FOREWORD

---:0::----

The Horsham Base Hospital was founded in the year 1874, the present year commemorating the Diamond Jubilse of the Institution.

The founders of the Hospital commenced a magnificent work, which has been carried on by those who have followed after. From a modest beginning, the Hospital has grown, until to-day the buildings are of a most extensive nature, and the probable cost of erection to-day would exceed £40,000. Added to this amount is the value of the equipment, approximately £10,000, so that we have assets to day aggregating £50,000. Whilst some assistance has been received from the Government to erect the buildings, it is to the credit of the people of the district that most of the cost has been found by then.

The area from which patients are drawn is a particularly large one, extending from the South Australian border in the West to Glenorchy, and from Rainbow and Hopetoun in the North to Balmoral in the South. Town included in this area are Nhill, Dimbeola, Jeparit, Rainbow, Hopetoun, Beulah, Warracknabeal, Minyip, Rupanyup, Murtoa, Natimuk, Goroke and Edenhope.

The main Municipalities served by the Hospital are: Town of Horsham, Shires of Wimmera, Dimboola, Dunmunkle, Arapiles and Kowree.

SIXTIETH ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30th JUNE, 1934.

TO COVERNORS and CONTRIBUTORS.

LADIES and GENTLEMEN-

In presenting to you the 60th Annual Report and Statement of Receipts and Expenditure, the Committee of Management notes with pleasure the magnificent support which has been given by the residents of the districts served by the Hospital. This year marks the 60th anniversary of the founding of the Hospital, and it is very fitting that the year has been marked with success, as the following paragraphs will show.

FINANCE.—In the Maintenance Account we commenced the year with a credit balance of £274/10/6, and, as it was anticipated that there would be an increase in expenditure, this was a very valuable asset. As in past years, we have received a most generous response to all appeals, and we report with pleasure that the total receipts amounted to £6718/4/1. The main item of receipts was in-patient fees, which totalled £2188/8/6, the highest figure yet reached. The Government Grant totalled £1938, and the Municipal Grants £932. The total expenditure was £6936/0/8, which is larger than for previous years. This is attributable to several reasons. In the first place, the total number of patients treated, 1415, was 117 in excess of the previous year's total, and included in the number was an unprecedented number of diphtheria cases, which are very expensive to treat. Supplies of linen had become so depleted that it was found necessary to expend over £200 on this item. During the year very necessary repairs, renovations and alterations were found necessary, and these absorbed approximately £280. As has already been reported to you, your Committee was able to recompense the Honorary Medical Officers for their out of pocket expenses incurred in making visits to the Hospital to attend to patients, and the sum of £400, covering the period 1932-33, and the year under review, 1933-34, was expended on this item.

During the coming year we anticipate that the expenditure will not be so heavy as this year, but subscribers can be assurred that any money made available will always be judiciously handled.

The average cost per occupied bed has risen from £101 to £105.

BUILDING ACCOUNT—The position of this account again shows a great improvement. At the commencement of the year the debit balance was £1200/6/2, and at the close of this year our indebtedness is £783/15/9. An amount of £200 was made available by the Charities Board, and the sum of £197/0/5 was received from the "Sun News Pictorial" Obstinate Artist Competition. Another contribution of £20 was received from the estate of the late Denis Murphy. We are hopeful during the coming year to see this debit again reduced

During the year several necessary renovations, alterations, and repairs were carried out. Owing to the busy nature of the Hospital, it was found that one operating theatre was insufficient, and alterations were made to the existing out patients' theatre. We now have a most useful second theatre, and any congestion in the main theatre has now been obviated. Repairs and renovations were also carried out to the Maternity Ward, and provision was made for the suitable accommodation of infections cases on verandahs. The preparing of plans and specifications for these works was in the hands of the Honorary Architect, Mr. C. W. Macdonald, who also supervised the work. We are deeply indebted to this gentleman for his splendid co-operation. The matter of renovating and equipping the Infectious Block is now receiving attention. Plans and specifications have been prepared by Mr. Macdonald. and are now with the Health Commission for approval. A group of Municipalities, with the Mayor of Horsham, Cr. J. Barnes, as President, and the Town Clerk, Mr. W. P. Pryor, as Secretary, is making arrangements for this work. When this work is completed we will be well fitted up, and the care of the infectious cases will be undertaken under most excellent conditions.

HOSPITAL CARNIVAL—The 1934 Hospital Carnival was again conducted in March by the Hospital Carnival Committee. Despite many difficulties the net return of £560 must be considered an excellent one, and our best thanks are due to those ladies and gentlemen who assisted in any way with the effort. As in previous years an amount of £25 was allotted from these funds to the Ambulance Fund.

MUNICIPAL GRANTS—We would again record with thanks the wonderful assistance given by the Municipalities of our Hospital area. Despite very difficult times, members of the various councils have been able to again come to our assistance with splendid grants. This continued support from municipal bodies is one of the outstanding features of our year's work.

ENTERTAINMENTS—This year we have again received splendid support from this source. Apart from the Carnival receipts, which are referred to elsewhere, we have received excellent assistance in Horsham and neighbouring districts. This year has seen many new efforts in the country districts, where we have found the residents ready to organise and conduct entertainments on our behalf. It has been our pleasure to attend many of these functions when the thanks of this committee have been conveyed to all who assisted. We are hope that during the year other centres will fall into line and offer to conduct some function on behalf of the Hospital.

PATIENTS—The total number of in-patients treated for the 12 months was 1317, which is a record in the history of the Hospital. Last

year the total was 1196. The daily average was 65.47, which figure is the highest yet reached. Out-patients numbered 98, making the total number of persons treated 1415. We are pleased to report that the fees from patients have also reached a record figure, namely, £2188/6/6.

- MATERNITY WARD—This section of the Hospital has again been very busy, 124 births being recorded during the year, or an increase of 30 from the previous year.
- X-RAY DEPARTMENT—'This department has experienced a busy year, and has been of great assistance to the Honorary Medical Officers in their work. During the year a tablet was unveiled in memory of the donor of the equipment, the late Mr. John Russell. The function was attended by representatives of the Russell family, members of the committee and other representative citizens.
- STAFF—We wish to again place on record the magnificent service rendered during the year by the Matron (Niss G. M. Arthur), Sisters and Trainees. This has been a particularly busy year from a nursing point, and the splendid service given by all is highly appreciated. Our Matron has at all times shown a particularly keen interest in the welfare of the patients and the Hospital generally, and we are grateful for her co-operation.
- HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF—We again express our sincere appreciation of the valuable services given during the year by the Hon. Medical Officers, Drs. H. W. Charlton, G. R. Felstead, G. Forsyth and R. J. A. Henderson. They have, at all times, and often at great inconvenience attended to the needs of the patients, and we thank them for this splendid service. This Hospital is very fortunate in having such excellent Honoraries.
- HONORARY DENTISTS—The Honorary Dentists, Messrs, R. S. Grant W. Lawrence and C. W. Dougall, have again rendered valuable service to the Hospital, and we convey to them our sincere thanks.
- HONORARY DISPENSERS—During the year a sub-committee conferred with the chemists of Horsham to discuss the subject of dispensing at the Hospital. After discussion, the chemists offered to carry out this work in an honorary capacity, visiting the Hospital in turn one night per week. This splendid offer was accepted and the thanks of the committee conveyed to the chemists, namely, Miss N. Howard, Messrs. D. Grey (manager for Mr. J. Barnes), N. C. McMullin and C. H. Peacock, The new system is working satisfactorily, and we are greatly indebted to the chemists for their splendid co-operation.
- LADIES' COMMITTEE—This committee again functioned splendidly during the year, and in addition to handing over a cheque for £277/4/3, conducted a most successful Lineu Day, when a splendid collection of articles was received. To the retiring President, Mrs. L. Hutchesson, and the retiring Hon. Secretary, Mrs. H. G. Hodges, and members of the committee we extend sincere thanks. The Committee has again formed this year with the Mayoress, Mrs. J. Barnes as President, and Mrs. C. Schnidt, Secretary, and are doing excellent work.

- AMBULANCE SERVICE—This service has again been of great assistance to the town and district. Our financial worries are now relieved, as we receive from the Carnival funds enough money to make up the deficiency in any year. This year the sum of £25 was made available. We are again indebted to the Horsham Town Council for the annual grant of £25, and to the honorary driver, Mr. J. Eadderstone, for his tireless service. This gentleman has attended all calls and in addition takes a great pride in the appearance of the car.
- DISTRICT COMMITTEES—We are extremely grateful to the members of our district committees for the excellent work that has been accomplished during the year. At Murtoa, a very live committee keeps the needs of the Hospital before the public, and the result of the year's work, £101, is a splendid tribute to the work of the committee. At Rupanyup, the newly formed committee has done excellent work, and in 12 months we have received the sum of £100 from this centre. This initial effort is an outstanding one, and our best thanks are conveyed to our helpers. At Natimuk a small band of enthusiasts help to keep the needs of the Hospital before the public, and does excellent work.

At Dimboola a small committee functions, but, unfortunately, does meet with the support it deserves. However, the gentlemen interested in the Hospital are hopeful that this year some large function will be held in that centre on our behalf.

A new committee was formed at Goroke this year, mainly through the efforts of Cr. P. Walker. A Hospital Sunday was well attended, and the proceeds totalled nearly £30. It is intended to hold a concert at Goroke during the next year, and the Hospital Sunday will be an annual effort. We are grateful to those ladies and gentlemen in the Goroke district who have rallied to our assistance.

The committee at Rainbow has again done good work, and although the returns this year are a little lower than formerly, it was not due to the organisers, but to seasonal conditions being so uncertain.

To all our outposts we say thanks for the splendid co-operation given to us.

SCHOOLS' APPEAL—The annual appeal made to the schools of this district again met with a wonderful response, the total amount of goods and cash received totalling approximately £210. This scheme is of great value to the Hospital, and our grateful thanks are extended to Mr. E. B. Pederick (District Inspector), Mr. Geo. Kent (Hon. Secretary until December, 1933), Mr. C. Freeman (who has

succeeded Mr. Kent), the members of the executive and all who assisted with gifts. We regret the removal of Mr. Kent from Horsham, and are grateful for the services he rendered whilst in this district.

- WOOD DAY—The annual Wood Day was again organised by Mr. G. W. Cochrane, and the result was the best for some years. We are grateful to all donors, stackers, and to Mr. Cochrane for organising this splendid contribution. All donors of the wood were resident in the Shires of Wimmera and Arapiles.
- TRANSPORT—During the year we have been assisted in our work of visiting country centres by having motor cars made available by residents of Horsham. This has been a particularly heavy year, and it is estimated that approximately 2000 car miles were covered during the year. To those who assisted in this work we extend sincere thanks.
- THANKS—Throughout the year gifts of all kinds have been numerous and regular, and to all donors we express our thanks. To the local, district, and metropolitan paper offices we extend thanks for copies of papers. The Horsham Town Band has this year given special service, probably the greatest for many years. Several Hospital Sundays were held in district centres, and in addition the Land has played many programmes at the Hospital. In addition, the services of the Eand have been given on many occasions, notably at the Hospital Carnival. No thanks can be too great for this wonderful or anisation.

To the proprietors of the "Horsham Times" we extend sincere thanks for the assistance given through the paper during the year.

To the clergy of all denominations we would specially convey our thanks for their loyal co-operation and splendid work at the Hospital. To the members of the Methodist Girls' Comrade Club, the W.C.T.U., the Catholic Ladies' Guild and the Returned Soldiers Ladies' Auxiliary we express thanks for regular visits to the patients with gifts, These visits are much appreciated by the immates. Another welcome visitor each Sunday is Mr. C. H. Hoskin, who comes with his gifts of song and flowers. This gentleman has, for a lengthy period, rendered this service and we are grateful to him.

Our warm thanks are also due to Mr. Ormond Short for attending to the wireless installation at the Hospital.
