Foreword

The Horsham Base Hospital was founded in the year 1874, the founders of the Hospital commencing a magnificent work, which has been carried on by those who have followed after. From a modest beginning, the Hospital has grown, until to-day the buildings are of a most extensive nature, and the probable cost of erection to-day would exceed £40,000. Added to this amount is the value of the equipment approximately £10,000, so that we have assets to-day aggregating £50,000. Whilst some assistance has been received from the Government to erect the building s, it is to the credit of the people of the district that most of the cost has been found by them.

The area from which patients are drawn is a particularly large one, excluding from the South Australian border in the west to Glenorchy, and from Rainbow and Hopetoun in the north to Balmoral in the south. Towns included in this area are Nhill, Dimboola, Jeparit, Rainbow, Hopetoun, Beulah, Warracknabeal, Minyip, Rupanyup, Murtoa, Natimuk, Goroke and Edenhope.

T_he main Municipalities served by the Hospital are: Town of Horsham, Shires of Wimmera, Dimboola, Dummunkle, Arapiles and Kowree.

SIXTY-FIRST ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED JUNE 30 1935

TO GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS. Ladies and Geutlemen

In presenting to you the sixty-first Annual Report and Statement of Receipts and E xpenditure, the Committee of Management notes with great pleasure the magnificent support which has been given by residents of our large Hospital district.

FINANCE.—In the Maintenance Account the year commenced with a credit balance of £5.6/13/11. The total receipts for the year were £6723, the major items being Government Grant £2125, which is an increase on last year's amount; patients' fees totaled £1982, a decrease from the previous year of £200; Municipal Grans, £947, showing an increase of £15. Other main items, such as Annual Carnival and Ladies' Committee are dealt with in a separate paragraph. The total expenditure was ± 6687 , which is ± 249 less than for last year. The ordinary expenses remained at practically the same figure as previously, but less money was spent on repairs and renovations. The Maintenance Account at the close of the year stands at $\pm 93/2/8$ in credit, which must be considered as most satisfactory.

BUILDING .- There is a very decided improvement in the Building Account. At the commencement of the year the debit balance was £783/15/9 and at the end of the current year the total indebiedness has been refned to £412/8/3. An amount of £200 was made available by the Charities Board and we are very grateful for this as stance. The sum of #141/1776. $\pm 141/17/6$ W as received in donations and ± 30 was transferred from the M & m.t. ... Mamarice Account. nace by the Carnival Committee to district residents. Now that the account is down to a comparatively low figure, we are hopeful that the year 1935 at white a comparatively low figure. We are hopeful that the year 1935-36 will see the complete liquidation of it. Buildings have been kept in a s good repair as possible, but with such a large block of buildings we may expect to spend some money each year on up-keep.

MOSPITAL CARNIVAL. -The 1935 Hospital Curmival was again conducted by the Carn val Committee, which performs, each year, a great work, and by enlisting the services of practically every organisation in Horsham. accomplishes much. This year the ret return was approximately £650. This amount is in excess of that of last year and is accounted for by the fact that, a appeal was made to district residents, the amount raised being onled to the Building Account. To all who assisted in making this annual effort a success we lender our sincere thanks. This annual effort is alsolutely necessary in order that the Hospital may be satis-factorily fin are d. for without this revenue it would be impossible fo neet the expenditure incurred.

MUNICIPAL GRANTS.- Agam we record with thanks the splendul assistance given by the municipalities in our Hospital area. This support must be et m spiel as one of the outstanding features of the year's work. The a nount required, £947, is £155 in excess of last year, accounted for by the fact that the Shire of Dimboola increased the grant by this amount. Details of amounts received are-

- **PATIENTS.**—The total number of in-patients treated for the year was 1324. whice is slightly in excess of last year, when 1317 were treated. The daily average was 63.34, as against 65.47 for last year. Out-patients numbered 97, making the total of patients treated 1421. Fees collected from patients anounted to £1982, and this shows a marked decrease from last year, when £2188 was collected. Every effort is made to collect fees from patients, but during this year at least one out of every three patients admitted is either a sustenance worker or his dependant. This, of course, narrows the field for collection very considerably and until our unemployed can be placed in full time work we cannot hope for any great improvement under this heading. The average cost per occupied bed for the year was £103.66, wich is lower than for last year, when it was £106.
- MATERNITY WARD.—In this section of the Hospital 106 babies were born, or 18 less than last year. 'This section is very ably managed by Sister D. Eyres, who also successfully conducts a Baby Health Clinic on two afternoons each week.
- HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.—We again express our thanks to our Honorary Medical Officers, Drs. H. W. Charlton, G. R. Felstead, G. Forsyth and R. J. A. Henderson, for the valued services they have given during the year. It is impossible to estimate the value of their work and the splendid manner in which day attend to the patients and co-operate with this Committee is outstanding.
- HONORARY DENTISTS.—The Honorary Dentists, Messrs, R. S. Grant, W. Lawrence and C. W. Dougall, have again given splendid service during this year, and we tender sincere thanks for their co-operation.
- HONORARY DISPENSERS.—The Honorary Dispensers. Miss N. Howard. Messrs D. Grey, N. C. McMullin and C. H. Peacock, have carried out the dispensing at the Hospital in a splendid manner. Visiting the Hospital one night per week in rotation, their work is of great value to this Committee. Before the cluse of the financial year, we were pleased to be in a position to offer the Dispensers a small sum each in r e conti on of their services.
- **TRAINING SCHOOL FOR NURSES.**—One of the most important functions of public hospitals is the training of Nurses. This aspect of lospital service is mostly passed un-noticed by the community, and yet it is of vital importance to everybody because it provides or 0 the most essential arms for social service. Public hospitals are deriving of support because they are the training schools for nurses who serve all classes of the community. This Hospital claims a unique record, for, during the past 16 years, there has been an unbroken succession of successful candidates at final examinations. On an average, four nurse; complete their training each year at this hospital, in d this g ar we record with pleasure that the following nurses successfully completed their training and have taken their place in the community as fully trained nurses—Misses I. Millar, A. G. Robertson, G. Horner, P. Butcher, G. Hately.

NURSING STAFF.—We wish to again place on record the worldernil services rendered during the year by the Matron (Miss G. M. Arthur), Sisters and Nurses. This has been a very busy year from a nursing standpoint, and the staft has in every way accomplished a great work. The work of our Matron calls for special mention, and her keen interest in the affairs of the Hospital and for the patients' welfare was outstand-

ing.

LADIES' COMMITTEE.—Under the presidency of Mrs. James Barnes Mayoress of Horsham) this Committee had a most successful year. Landing over the sum of £320; in addition a very successful Linen Day was conducted, when goods to the value of £60 were handed over. The Committee also assisted the Carnival Committee by conducting the sweets stall at the carnival. These results are very gratifying to all, and our best thanks is accorded to the President and all the members of her Committee. Mrs. C. Schmidt, who performed the secretarial work for 1934, did not seek re-election this year, and Miss G. Richards is capably filling the position. The services of Mrs. Schmidt during her term of office are very much appreciated.

- **INFECTIOUS UNIT.**—The Health Department has now given approval to the Municipal Group, for the renovation and equipping the Infectious unit, and the work will shortly be proceeded with. Half the cost will be borne by the Health Department and half by the Municipal Group. It is very necessary to keep before the minds of all interested the importance of having such a unit in a centrally situated position ; also it is well worthy of consideration how far the means supplied by this Hospital safeguards the community. During the year this Committee entered into an arrangement with the Honorary Medical Officers for the treatment of all infectious cases coming to the Hospital.
- AMBULANCE SERVICE.—This service has again been freely used during the year, and we are pleased to report that the account closes with a small credit balance after all accounts have been met. Donations of £25 from the Horsham Town Council and £15 from the Returned Soldiers' League have made this position possible, and our thanks are due to these two bodies for their financial assistance. To the Honorary Driver, Mr. J. Baulderstone, we again express sincere thanks for his untiring service; no praise can be too high for the valuable work so freely and gratuitously performed by this gentleman.
- DISTRICT COMMUTTEES.—Members of district committees have again kept the needs of the Hospital before residents and have accomplished much. At Murtoa, a very active Committee has again raised f101, and this result is a tribute to the members. At Rupanyup, the Committees, by sustained effort, raised the sum of £65, which must be regarded as outstanding. The Dimboola Committee has forwarded £50, which is the best contribution from this centre for some time. We feel confident that this centre will maintain their efforts on our behalf. At Gorok e, the Hospital Sunday appeal realised £28, and a similar effort at Natimuk realised £13. For local reasons, the Committee at Rainbow has postponed the annual effort until later, but a progress payment of £6/6/ has been received from this centre. In our own immediate country districts many efforts were this centre. - We feel that there are other centres which could help, and hope that, during the coming year, we will receive offers of assistance. "Io all our outposts we accord very sincere thanks for splendid co-operation and support.
- SCHOOLS' APPEAL.—The Schools of the district have again responded well to the appeal organised by the Inspector of Schools (Mr. E. B. Pederick) and the Honorary Secretary of the Appeal (Mr. C. Freeman). Goods and cash amounting to £225 have been received, and this must be considered as a wonderful result. In the four years that this scheme has been in existence, the sum of £847 has been raised—a great achievement. To all who assisted in making this result possible, we extend our thanks.
- WOOD DAY.—Mr. G. W. Cochrane again organised a very success ful Wood Day, when the result was most satisfactory. Wood fuel is a very big item during the year, and the help received from this effort helps considerably in reducing the fuel account. To Mr. Cochrane, donors and helpers we accord thank s.
- **TRANSPORT**,—During the year we have been assisted in our work of visiting country centres by having motor transport made available by Horsham residents. This has been a particularly heavy year and approximately 3700 car miles have been covered. To all who so willingly responded to our requests for assistance we express thanks.
