Sixty-Seventh Annual Report and Balance Sheet
for the Financial Year 1940-41

To the Governors and Contributors.

Ladies and Gentlemen :

The Committee of Management of the Horsham Base Hospital has pleasure in presenting to the Governors and Contributors of the Institution the Annual Report, which shows the Hospital's activities for the year ending 30th June, 1941, together with all audited statements of accounts thereto.

A sense of apprehension was evident in the minds of members at the beginning of the year, but it was allayed by the fact that :

- (a) Government help,
- (b) Charities Board sympathetic consideration of presentation of firm cases for assistance.

(c) Continued support of a charitably minded people, were well in evidence and the year finished with a small credit. Some percentage of this factor must be credited to the effect, on both sides of the ledger of collective Buying, through the Victorian Hospitals' Association.

Finance.—Receipts totalled £13,265.4/6—up £190 on last year's figures. There were little variations regarding Sectional Headings, but we do note with pleasure that the charitable donations exceed last year's figures by £380. A fine effort in war time. The Social Service fabric of the State, we know will be maintained by both the Government and private persons during this nation crashing age.

Payments.—Payments, £13,227/19/1—£346 greater than last year's figures. Sectional Headings are an indication. These show a rise—Provisions £137, Surgery and Dispensary £150, Domestic £268, Salaries and Wages £160, Establishment £181.

We feel that your support for our work will not be stinted on reading of our position at the end of this financial year. Close observance was kept on expenditure, but full endeavor in every department was made in serving and administering to the needs and sickness of all patients admitted to the Hospital.

New Buildings—After careful consideration of:—

- (a) The need of the Public.
- (b) The National War Effort.
- (c) Close collaboration with the Charities Board.

Your Committee decided to start the first section of a complete New Hospital. Briefly the financial position is this. We have been granted a Government Grant of £20,000 and a Charities Board grant of £10,000, and we have accepted the responsibility of a Government loan of £20,000 at 4 per cent. and a further amount of £5,500 has to be raised.

We have already been granted an allowed amount of £4,500 against sectional buildings already erected, but feel sure that we have the whole-hearted support of every member in this Base Hospital area. Your New Building will stand as a monument of service to your people, and to Wimmera children yet unborn.

Its Need.—During the year, 1925 in-patients and 218 out-patients were treated, a total of 2143 persons for the year. There were 31,003 patient days to be accounted for at 8/6 per day, which was the cost of treatment. This statement shows our want, and we know our solicitations will be clearly answered. The Daily Average of Patients treated was 85.02.

During the year your Committee lost the services of Mr. R. G. W. Brett and Mr. G. W. Bright, who have both left the district. We thank them for their services, particularly Mr. Brett, who for three years was the President of this Committee of Management.

This year the war has affected our Medical Staff, each of our Honorary Medical Officers has taken his turn in Militia Camps, and one of their number has enlisted in the A.I.F. and is now in Malaya. We are grateful for another year of hospital work carried out under difficult arrangements. We thank Drs. Felstead, Henderson, Forsyth, and Hutton Jones accordingly, and we wish Dr. McLennan well, he having resigned from his position of Resident Medical Officer to enlist in the Militia forces preparatory to joining with the A.I.F.

Nursing Staff.—Our thanks are due to the members of our Nursing Staff, under Matron Arthur, for another year of loyal service. Since last Annual Meeting the following Trainee Nurses have passed the Nurses' Board's Examination: Misses L. Sutton, J. Hallam, G. Dymke, G. Billing, N. Landrigan, A. Heard, G. M. Hateley, G. Schache and E. Wood. We offer them our congratulations.

We are grateful for the professional services of Messrs. W. Lawrence, C. Dougall and A. Dalton, as well as those of Messrs. N. C. McMullin, R. A. Ludbrook, R. Luker, W. McCoy and F. I. Benallack. Mr. McCoy has left the district. We express our thanks to these gentlemen for their Honorary work at the Hospital. Our Maternity Ward saw the birth of 143 babies this year, and the added accommodation in the New Hospital Buildings is eagerly awaited. Sister R. Courtney is Sister-in-charge, and our X-ray work is done by Sister M. Hateley as X-ray Technician.

We have received Charitable Allocations as follows:—Town of Horsham, £300; Wimmera Shire, £350; Dimboola Shire, £120; Dunmunkle Shire, £60; Arapiles Shire, £60; Kowree Shire, £27. A total of £917.

Infantile Paralysis After Care Section.—This unit was closed early in the financial year, and we thank Mrs. E. C. Natrass, who in an Honorary capacity conducted an I.P.A.C. outpatients' clinic at the Hospital for the children in this area.

General.—A Host of Helpers.—We mention elsewhere our two main Horsham Auxiliaries: The Ladies' Auxiliary and the Carnival Committee. We think of our loyal and staunch friends at Murtoa and Rupanyup for another year of help. The Town Band always ready—and the Apex Club on the alert with the Match appeal, car drives for patients and Apple Collection Day.

The Schools we mention elsewhere, but its Egg Appeal is of tremendous help to us. Closely allied with the Hospital is the work of all the Ministers of the various religious bodies in the town, who unremittingly attend to the spiritual needs of the patients at any hour of the day or night.

Our Associations.—Mr. W. Robinson's death was felt by all Hospital Executives. To his successor, Mr. W. Loughlin, we will give our full co-operation. Our sympathy is expressed to our Bendigo friends in the great loss sustained in the Hospital field by the passing on of Mr. Jim Walshe.

We value the co-operation of the Charities Board and its Chief Executive Officer, Mr. McVilly, who we know will always listen to our problems, and suggest a way out to the Committee, who are sometimes befogged.

We appreciate the publicity given to our meetings by The Horsham Times Pty. Ltd., and we thank the management for its free copies to the patients, likewise the "Dunmunkle Standard," "The Dimboola Banner," "The Rupanyup Spectator," "The Australian Worker."

Every week, almost every day, there are members of various organisations at the Hospital, as well as private individuals, quietly and unostentatiously doing deeds of kindness.

We think of the Methodist Girls' Club, 3HA Cheer Box, Christian Endeavor members, Women's Section R.S.S. and A.I.L.A. Horsham, W.C.T.U., Ladies Church of Christ Sewing Guild, C.W.A. Horsham, Women's Section of the U.C.P. Horsham, The Brownies, Catholic Women's Guild, Pupils of Miss Cox and Miss Norwood and a host of kind-hearted people. To them all we extend our thanks on behalf of an institution which needs, and appeals, for such help continuously.

We were glad to give our Assistant to the Ouyen Committee of Management, where Mr. E. A. France has been appointed Manager and Secretary. To the members of the Office Staff a sense of appreciation is due for unalloyed support in carrying out their duties loyally and without demur.

We are grateful to our Domestic Staff which renders its due towards the satisfactory working of a composite Hospital Unit.

Many times we faltered, but continued on our way, and at the 30th June we finished our financial year with a credit of £37/5/5. We look to your help again this year, which augurs well, for continued support towards our Horsham Base Hospital.

In conclusion, I want to refer to the work of our Manager and Secretary. His advice to me has been sound, his judgment in buying keen, and his knowledge of hospital needs and management has been a great boon to the Committee. I know that, despite his medical officer's advice, he has continued duty at the Hospital after seven months in bed, as the result of his most unfortunate accident.

Personally, I cannot thank him enough for his work and advice regarding the fittings, etc., of the new Hospital.

He is to be congratulated on his work and, on behalf of my Committee, I want to express our appreciation for a year of excellent service.

Efforts for 1941

The Ladies' Auxiliary of the Horsham Base Hospital has worked untiringly during the past year, and this was disclosed at the annual meeting of the committee held in the Town Hall on Tuesday afternoon, when the fine sum of £380 was handed over to an official of the institution. The need for more members was expressed in view of the heavy year which is ahead, and any women who desire to join the auxiliary will be very welcome.

The minutes of the last annual meeting were read and confirmed, after which the treasurer's report was read by Miss G. Richards in the absence of Miss A. Bradshaw.

The president, Miss June Bolton, stated that the sum of £383/7/ had been raised during the year, which was the best return for four years, truly a fine effort considering the calls made upon the public in this time of war.

She then presented her annual report, extracts of which are as follows:—

During the past year we have continued our activities in the interests of the Horsham Base Hospital. It is very pleasing to note that, owing to the co-operation of the committee and various persons interested in our efforts, we are able to raise £383/7/. This amount we consider is very satisfactory owing to the fact that so many calls are now made on behalf of various war appeals. Our first effort, the annual ball, raised £30 15/, which was quite good when it is realised that the committee decided to reduce the price of the tickets to enable a larger body of the public to support the ball. The thanks of the committee goes to those women who lent their homes for the purpose of holding bridge parties, from which the sum of £33/4/11 was raised. The dance and flag bridge evening conducted by the staff of the Commercial Hotel proved a wonderful success and the sum of £73 was handed in. We appreciate the contribution very much. The sponsors of "Three Smart Girls" mannequin parade kindly handed the sum of £10/5/1 to our secretary, being the collection taken up at the afternoon and evening performances. Street collecting was again undertaken by the various members of the committee, to whom we extend our appreciation; the goodly sum of £210/16/10 was the result of these collections. The Linen Day appeal for 1940 was held on October 25th and proved most successful, the donations in goods being of an excellent standard. Cash donations for this appeal and other occasions totalled £6/10/. The committee of the Horsham Race Club gave us the opportunity of conducting the luncheon and afternoon tea stalls at the race meeting held on February 8th. We desire to express our thanks to the women who assisted at the booth and also to Mr. Taberner, who made the acceptance of the offer possible. The day's takings amounted to £14/3/. The committee was again approached by the Horsham Hospital Carnival Committee regarding the sweet stalls at the bazaar, and it was consented to run the stall again, with the result that approximately £16 will be handed over to the secretary of that committee. We regret our able secretary, Mrs. A. Griffiths, asked to be granted leave of absence for several months, but, however, we were fortunate that Miss Ruby Cathcart offered to carry on with the secretaryship in her absence. We hope it will not be long before our efficient treasurer, Miss A. Bradshaw, is well enough to be with us again. There is also another body to whom I would like to express the thanks of the committee, and that is the Matron and staff of the institution for which we are working. Upon several occasions they have come to our assistance and greatly helped the committee. We are urgently in need of new members to assist our willing helpers, and I ask you all to use your best endeavors to interest others in this committee and so become members. The committee must carry on as usual, despite the loss of several members during 1940 and the many calls upon the public. Our thanks are also extended to Mr. D. S. Wallis, who audited the books,

A pleasing feature of the meeting was the handing over of the cheque (£380), representing the year's work. Owing to pressure of business, the president (Mr. H. Smith) was unable to be present, and a vice-president (Mr. T. Conroy) received the cheque in his stead.
