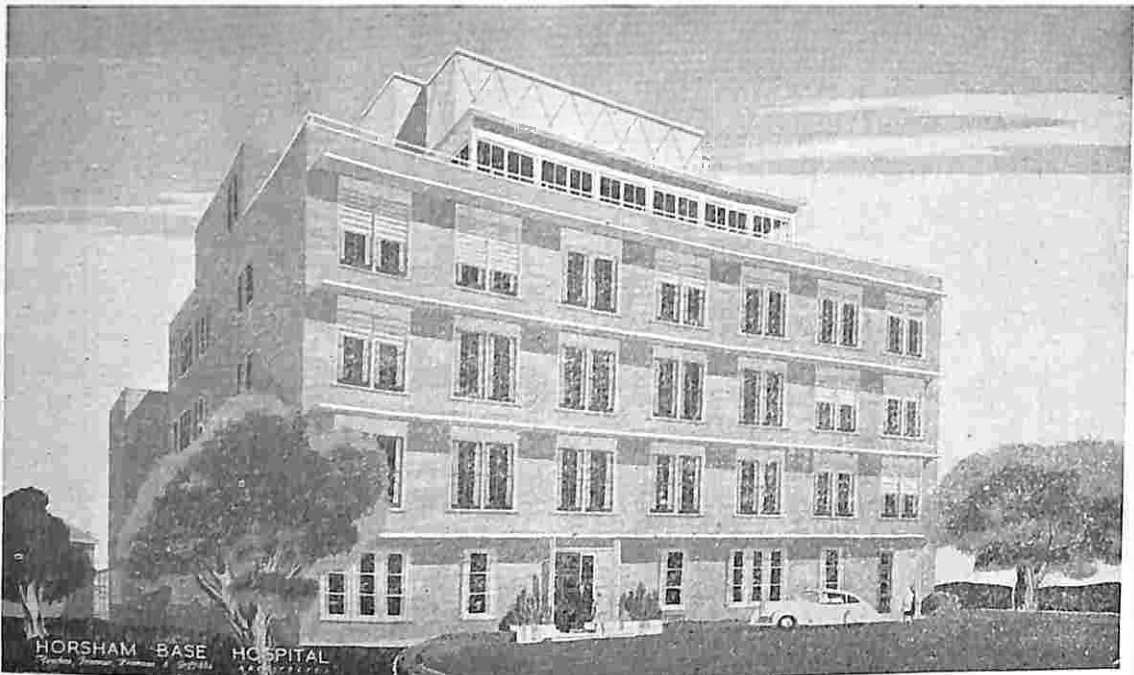

SIXTH-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT & STATEMENT OF RECEIPTS and EXPENDITURE FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1941-1942

To the Governors and Contributors.

Ladies and Gentlemen :

In presenting this Report to you on behalf of your Committee of Management, one salient point stands out this year against the ordinary routine work of the Hospital that has been faithfully and assiduously carried out by all the Departments concerned. I refer to our New Hospital Building, which now is a fact. We believe we are on the right road in creating something which will stand for several decades as a monument—alive and throbbing—helping all sections of the sick and afflicted in the Wimmera and District.

Finance.—We do our work because we pay our way. We pay our way because, first, a greater financial Government help to Hospitals is being given by the Government through the Charities Board. The Charities Board not only administers Government funds, but exercises a more than fraternal care towards each Hospital under its control. This factor has been of great help to us during the year. Secondly, a ready response from a generous public towards Hospital appeals, is always manifested. Thirdly, patients who use the Hospital are, in most cases, prepared to pay willingly on the basis of their ability to pay, and fourthly, the exercising of keen control over goods purchased and goods distributed. In regard to this section of Hospital work, the policy of Collective Buying by all the Hospitals in the State, inaugurated by the Charities Board, is one which, under present buying conditions, has meant existence on an even keel, instead of chaos to many Hospitals.

Our total Maintenance Receipts for the year were £13,415/2/5, Maintenance Payments being £13,495/12/3.

I would like to point out that Interest payments of £800 on Capital have been met and expenditure of £321/15/3 incurred and paid in reference to any contingency that might arise regarding transfer of Metropolitan Hospital Patients to this area.

Our work for the year shows a deficit of £80/9/10.

Finance dealing with the New Hospital Building is dealt with elsewhere in the Report.

Since the last Annual Meeting, one of your Committeemen, Mr. J. C. Gross, has resigned, and Mr. T. M. Sharry was granted leave of absence to 30/6/1942. The Committee of Management is now functioning at a body, controlled in its work under the Standard By-laws laid down by the Charities Board, and which have been accepted "in toto."

Staff.—Our Honorary Medical Staff has again completed another year of service at the Hospital, coupled with Military Duties. Dr. R. J. A. Henderson is on Active Service. Dr. G. Forsyth has resumed duties after Military Duties in parts of Australia. We express our thanks to Drs. Felstead, Forsyth and Hutton Jones for a spirit of co-operation in Hospital matters. During the year Dr. T. V. Walpole received the appointment as Resident Medical Officer, and resigned at the end of the year to take up Military duties, and Dr. J. B. Felstead has now been appointed Resident Medical Officer. We have been fortunate in acquiring such men to act as our Resident Medical Officers during this period. Professional Services in an Honorary Capacity have been carried out in their various sections by the following gentlemen, and we esteem, and are grateful for such willingness to help in this manner. We refer to our Honorary Dentists, Messrs. W. Lawrence, C. W. Dougall and Austin Dalton, and our Honorary Dispensers, Messrs. N. C. McMullin, R. A. Ludbrook, Reg. Luker and F. Benallack.

Our Nursing Staff, under Matron Arthur, has again carried out another twelve months of loyal service. The following Sisters of this Hospital are now on Active Service: Sisters M. M. Hateley, V. Weight, L. Carter, D. Hateley, D. Hair, N. Landrigan, D. Hodge, A. Simphton, B. Foster, E. Smart. The following Trainee Nurses have been successful in passing the Nurses Board Examination: Nurses M. Craig, J. Cross, B. Davidson, L. Fortington, A. Hatcher, D. Hobson, M. Hortle, E. Hyde, M. McCooke, J. McDonald, H. McDonald, V. Woolmer. The following trainee nurses have passed the first year's Professional Nurses Board Examination: Trainee Nurses Jean D'Alton, Nancy McInnes, Jean Stewart, Marion Edmonds, Marion Ervin, Moira Whelan, Velma Crafter, Patricia Fitzgerald and Marie Tepper.

The Domestic Staff has co-operated in all ways, enabling smooth running of Hospital routine. Mr. T. M. Margerison, our cook, was granted leave of absence, as he joined up as a member of the Australian Imperial Forces.

Patients Treated.—For the twelve months, 1765 patients were treated for a total number of patient days 28,991. Included in these totals are 152 mothers in the Midwifery Ward (this number includes seven re-admissions); 139 babies were born, with 4 babies born who died before discharge, and 2 still-born children.

The Infectious Block treated 82 patients, who were in Hospital for 1517 days. The daily average of patients treated was 79.43. The average stay in days of in-patients being 16.42.

Cost of Treatment.—The average cost per bed per annum was £163/16/1; the cost per occupied bed per day being £.4499, which equals 9/ per day.

The Kowree Shire Grant was passed for payment at the July meeting of the Council.

Visits of Importance.—We were glad to welcome during the year, His Excellency the Governor, Sir Winston Dugan and Lady Dugan, who visited the Hospital. The Premier of Victoria, the Honorable A. A. Dunstan, Esq., M.L.A., who laid the Foundation Stone of our New Building, and in addition we were glad of having the opportunity of welcoming the Chairman of the Charities Board, Mr. G. White, who (accompanied by Mr M. Saltau, a member of the Board and Mr. McVilly) paid the Hospital a visit of inspection.

Points of Interest and Desire.—We had hopes of completing the Hospital straightway; such hope has temporarily faded. Tentative talks regarding the building of a "T.B." chalet here appear to be crystallising. We endeavored to help regarding Medical Officer Shortage in the district. We are pleased at the growth of business now being done by the Victorian Hospitals' Association. Proposed Scheme Staff Superannuation is being held over for the time being. We are grateful for the co-operation of the State Rivers and Water Supply Commission re the Toolondo and Barton's Swamp scheme. The Coromby Brass Band Jubilee dinner was a great success. A new Institutional System of Account Keeping is to come into operation on July 1, 1942.

Life Governorship Certificates.—This year Life Governorship Certificates have been granted to the following persons: Miss Ruby Cathcart, Mrs. Wm. H. Shoebridge. Messrs P. C. Monaghan, C. A. Taberner, W. R. Robinson and W. P. Denholm.

The two main Auxiliaries—the Ladies' Auxiliary and the Carnival Committee, have their special Reports. We are very grateful to the Murtoa and Rupanyup Auxiliaries for splendid co-operation during the year. Further on in the Report a tabled Statement of Receipts and Expenditure and list of donors is given.

Our Helpers.—They are legion, and we value that quiet thought of appraisal of our work, which in the ultimate represents a tremendous force which, despite the seemingly apparent failures of our system, enables us to carry on our Hospital work and exercise an influence for good both from the point of view of the health of the Community and its very vital appendage—the economical well-being of the people. We think of, at this time, Mr. Baillie and his bandsmen, and their ready response to our call for help, and also the Pipers' Band who likewise help in our work, particularly through the Carnival Committee and its many avenues. The Apexians and their many acts of kindness towards our work during the year.

The Hospital is being helped every day by members of organisations and private individuals. We value such help and are grateful for it. Such organisations are: The 3HA Cheer Box, Ladies Church of Christ Sewing Guild, Methodist Girls' Club, Women's Auxiliary of the R.S.S. & A.I.L.A., Christian Endeavor, Women's Christian Temperance Union, Country Women's Association, the Women's Section of the United Country Party, The Catholic Women's Guild, The Brownies, The Women's Legion, Pupils of Miss Cox and Miss Norwood, Mr. Charles and Mr. Hoskin, who for years has sung to the patients every Sunday. The Schools—Their help is dealt with separately. We would like to mention the co-operation of the Headmaster of the High School, who gave his consent, and Mr. E. Sommerville and his boys who are making all trays required for the individual tray service in the New Hospital.

Finally, we would like to thank the Management and Office Staff for loyal support and co-operation throughout the year. We take this opportunity of thanking all the Clergy of the Town for their help in their own particular sphere of Hospital life. An ever-ready response to quick summons is noted, and visits of the "Padres" are looked forward to by the patients.

We thank "The Horsham Times" Pty. Ltd. for Press publicity, and also for copies of "The Horsham Times," and we acknowledge a like debt for papers received from the Proprietors of "The Dunmunkle Standard," "The Dimboola Banner," "Rupanyup Spectator," and "The Australian Worker."

We are passing through crucial and nerve wrecking times when only loyalty to our ideals and full-hearted endeavor in our work will enable us to win through to peace and justice for all.

We are very grateful to all our helpers for this year's accomplishment, and I trust that within a few weeks' time our New Hospital will be opened and be a boon to the Community.

LADIES' HOSPITAL AUXILIARY

ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR 1941-42.

It is with pleasure that I, as your President, present to you your Annual Report and Balance Sheet of our activities as a Ladies' Auxiliary working on behalf of our Base Hospital for the past year.

Our object, as an Auxiliary, is to assist the Committee of Management in its work, by first making known the great work of our Hospital, its needs, and co-opting the women of this town and district as helpers of this great Social Service in our midst.

The second part comes rather more easily when that is accomplished, and that is the raising of money to help meet the many sectional demands that are made every day on the Hospital.

We started this year's work conscious of all our national commitments, with the mental reservation that when the hearts of the people are touched as they are to-day, the spirit of giving will be more evident and pronounced than previously, and I am glad to say that such has proved to be true, as you will note on a perusal of the items in our Balance Sheet.

Our work and efforts this year resulted in £758/1/2 being raised, and with £2/7/4 Bank Interest, our total receipts for the year are £760 8/6, a most creditable effort.

It was felt that we might have a monthly effort for our funds, and in this way, over a period, Card Parties were held at the Town Hall, when £10/17/6 was raised, and our thanks are due to Mrs. G. Forsyth and Mrs. Bruce Clarkson, who kindly placed at our disposal the conveniences of their homes. These efforts helped us to the extent of £19/10/.

Mrs. James Anderson and Mrs. George Perring held a Card Party, and funds from this effort were embodied in the splendid returns which Mrs. Anderson so very kindly handed in to our Treasurer, the sum of £288/19/1. A truly magnificent result.

We received an excellent start on the road to a yearly financial success when the Horsham Trotting Club allowed us to conduct the Afternoon Tea Booth at its yearly fixture, when £9/14/ was taken, and with the addition of £9/15/ from the competitions held, our receipts from this gesture were £19/9/. We are very grateful to the Trotting Club, and also to Father Coughlin for his personal co-operation in this matter.

We are very pleased to report that the street collections show an increase this year of just over £20, the total amount received being £73/17/3. A most gratifying donation was received from the Ladies' Catholic Guild of Horsham, which held a combined Card Party and Stall afternoon in the Church Hall, as a result of which, we gratefully received an amount of £35.

This year embodied two special efforts which helped us tremendously. I refer first to the Dance held on our behalf by Mr. Monaghan, who was born in this town, and celebrated his 60th birthday by helping our Hospital through our agency and co-operation. The nett amount received from this Dance, Competitions and Shop sales was £161/11/4. We thank Mr. Monaghan and also Mr. H. L. Coburn, of Ballarat, who very kindly placed his shop in Firebrace street at our disposal.

Owing to general conditions, it was not considered a wise move to hold the Annual Hospital Ball this year, and this function, which I consider should, in normal times, be an outstanding social feature of this town, was reluctantly temporarily not held this season.

You know, after due thought, it was decided to hold a **Brick Day** to augment our funds and, personally, I feel this method of raising money now is a very sound one, especially if a concerted well-organised daily drive is made, for I know there are very few persons who would refuse to give the sum of 1/, the accumulation of which amount is the specific object of such a day and drive. We were most successful in our Brick Day Appeal, when £108/17/0 was received.

We had an opportunity of helping the Hospital at the laying of the Foundation Stone Ceremony of the New Hospital, when the Premier, the Honorable A. A.

Dunstan, Esq., M.L.A. performed the ceremony. The whole of the afternoon tea arrangements were left to the Auxiliary and our funds benefited to the amount of £12/10/.

Linen Day occasioned some concern and, after thought, our Yearly Linen Day was held, but a little later than usual, and a most useful parcel of goods was received and sent up to the Hospital, in addition to cash donations amounting to £5/17/0. We are very grateful to all those people who helped us on this day, because a certain sense of fear present before launching the appeal was soon banished by the kindness and thoughtfulness of the people.

Our final effort for the year was given to us by Miss Florence Taylor, whose concert in the Town Hall was enjoyed very much by a great audience. Another splendid sum of £20/9/0 was handed over as a donation towards our work.

We acquired some property this year, when it was decided to purchase half gross cups, saucers, and plates, which I consider good business. Prior to this purchase, we were loaned, free of charge, crockery by Messrs. H. Bartlett and P. Oates, and we thank them for this help.

During the year, three of our members have left the district. I refer to that stalwart worker, Mrs. E. France, who has done staunch work for us, and Mrs. Farron and Mrs. Kierce, new members who have linked up recently with our Auxiliary.

I would like to refer to Mrs. Grant's temporary resignation from the Committee. We all know her worth and we hope soon to have her back in the Committee Room again.

Two of our members have suffered from ill health during the year, Mrs. Rudolph and Mrs. Stewart, and we trust that they will soon be fully recovered and in normal health again.

This year, our most capable Honorary Treasurer, Miss Amy Bradshaw, passed away. We will sorely miss her, and I am suggesting that the incoming Committee carry out some suitable gesture as a mark of our love, and our esteem for her great work on behalf of this Auxiliary.

Our effort for the Carnival Committee this year was splendid, and I would like to thank all who helped, and also those women who so very kindly donated such a delightful collection of sweets.

During the year we have had willing co-operation of Matron Arthur and members of the Nursing Staff, and we particularly thank the nurses for the great help given to us during our street appeals. We would like also to acknowledge with thanks the help given to us by the Hospital Management.

As an Auxiliary, we offer our deepest sympathy to one of our greatest workers, Mrs. David Anderson, in the sad loss the family has sustained by the death of "Cam," her son, who was beloved by all who knew him.

I would tender to Miss Cathcart our thanks for her work as Honorary Secretary of this Auxiliary, which she is about to relinquish owing to her other activities in Home Service units.

Finally, I would like to thank all those members and supporters who have loyally upheld me in my position as President of this Auxiliary in carrying out another year's work, and I feel sure that the same loyal support will be given to the new President and her Executive.

I would like to thank the Auditor, Mr E. J. Wallis, for his honorary assistance, and also the "Horsham Times" for publicity given to our functions.

NEW BUILDING

We have pleasure in embodying in this Annual Report some notes of explanation by our Architects, Messrs. Yuncken, Freeman, Freeman & Griffiths.

We are grateful for donations received from our friends for Building Purposes and also to the Carnival Committee and the Ladies' Hospital Auxiliary for the large amounts received.

We would express our thanks to the Charities Board and Mr. McVilly for solving many problems. Our Architects, Messrs. Yuncken, Freeman, Freeman & Griffiths, for assiduous attention to the many matters requiring elucidation, and to the Contractor, Mr. R. F. Anderson, for carrying out his duties in creating a building to the satisfaction of all the parties concerned.

A new ward block has been completed to the north of the existing hospital on a site facing Baillie Street.

The building, constructed with reinforced concrete frame and brick walls and comprising five storeys served by electric passenger and food lifts, accommodates the administrative offices, complete kitchen services for the entire hospital, operating theatre group, maternity section, wards for 45 intermediate and private patients and living quarters for the matron and resident medical staff. A separate boiler house contains the equipment providing steam and hot water. New and existing buildings are linked with covered ways.

Ground Floor. A gravelled car sweep from Baillie Street leads to the two main doors. A public entrance hall gives access to the existing public wards, and the private entrance opens to a lobby where the lift and stairs lead to the upper floors containing the intermediate and private wards.

The administrative suite is planned with enquiry, secretary's and general offices adjacent to entrance halls.

Across the corridor is the matron's office, dispensary, records' room, auxiliary store and switch room. A waiting room is situated next to the diathermy section.

The large kitchen, airy and light, with rows of windows on two opposite sides, is equipped with a central bank of cooking appliances consisting of gas stoves, grillers, stock pots and jet pots grouped under a ventilated hood suspended from the ceiling. Round the central cooking area there are bays planned for pot scrubbing, general preparation, pastry making, preparation of bread and butter, toast and hot drinks, food trolley parking, tray storage, dish washing, dietitian's office, and special diet kitchen, all fitted with appropriate cupboards, sinks, racks, slicers, cookers and boilers. A group of separate rooms related to the kitchen are equipped as a fruit and vegetable room with sinks and automatic vegetable peeler, dairy with refrigerator, pasteurising machine and can washing trough, fish and meat room with refrigerator, chopping block and sink, dairy produce room with refrigerator and cupboards and lock-up store fitted with shelves and bins.

First Floor.—This floor is planned with five two-bed wards and a ward for four beds, with bathrooms and lavatories for men and women, utility and pan rooms. The nurses' station and flower room are placed in the lobby near the lift, and two food lifts from the kitchen serve the ward pantry. The southern wing of the "L" shaped plan is devoted on the first floor to the maternity section, including preparation room, two labour wards, sterilising room, birth room and nurseries with special infants' food preparation room.

Second Floor.—This plan has ward accommodation for 14 patients similar to the first floor and the southern wing is devoted to the two operating theatres with appropriate anaesthetizing room, sterilizing room, dressings preparation room, doctors' changing and shower rooms and scrub-up space, together with theatre, stretcher and instrument stores.

Third Floor.—The ward accommodation is repeated on this floor with typical duty and service rooms and, in the southern wing, are single bed and two-bed isolation wards with separate bathroom group and a workroom.

Fourth Floor.—A spacious solarium on the top floor has three sides of continuous windows and sliding doors opening to paved sun decks.

The matron's suite, comprising sitting room, bedroom and bathrooms, opens to a separate sun deck. There are two bedrooms, bathroom and a sitting room for resident medical officers.

Above the fourth floor rises a large pent house to contain the lift machinery, large storage tanks for hot and cold water and the sterile water still.

Except where paved with tiles or granolithic as in the kitchen and service rooms, floors are finished with rubber matting and linoleum flush with granolithic wall coving.

The whole of the interior has been planned in a range of pleasant colors. A soft green is used in all corridors and the wards are varied in ivory, blue, silver grey and green with contrasting ceiling colors. Furniture coverings and curtains have been selected to match each individual scheme.

Every patient has a built-in wardrobe and radio outlet and telephone service is also available. All rooms facing north have metal louvred shutters with a handle in the room for raising and lowering. In addition, the windows are protected by continuous concrete hoods at each floor.

The present building represents only a part of a scheme of future development, and has been planned for expansion by the addition of multi-storey wings at either end and a second wing to the south.
