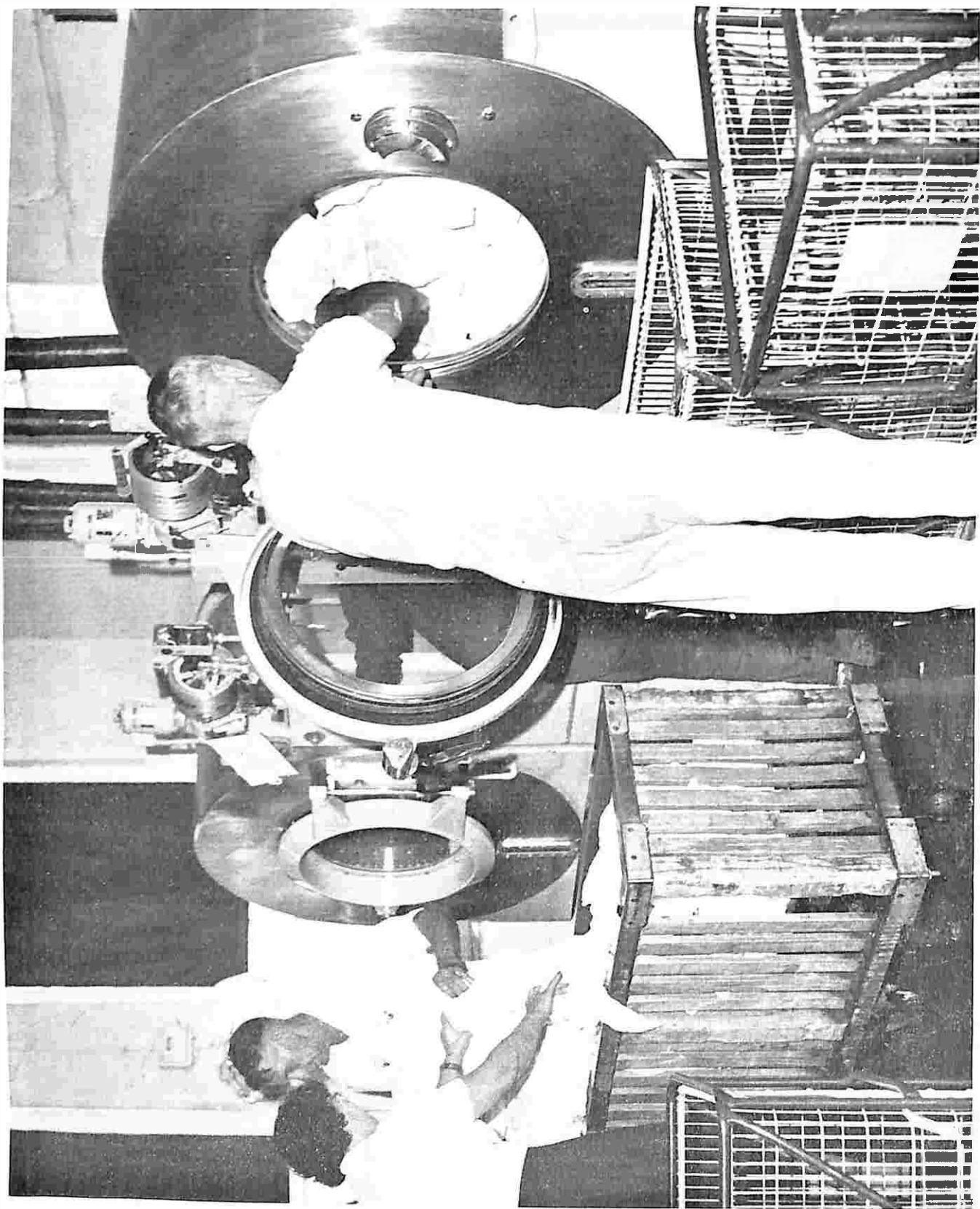

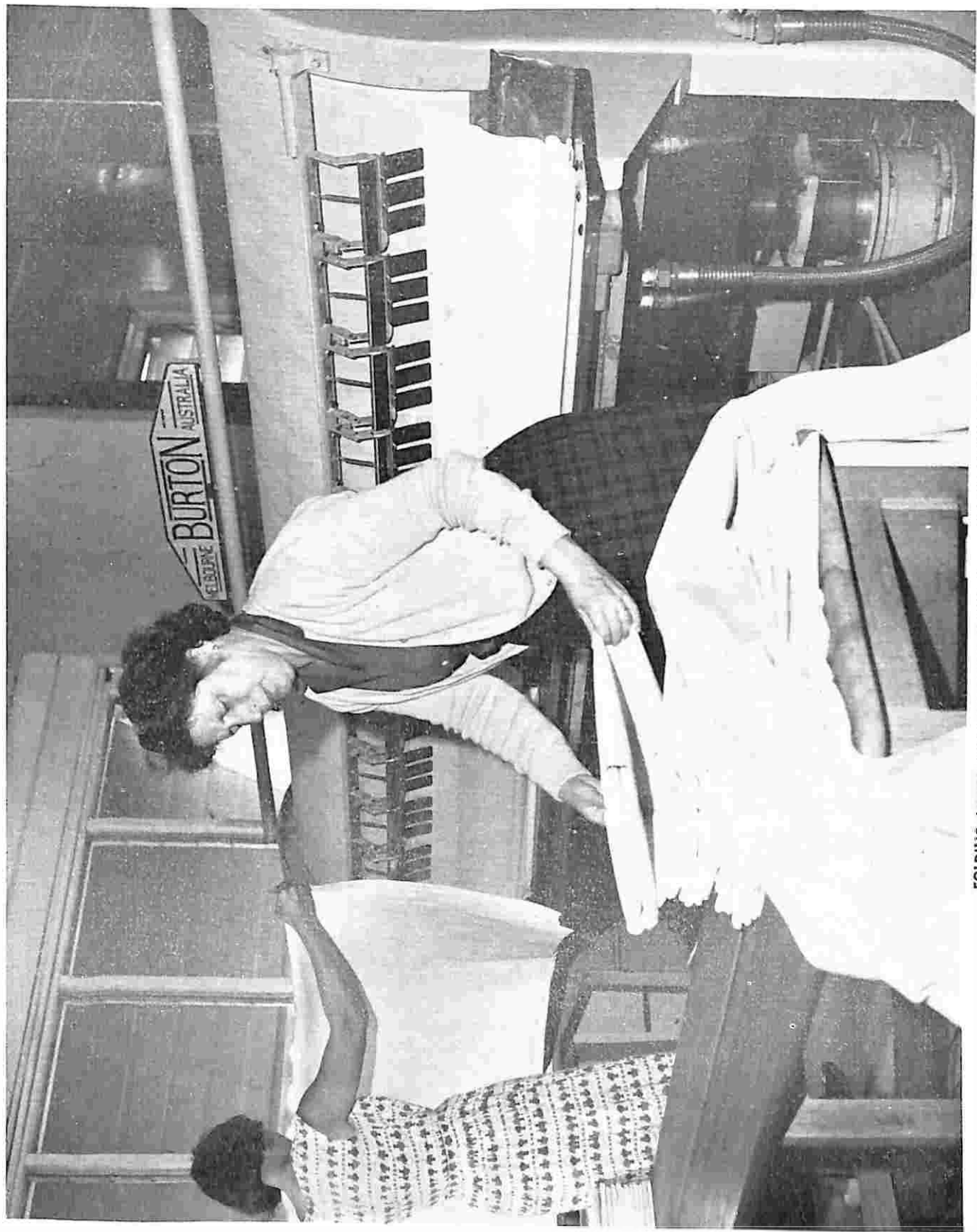

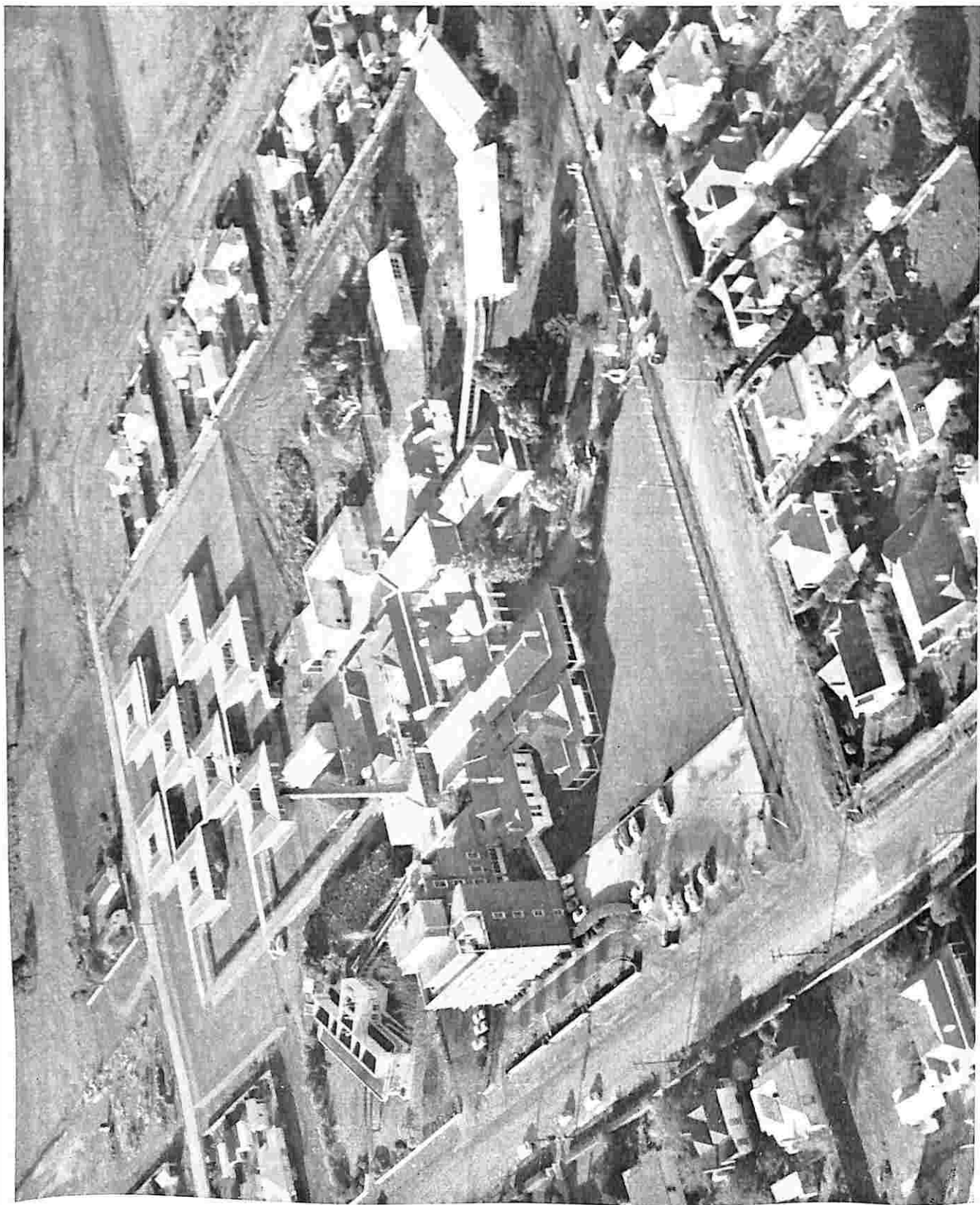
