

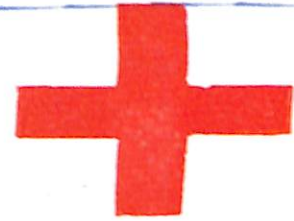

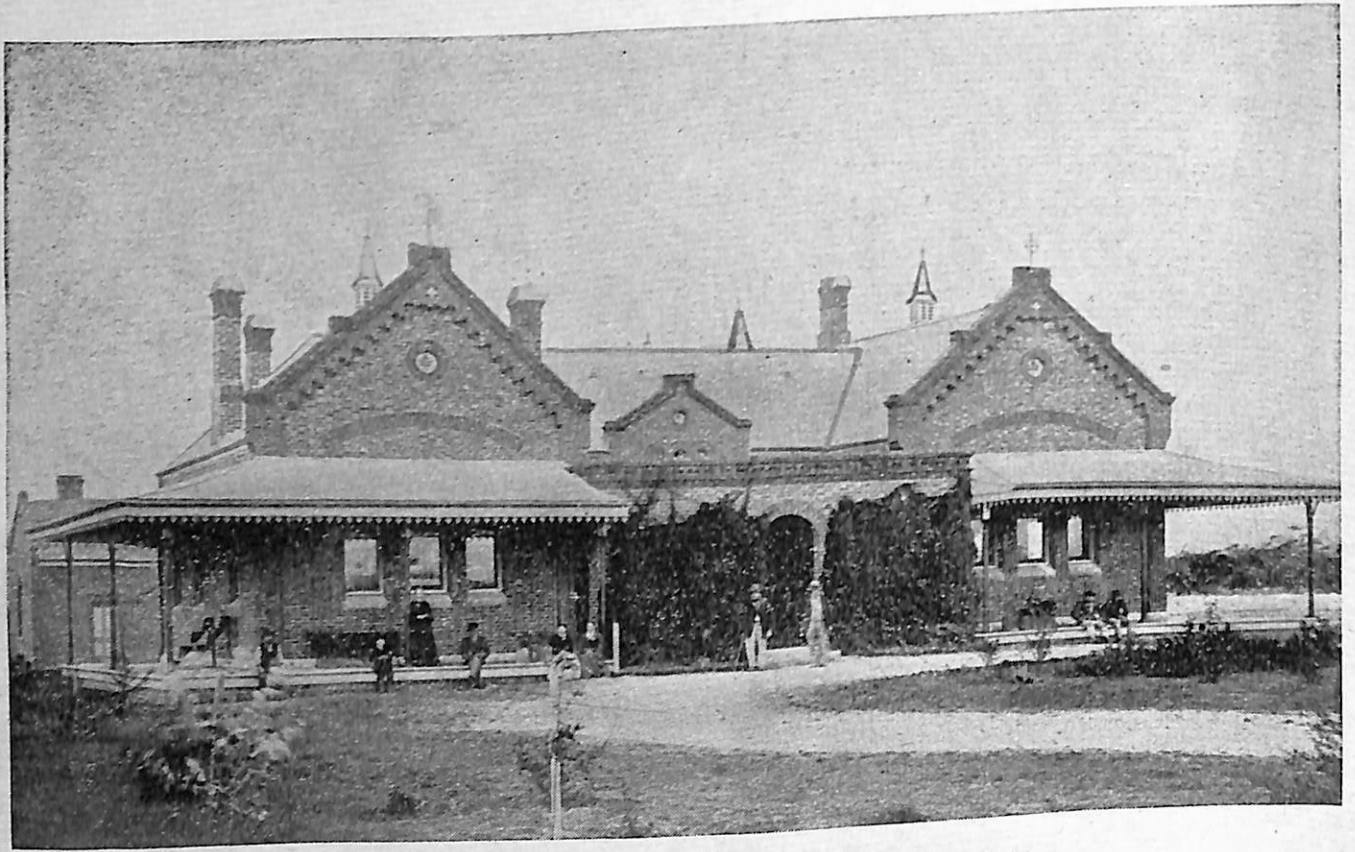

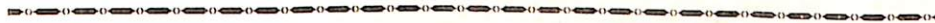

The Seventy-Fifth Annual Report of the Committee of Management of Horsham Base Hospital

(INCORPORATED).

For the Financial Year 1st July, 1948, to 31st March, 1949

To the Governors and Contributors,

Ladies and Gentlemen,

It is my pleasure to present to you on behalf of the Committee of Management the 75th Annual Report of our Hospital. It is significant that this year as our report for three-quarters of a Century is presented our town will be celebrating its Centenary.

The Hospital's growth has been in full accord with the growth of the town and district. Today we are fully conscious of the need for expansion based on the fact that the patient requires the best that can be given him regarding accommodation, medical and nursing treatment, with the addition of all the essential equipment in the various Hospital Departments that, when available, tends towards speedy recovery and early discharge of the patient from Hospital.

We feel that you recognise these principles and will do your best to make our Hospital what it should be and worthy of our town and district.

PATIENTS. During the year, 2093 patients were treated. A feature of patient admission noted was the lack of accommodation for other than public patients. Our need was particularly felt regarding beds for Intermediate and Private patients. This can only be overcome by completing our Building programme and making available such accommodation. Our Statistical Return further on will show full details of these figures. For the period, our in-patient days were 33,187, with a daily average of patients treated of 121.12.

I would like to mention the very fine work done by our Honorary Medical Staff in surgery and that during the year 211 major and 557 minor operations were performed—852 operations.

Our Out-patients Department does not treat many patients, but there has been an increase in these figures owing to the work done in the Pathological, X-Ray, and Physiotherapy Departments.

BLOOD DONORS. I would express thanks to our many blood donors, and to the Red Cross Blood Transfusion Service of the Royal Melbourne Hospital for its courteous and willing co-operation with our Bio-chemist, Mr. Watson. Our Blood Donors Group is a fine one and has been called on to help very frequently during the year.

FINANCE. Our Hospital exists solely to treat patients, and today with ever-increasing costs, money is required to carry on our work.

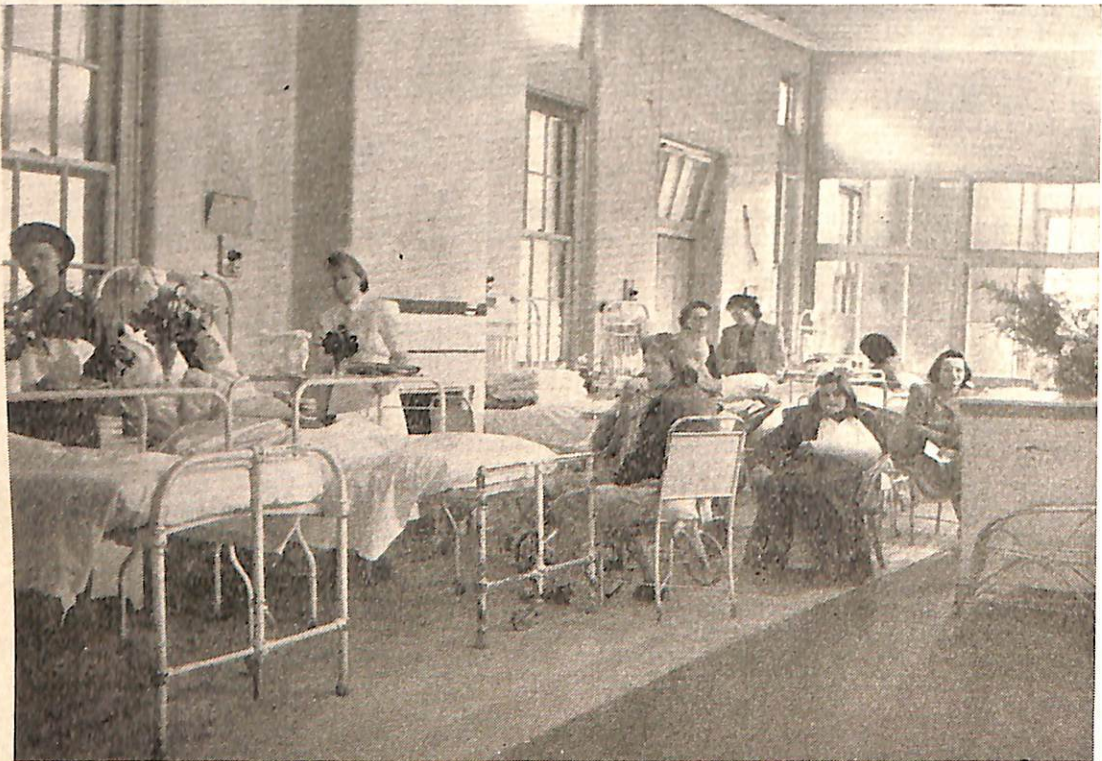
How have we fared? There were moments of worry and concern at various times. Worries were overcome principally by the help given by the Government through the Hospitals and Charities Commission. More money is needed to carry on a hospital as in all other fields. Cost in all departments have increased. We wonder when the peak will be reached, and a reasonable quantity of goods be purchased for £, and a corresponding value be received for £. These facts are relative.

Your Committee is indeed appreciative of the support given by our Town Council, Shires, public bodies and organisations and all sections of the community which enabled us to meet our financial obligations during the current year.

A Statement of Income and Expenditure Account can be studied later in this report.

For the nine months under review, our receipts were £43,833. Payments £43,562—a surplus of £271. All Government moneys "in toto" amounted to £28,662. On the expenditure side—salaries and wages accounted for £26,319. The daily average cost of treating each patient was 26/0d.

These figures deal with our Maintenance Account only. We recognise that our hospital is just at that stage of development where costs are heavy, but the obligation to meet this need is the more pronounced when our people desire our hospital to fulfil its complete functions.

During this period, without a special appeal being made for money, the following works have been carried out, if not yet completed. It is true that the credit of our repairs and replacement account will have disappeared, but such an account was created for such a purpose. Its funds have enabled your Committee to buy a Burton vacuum ironer—£2800, overall cost and installation, and an Ultrays 300 m.m. X-Ray plant at an overall figure of £3,850. In addition, a property in Baillie Street to house 12 nurses and a home for the Bio-chemist have been built, acquired and renovated. Ambulance garage built, nurses' dining room extended, library and other works carried out at a cost of just on £5000.

We make this appeal to you to get behind your Committee during the coming year because much work needs to be done and we believe with you that the work of our hospital is worthy of liberal and generous support.

HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES COMMISSION. To the Honorary Board we say thank you for splendid services rendered to the charities and hospitals of this State. It was a board that did its job. From its chrysalis has emerged the present Commission consisting of men paid to do their work. We all welcome the chairman, Mr. McVilly, a choice pleasing to all hospitalmen. His deputy, Dr. R. Watson, who is a medical man and a soldier, we welcome, likewise the third member of the board, Mr. Frencham, in whom this Committee and town has a peculiar and personal interest.

We feel confident that the whole hospital field in this State will benefit greatly by the creation of the new Hospitals and Charities Commission.

HIS EXCELLENCY, SIR EDMUND HERRING. It was indeed a pleasure to show his Excellency, Sir Edmund Herring, and Lady Herring over the hospital when they paid an unofficial visit. A very keen interest was evinced in the departments and a warm and human touch expressed to patients and staff.

HOSPITAL AUXILIARIES. The need of the support of auxiliaries is needed more today than ever in helping hospital work. The report of our Carnival Committee could not be included in this report owing to our year closing on March 31st. We thank the Ladies' Auxiliary for its loyal and valued co-operation, which has its individual report printed in full.

It is with gratitude that we mention the 3LK Radio Appeals Committee and the 3HA Cheer Box Club, for splendid yearly donations to the hospital. These two bodies are graciously thanked for continuous co-operation.

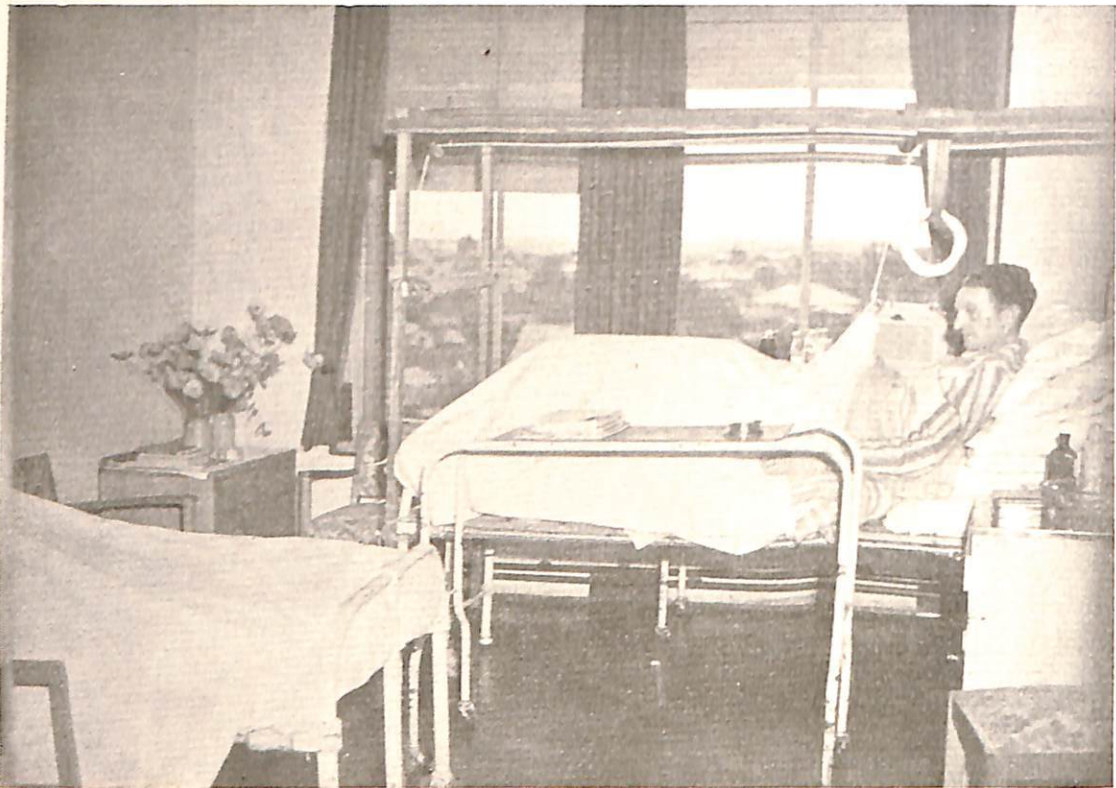
Mrs. James Anderson is still a stalwart and great worker for the hospital. What a wonderful individual effort. This year she handed in a cheque for £1014/7/7 with her previous amount of £9093/17/3, making a total of £10,108/4/10.

T.B. CHALET. This department has its beds almost fully occupied. Dr. T. V. Walpole being our medical officer and Sister Shandley, sister-in-charge. We thank the Health Department for its very fine co-operation in laying out the Chalet garden, which when completed will be a boon and a pleasure to all. It is with pleasure that we record that our work in this department has received commendation right through north-western Victoria.

STAFF

NURSING STAFF. We thank Matron Arthur and the members of the nursing staff for a year of loyal service, and extend our best wishes to all those trainees who have passed their final examination as well as those who have passed their 1st year professional examination. We particularly mention Nurse M. M. Puls who this year was the winner of the coveted Thomas F. Ryan Nursing Prize.

OTHER We thank, Miss King and her staff members, laundry, boiler house, male staff and administrative staff for another year of service, one which owing to our award basis of service and our hospital hours of service has presented difficulties but which by co-operation and goodwill have been happily and courageously overcome.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT. During the year we lost a very fine worker when Mr. A. E. Watts tendered his resignation as a member of the Committee of Management, and Mr. M. J. Kearney on account of health reasons also tendered his resignation. We express to these gentlemen thanks for the work which they did for the hospital while members of our committee.

RED CROSS SOCIETY. A much needed service is now being given to the patients by voluntary helpers of the Red Cross Society, who have an excellent library and visit the wards twice weekly with books and magazines. This is a feature greatly appreciated.

REGULAR VISITATIONS TO PATIENTS. First we remember our Ministers of all Churches and Salvation Army officers who are in almost daily attendance at the hospital. These are the following organisations which regularly visit the hospital with good cheer for the patients.

The Ladies' Auxiliaries of the R.S.S.I.L.A. and the Hospital, the Catholic Ladies' Guild, Methodist Ladies' Guild, Presbyterian Ladies' Guild, Church of England Ladies' Guild, Church of Christ Ladies' Guild, Lutheran Ladies' Guild, 3HA Cheer Box Club, C.W.A., Women's Section of the Country Party, and Miss Elsie Davis and her band of young children who visit the hospital each Sunday.

The Committee thanks all helpers who in any manner during the year have carried out acts of kindness to the patients, or by way of donation helped the Committee to carry on the work of the hospital.

IN CONCLUSION. I would make these comments. That since the elimination of the Means Test in January, 1946, our receipts from ordinary revenue are smaller than they normally would have been.

Since the introduction of the 40-hour week, our costs have been relatively higher. We feel that greater assistance must be received from our Government to meet the ever-growing maintenance costs of public hospitals.

We believe that an increase in the Commonwealth Hospital Benefit rate to non-public patients would have its immediate reflex on public bed costs. It is not the policy of any Committee of Management to ally itself with one party or the other regarding Government policy. We can express the opinion that the positions of hospitals today would be in very sore straits were it not for the splendid honorary services of members of the medical profession throughout this State and Commonwealth.

We hear it freely expressed that greater financial help from the public to maintain public hospitals will not be given, because the money for such purposes should be found by the Government.

We believe that more money should be found by the Government, but that a proportion of moneys must always be found by the public.

We trust that if Commonwealth Government moneys to maintain our hospitals reach such a stage that control in management is demanded, that such control on behalf of the Commonwealth Government would be vested in a State committee, such as we now have in our own Hospitals and Charities Commission, as a prevention against our hospitals becoming a purely Government department.

We are convinced, as your Committee of Management, that you do not want this to happen and we appeal to you in Horsham's Centenary year to support to your uttermost the work of the hospital and particularly our appeal for funds to complete our Hospital Building development programme.

AMBULANCE SERVICE

Some difficulty was experienced after we lost the services of Mr. Morson as our honorary ambulance driver.

Mr. Nicks, a staff member, undertook to do the duty for a period for a yearly honorarium. This method has now ceased, and our ambulance is driven on a paid basis for services and time entailed on the work.

All ambulances services are now under the control of the Hospital and Charities Commission and no doubt in the near future this responsibility will be felt, perhaps, in some system of State co-ordination and control.

Our service has always met its commitments because the local branch of the R.S.S.I.L.A. agreed that this service to the people would not be run at a loss.

Perhaps the time may be near when an Ambulance Contributory Scheme will have to be provided and members of same have free transport. The system is in force in many towns.

We take this opportunity of thanking all those people who have helped during the season and we know that our Ambulance Service is such that it has the confidence of our people and will always have financial assistance when necessary.

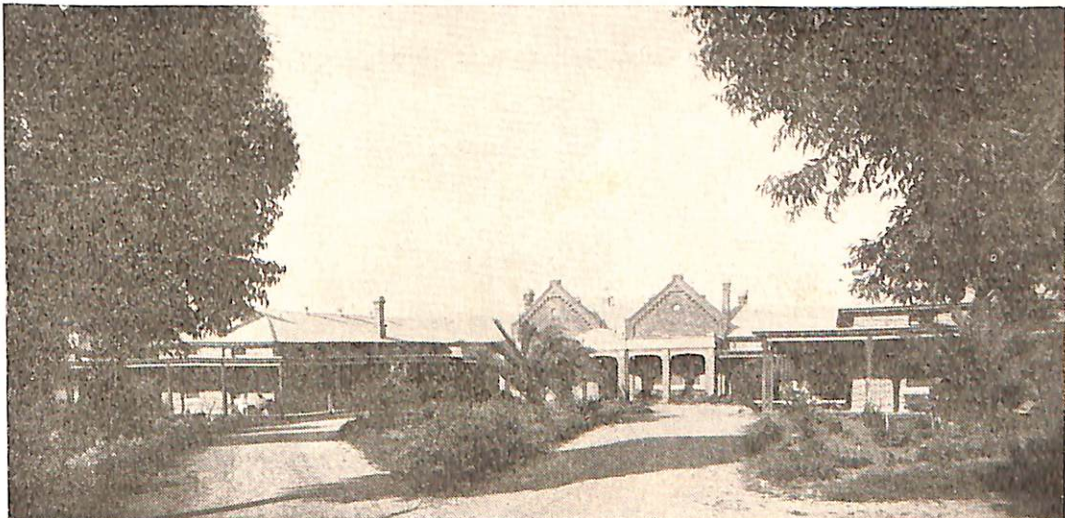

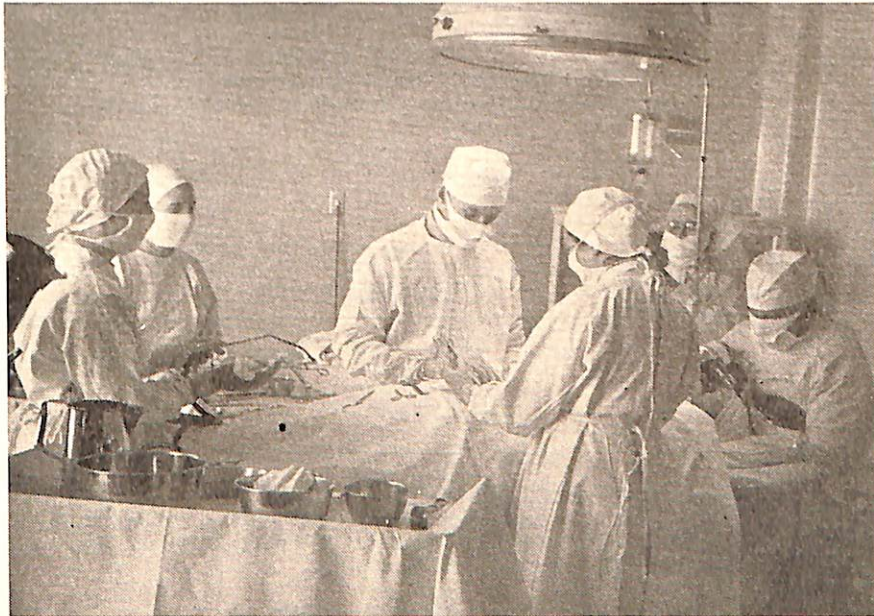

The policy of our Annexe Hospital is a strongly entrenched fact now through the medium of experience gained from its inception. Our people are prepared to meet their share of maintenance costs as well as building costs in reaching the ideal of a new hospital to meet the needs of the sick of all the people of Murtoa and district.

During the year splendid service has been rendered by the Committee members, Sister-in-charge, professional staff, auxiliaries and the public in carrying out hospital work.

As a preliminary to our main building programme and as sound business, the purchase of the present property at a figure of £1800 was approved but has not been quite finalised.

It is with pleasure that your committee thanks the Hospitals and Charities Commission for generous help during the year, also our parent committee for the help it has given through its executive officers in administrative matters and the co-operation of the matron regarding acquisition of trainee nursing staff.

Figures are not comparative for the period under review as the hospital financial year embodied only workings for nine months.

During the period 54 patients were treated for 1199 in-patient days. Daily average of in-patients being 4.37, and average stay-in days of in-patients 22.2. Thirteen maternity patients were treated and 13 babies born.

Out-Patients. Twenty-four patients were treated. One hundred and forty-three attendance at hospital with an average attendance of 5.95.

FINANCE MAINTENANCE: Total expenditure £2013, of which amount £1054 was paid in salaries and wages. Receipts amounted to £2034. Government grants £647; donations £664; patients' fees £671, being the chief items. The year finished with a credit of £21.

CAPITAL ACCOUNT. Receipts: Donations £455, of this amount the Government gave £128. £543 was spent—£150 on completion of purchase of land for new hospital site, and £393 on major alterations and equipment. This account showed a credit of £1072 at March 31st.

I would like to express to the members of our auxiliaries, social club, churches, and school children and the public generally, a very deep sense of appreciation for help and co-operation during the year with an appeal for continued goodwill, understanding and financial assistance for the next twelve months.

We cannot have something of value in this life and appreciate it if we are not prepared to pay in some measure.

I know the people of Murtoa and district will be wholeheartedly behind their sub-committee in its forward movements this year in caring for the sick in their own public hospital.

REPORT OF LADIES' HOSPITAL AUXILIARY

In reviewing our year's activities we have, I think, reason to be satisfied with the result of our efforts, and to be grateful to our many friends for their co-operation.

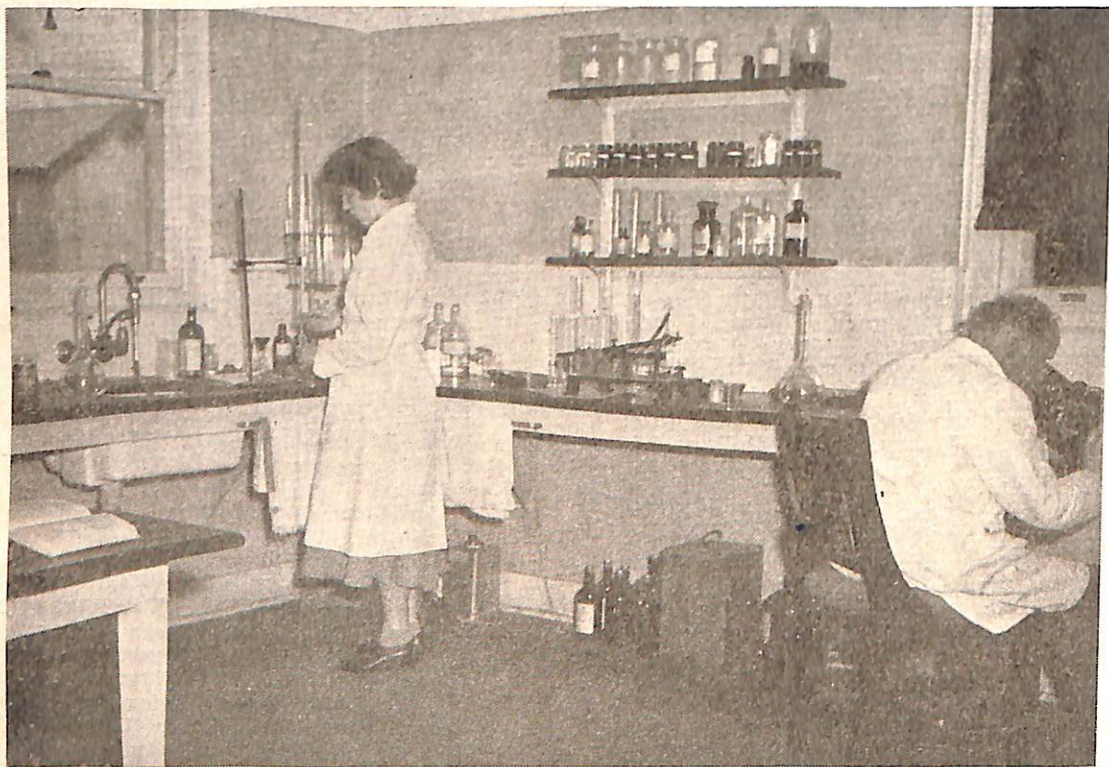
