
# "Charity is Justice"

Real charity, which is justice, sets about removing the conditions that make begrary, starvation and nakedness. Charity make the Old Man of the Sea feed sugar plums to the poor devil he is riding and chokin; justice would make him get off his victim's back. Charity swats the fly; justice takes away the dung heaps that breed flies. Charity gives quinine in the malarial tropics; justice drains the swamps. Char.ty sends surgeons and ambulances and trained nurses to war; justice struggles to secure that internationalism which will prevent war. Seventy-first Annual Report and Statement of Income and Expenditure for the Financial Year, 1944-1945

To the Governors and Contributors.

Ladies and Gentlemen :

On behalf of your Committee of Management we have pleasure in submitting this report dealing with Hospital activities for the past 12 months.

This year has seen stirring deeds and sterling results. V.E. Day has been eclebrated, and we feel V.P. Day will not be long in following such a lead.

The whole structure of our national life for nearly six years has been subordinated to winning a war, so that all sinews of our peaceful-politico-economic life can be co-ordinated to winning the peace.

In winning the peace, the work in which you are so largely interested must play its essential role. We know that you all want to see:

- 1. All men in work with security of tenure of such work.
- 2. All men enjoying good health.
- 3. All men with a sure knowledge that in old age, peace and reasonable comfort can be assured unto them.

We feel that the ideal of such wishes constitutes the main objects of war, in the fight for peace.

Our work deals with the second factor. Naturally at this moment, both individually and nationally, we are all striving to reach a solution of social and economic problems that will make this world a more peaceful and better world in which man can live.

As workers for Hospitals, are we satisfied with conditions existing to-day? Frankly No! Our main need is Finance. Does our system of Hospital Finance meet our needs? Frankly No! The term "balancing the budget" when we are "selling service" and restoring health to the sick in mind and body should be out dictionaried.

The value even from an economic view of our work, in restoring man as a fit unit to do his normal daily work, cannot be measured morally, economically or financially from the point of view of the welfare of the State.

To finance Hospitals, well wishers have to resort to many ways and means of raising money which the State deems illegal, and which ill befit the upholders of a system which many consider a sound one under which Hospitals should continue to be financed.

We believe that the time is ripe for a change. Even a Compulsory Contributory Scheme would not meet the full needs of all peoples, because full permanent tenure of work for all classes of the community is not an accomplished fact.

We are sincere in our belief when we say that the implementation of the Commonwealth Government Health Scheme in relation to patient admission to Hospital is a sound one, because by it all members of Society have already paid for the Social Service of health, before it was needed, on the actual amount of weekly earnings, or salaries received. We feel confident that this Scheme in its growth from its initial stages, will ultimately develop into one that will benefit all classes of the community and be one of tremendous value to the social and economic life of this country.

We conclude this introductory by a quotation from "Red Star" the Russian Army Paper as quoted by Maurice Hindus in "Mother Russia":—

"Whenever," Colonel Alexey Ryodorov writes, "I think of reasons for the self-sacrifice with which my fellow soldiers are fighting, there invariably arises before my eyes our family, and I know its the thought that behind the back of each fighting man there is his family—a home, old folk, a mother and father, little children. The thought of family stirs the courage and the fury with which they fight—a fury which can conquer everything, including death."

The health of the ordinary man, his family, his home, is now at crucible stage. Let us fight to have the best in health for man, for family, for home, and ir so doing, a healthy State and a healthy nation must inevitably result; for health typifies man at his best from embryo to the grave.

FINANCE.—The year has been a difficult one in many ways. Fluctuations are interesting. Government grant was £300 less. Other collections and donations were down £1000. Patients Fees show an increase of £700. On Expenditure side, Surgery and Dispensary, decrease of £200; Domestic Expenses, decrease of £500. Establishment charge less by £600—actually £300 less on account of depreciation entry of £914 last year. Increases in our expenses, I think, are general in that Provisions show an increase of £800 and Salaries and Wages, an increase of £1,250.

Our Total Ordinary Revenue this year being £25,254—£530 less than last year.

Our Total Ordinary Expenditure being £26,300 an increase of £807 on last year's figures.

On closing our books at the end of the Year, a debit of £1169/5/4 was transferred from Maintenance Account to Maintenance Fund Account.

Stocks of goods on hand are sound and at good value, and in the coming year, the Expenditure Account should benefit greatly from this source.

We feel that although a debit for the year has been incurred that a drive for funds this coming year from ordinary avenues will affect this debit balance.

BUILDINGS—PRESENT AND NEW.—The policy of the Government is shown by finance figures. £1,080 now being placed to the credit of our Building Sinking Fund Investment Account and £8,000 to the credit of a Building Investment Account—the nucleus of a fund from which our Hospital will be built and completed.

NEW BUILDINGS.—This year no work has been done; but as soon as hostilities cease, work on general Hospital Building Extensions should be commenced.

A point that should be stressed is that the building of extra Ward accommodation should be urgently noted in relation to Nurses' Home accommodation. We trust that in future Hospital Building Schemes, consideration will always be given to the contingent liability of both Nursing and Domestic Staff accommodation being equal to meet the increased patient accommodation demands.

T.B. CHALET.—The State Government has almost completed its new T.B. Chalet with accommodation for 14 patients, with verandah space, if required, for greater patient treatment. This building is a very fine one, and is a credit to the Government in its desire to cope with the nursing needs of T.B. patients in country meas.

PATIENTS.—Through our patients we sell service in all our various Hospital Departments, and by the carrying out of such service, the basis of our appeal for funds to the generous instincts of a generous people is created.

It is a very rare occasion when a Hospital Appeal does meet with a rebuff, because the Hospital is ever and always ready to help the sick, irrespective of financial status of the patient concerned.

As our Statements show 2.241 patients were treated. The daily average of patients being 102.58. The average stay in days of a patient being 16.07 days. During the Year 285 Major and 733 Minor operations were performed.

Our out-patients Department is not greatly used; but during the year 257 patients were treated. The numbr of attendances being 567.

STAFF.—Medical men could not do the work they do without Hospitals, and Ifospitals could not exist without Medical men. We are grateful for the services rendered to the community through the avenue of this Hospital by members of all our Honorary Professional Staff. Our thanks are due to Doctors Felsted, Henderson, Forsyth and Hutton Jones; Messrs. Lawrence, Dougall and Dalton; Messrs. McMullin, Ludbrook, Luker, Benallack and Mrs. Dorothy Roth, for another year of social service.

During the year our Resident Medical Staff has continued its seasonal change. Dr. Alan L. Bridge leaving to join the Services, and his place being taken by Dr. Ismail Rahman.

Matron Arthur still commands the Nursing Staff, and fortunately no great trouble has been experienced in keeping our trained staff. Difficulty is appearing on the horizon in the form of marriages and resignations, but with the help of Man-power Authorities these can be overcome. We thank Matron Arthur, Trained and Trainee Staff for another year of fine service to the Hospital.

The Committee is proud of the honour given to an ex-member of our Nursing Staff. Sister Madge Hateley, who left the Hospital to join the R.A.A.F. Nursing Service has been made the recipient of an Associate of the Royal Red Cross. Everyone at the Hospital offers her heartiest congratulations.

TOWN AND SHIRE GRANTS.—Your Committee is appreciative of the splendid co-operation shown in Hospital matters by the Town and Shires, particularly the Wimmera Shire for its fine yearly grant of £400. The Town of Horsham gives us £300 in cash, and many other means of help during the year. All our Councillors, we know are keenly appreciative of the work that the Hospital does for the community. The following is a list of Annual Grants:—Town of Horsham, £300; Wimmera Shire, £400; Dimboola Shire, £150; Dunmunkle Shire, £60; Arapiles Shire, £60; Kowree Shire, £50. Total, £1020.

VISIT OF THE PREMIER, HONOURABLE A. A. DUNSTAN, M.L.A.—During the year, Mr. Dunstan visited the Hospital, and the condition of the wards in the oid Hospital was such that with exclamation and decision, the Premier said, "Money must be granted for buildings to replace wards such as these."

The policy of the Government in helping country Hospitals and country centres generally is very greatly appreciated by people in rural areas.

THE LATE ANDREW COLVILLE.—It is with regret and a keen sense of loss that the Committee of Management refer to the death of the late Mr. Andrew Colville, Government Representative on the Committee of Management for over two years. His advice was sound, and he will be personally missed in the social service of Hospital work in this town and district.

LIFE GOVERNORSHIP CERTIFICATES.—During the year Life Governorship Certificates were granted to Mr. Isaac Draffin and Mrs. Jane Powell, of the Kupanyup Hospital Auxiliary, and Miss Elsie Davis, of Horsham, for loyal and signal service to the Hospital over a period of years.

Mis. R. E. Charles, Mr. Alex. McAuley and Mr. W. Carine, for services rendered to the Hospital by the Men's and Women's Branch of the Horsham R.S.S. & A.I L.A., through the agency of the Hospital Carnival Committee.

AUXILIARIES.—Staunch and loyal support has again been rendered by our main Auxiliaries. We refer to the Carnival Committee, Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary, Rupanyup Auxiliary and Murtoa Auxiliary, all of which have separate statements of accounts embodied in this report.

We would like to especially mention Mrs. James Anderson who this year raised over £500 herself, and handed the money in as part of the Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary Effort.

MATERNITY WARD.—We are particularly proud of our Maternity Ward. Competent observers on being shown over this Ward have upheld our opinion of its layout and value to the people. This Ward is under the control of Sister Crouch as Midwifery Sister. During the year 156 babies were born, that is one less than the previous year.

HOSPITAL WAR SAVINGS GROUP.—This means of helping the country is still a keen one at the Hospital. The present group is comprised of 94 members.

MR. D. S. WALLIS, A.C.A.A.—Mr. Wallis has been appointed to succeed the late Mr. Andrew Colville as Government Representative on the Committee of Management. We wish him well in his new work. His appointment dates for three years as from 27th June, 1945.

THE CHARITIES BOARD.—We say "Thank you" to the Board and its Executive Officer, Mr. McVilly, for help given during the year, also for the vision of the Board in placing Hospitals on a sounder footing regarding firstly, Property Accounts, and secondly regarding that appeal to Committee members in reference to administration, its needs, and its value as an integral and vital factor in Hospital management.

VICTORIAN HOSPITALS ASSOCIATION.—The value of our own Buying Agency has become very evident during the last few years, in fact without it. Hospitals would have found it difficult to carry on. We thank Mr. Loughlan and his Staff for prompt attention to our needs during the year.

WHO HELPED US AT THE HOSPITAL.—We have referred to the Auxiliaries and local town Committees which annually make an appeal on our behalf.

We now mention various organizations and personnel, and extend our grateful thanks to them for valued help and co-operation during the year. The Methodist Girls' Club, Women's Auxiliary R.S.S. & A.I.L.A. Horsham Sub-oranch, Christian Endeavour Society, W.C.T.U., C.W.A., the Catholic Women's Social Guild, the Girl Guides, brownies, Boy Scouts, pupils of Miss Norwood, Church of Christ Sewing Guild, Horsham Red Cross Society, Lutheran Ladies' Guild, and Mesdames Riley and Montgomery for weekly sewing visits, and a host of individuals who are always doing acts of kindness and helping the patients at the Hosptal.

It is the policy of the Hespital to always get in touch with Ministers of Religion by telephone whenever the patients need them. We know this procedure is appreciated by both the Ministers and the patients. We thank them for this very valued assistance in Hospital routine patient welfare and content.

We would like to thank the Press, particularly "The Horsham Times" for publicity given to Hospital matters, and also that paper and the following papers for free instribution of issues to patients in Hospital: "The Dimboola Banner," "The Dunmunkle Standard," "The Rupanyup Spectator," "The Kowree Advocate," "The West Wimm ra Mail," and "The Australian Worker."

#### DURING THE YEAR the Committee of Management agreed to:-

The appointment of G. Laurens Pty. Ltd. as Official Collectors for Hospital Outstanding Accounts.

The Nurses having an X-Ray examination twice a year as a guide to the health of Staff members.

The Building of a Special Sick Bay of five beds for members of the Nursing Staff.

The appointment of an Accountant to the Administration Staff. Mr. W. M. Coulston ultimately was appointed to that position.

The purchase of a Steam Press as extra Laundry Equipment at a cost of £220.

The suggestion that the New Nurses' Home when built, and is very urgently needed, should be named in honour of that splendid Hospital Worker in Horsham, Mrs. James Anderson, and be called "The Phoebe Anderson Nurses' Home."

The principle that Nursing Sisters in practice should on admission to Hospital as patients receive a ten per cent, rebate on the established charges for Interriediate patients.

The principle that as from 1st July, 1945, there should be a slight increase in tees in the New Building, and that patients are to be classified as Private, Semi-Private, or Intermediate according to ward bed accommodation.

The appeal of the people of Murtoa in conjunction with Government policy to take over the Hospital at Murtoa as an Annex Hospital.

And heartily supported the Charities Board in the finalization of its endeavours to institute a Staff Superannuation Scheme for all Hospital members.

FAGE TEN.

We would like to thank the members of the Office Staff for a year of service --carried out with kindness to all who go through the Office, and with a spirit of help-funess to all those who compose the life of a Hospital Community, personnel of which is. Misses E. Smith, R. Smith, E. Goddard, and Mrs M. Baud (temporary).

Finally, we would like to thank the Town Council Staff and the members of the two Town Bands for being ready at all times to help. We deeply appreciate the help of the business houses of the town which are always a source of ready help to many people who are raising money by way of entertainment for the Hospital.

We thank that big body of generous people who are always helping the needy, by actions only known to themselves.

As we write this report, we hear the cry, "the war is over," and "Peace has been declared."

It is with a deep sense of thankfulness to The Almighty, that in peace we finalise our year of work at the Hospital, and trust that with the willing and cooperative effort of the people of this town and district, our Hospital can soon be completed and stand as a monument of usefulness in a land of harmony and prosperity.
