TO THE GOVERNORS AND CONTRIBUTORS.

LADIES and GENTLEMEN:

In presenting to you the 59th Annual Report and Statement of Receipts and Expenditure, the Committee of Management notes with pleasure the splendid support which has been given by the residents of this district, and desires to express thanks to all those who have helped during the year. The figures for the year under review are very favorable, and the following paragraphs will show what has been accomplished:

FINANCE.—In the Maintenance Account we commenced with a debit of £334/10/6, which was rather a severe handicap. The position was somewhat uncertain at the outset, as it was realised that the financial position of the country was far from satisfactory. An extra effort was needed if our finances were to be maintained at previous levels. Just how well the response has been made will be shown from the following figures:—The total receipts for Maintenance were £1367/0/2 (ordinary receipts) and £227/11/4 (extraordinary). The former amount is about £600 in excess of the previous year's total. The main item of receipts was Government Grant, which amounted to £976. Included in this amount were special grants, the totals of which we may not always receive in succeeding years. Patients' fees totalled £1730, which is considerably in excess of last year's amount. Municipal Grants again remained at a high figure—£972. The 1933 Hospital Carnival Committee handed over the sum of £750, which is £225 greater than last year's effort. Entertainment (including Carnival receipts) totalled £1045, which amount is also in excess of last year's figures. From the foregoing figures it will be seen that there has been a definite increase in all headings, which is very gratifying. The total expenditure on Maintenance was £581/3/3, which is in excess of last year. The largest increase under any one heading was that of Surgery and Dispensary. Owing to the high prices charged for many items, coupled with the fact that we treated over 1000 more patients, it is not surprising that the figures under this heading are so high. Every avenue of expenditure has been closely watched and no wastage has occurred. During the year we would have liked to expend money on very necessary items for the Hospital, such as linen, bedding, etc., but we refrained from doing so because we were uncertain of the financial position. Now that the position is more clearly defined we feel that we must expend a considerable sum on restocking the Hospital, which must be considered as more than satisfactory. This splendid achievement is one that contributors may well be proud of. The average cost per bed for the year is £101, as against £95 for last year.

BUILDING ACCOUNT.—The position of this account shows a most successful improvement. Twelve months ago the debit balance was £1828 16/2. During the year we received a special grant of £400 from the Treasury, and also received bequests of £200 from the estate of the late Wm. Griffiths, of Latham, and £30 from the estate of the late Ellen Roche. The debit shown on June 30 is £1200 6/2, and the reduction of this amount is appreciated very much. We are hopeful that during the next financial year, we will be able to reduce the indebtedness to £1000.

1933 HOSPITAL CARNIVAL.—This year's Carnival must rank as one of the finest achievements for many years. At the outset there were many difficulties with which the committee had to contend. Headed by Mr. Harold Smith as President and Mr. G. W. Cochrane as Secretary, the Committee threw all their energies into the work of organization, and, despite prevailing conditions, had the great satisfaction of seeing last year's figures exceeded by a sum of £25. The total of the net proceeds amounted to £750 and was distributed as follows:—Maintenance Account £690, Ambulance Account £60. The latter allotment was made by request of the local branch of the R.S.I.L.A., who undertook to make up any deficiency in the Ambulance Account each year. Included in the total proceeds was the profit made from the Charity Race Meeting conducted by the Horsham Race Club Officials and helpers—£74. The total hospital return from all sources must be considered an outstanding success, and our thanks are due to all ladies and gentlemen (not forgetting the school children) for what has been accomplished.

MUNICIPAL GRANTS.—Municipalities have again given great assistance in financing the Hospital, the sum of £972 being received from this source. It is gratifying to know that the grants received by this Hospital rank as one of the highest in the State, and we are grateful to the authorities of our various municipalities for the splendid support accorded the Hospital. ENTERTAINMENTS.—This year we have again received splendid support from this source. Apart from Carnival receipts, which have already been referred to, we have received splendid assistance from various efforts conducted in Horsham and neighboring centres. We do not intend to elaborate on each entertainment that has been given on our behalf, but would convey to all the promoters the sincerest thanks for the wonderful assistance that has been accorded to the Hospital.

PATIENTS.—The total number of patients treated in the Hospital for the twelve months was 1416, which is the highest figure yet reached in the history of the Hospital. The daily average increase is 3.73 to 57.63. Out-patients numbered 102, making the total persons treated 1268. Fees from patients showed an increase on the previous year. A large amount is outstanding in fees, and every endeavor is made to collect amounts owing, but this is a very difficult matter when there is so much unemployment in our midst.

MATERNITY WARD.—This section of the Hospital has again been busy, 94 births being recorded. This number is only seven less than for the previous year.

INTERMEDIATE PATIENTS.—Thirty patients were admitted under this heading, or nine more than for the previous year. It is regrettable that more people are not admitted as Intermediate patients, as the increased fees received would help considerably in meeting our expenditure. Fees received amounted to £263/18/6, which amount is considerably in excess of last year's figures.

X-RAY DEPARTMENT.—The work in this department has increased considerably during this year, and the value of the plant to hospital and private patients cannot be estimated. Since the installation of the plant in October, 1928, over 2300 exposures have been made.

STAFF.—We are indeed fortunate in having such a capable nursing staff. The busy nature of the wards calls for consistently hard work on the part of the Matron, Sisters and Trainees. We cannot speak too highly of the splendid work done by all members of the staff. The Matron, Miss G. M. Arthur, has at all times been keenly alert in the interests of the Hospital management, Staff and Patients, and has earned great praise for her efforts. This Hospital is very fortunate in having such an efficient Matron.

HONORARY MEDICAL STAFF.—We again express our sincere appreciation of the valuable service given to the Hospital by the members of the Honorary Medical Staff, Drs. H. W. Charlton, G. R. Felstead, G. Forsyth and R. J. A. Henderson. They have at all times, and often at great inconvenience, attended to the needs of the patients, and we thank them for their splendid services. During the year your Committee of Management considered that, owing to the heavy nature of the work at the Hospital, it was perhaps necessary to appoint a Resident Medical Officer. The matter was brought under the notice of the Honorary Medical Officers, and they were asked to go into the matter of an appointment and report to this Committee. After making investigations, and considering the matter from all angles, they decided to recommend that, for the present at least, an appointment should not be made. We have advised the Honoraries that should an appointment be considered necessary in the near future, this Committee will be pleased to co-operate in the making of an appointment.

HONORARY DENTISTS.—The Honorary Dentists, Messrs. C. W. Dougall, R. S. Grant and W. Lawrence have again rendered valuable service, and we desire to express our sincere thanks to them.

LADIES' COMMITTEE.—This Committee is again doing very active work on behalf of the Hospital. The Mayoress (Mrs. L. Hutcheson) is a very enthusiastic President, and with Mrs. G. Hodges as Honorary Secretary and an excellent Committee is doing valuable work for the Hospital. This Committee is now arranging for the annual collection to be made in Horsham, and has several other projects in mind. We are very grateful for the work that is being done by this active body.

AMBULANCE SERVICE.—This service has again been of great assistance to the town and district during the past twelve months. The financial side of the service caused considerable concern at one stage, and we were advised that, unless payments of arrears were made, consideration would be given to the withdrawal of the Ambulance car. The local branch of the R.S.S.I.L.A., together with the Ladies' Auxiliary of the Returned Soldiers, undertook to make themselves responsible for any arrears of payments that had accumulated, and to make up the annual deficit, if any. This was a very fine offer and was accepted with thanks. At the Hospital Carnival these organisations did splendid work, and from their proceeds the

sum of £70 was made available to wipe off the deficit. At the end of the year the account is in credit to the extent of £5.

We are indebted to the Town Council for the annual grant of £25 towards the upkeep of the Ambulance, and to the honorary driver, Mr. J. Baulderstone, for his wonderful record of service. This gentleman is available for calls at any hour, and receives no fee or reward for his unselfish service. He is deserving of the highest praise for his magnificent contribution of service. To Messrs. Thomas Yuong & Co., who garage the car and allow the driver to attend calls during working hours, we also extend sincere thanks.

DISTRICT COMMITTEES.—Our district Committees have again kept the Hospital needs before residents in our neighboring towns. At Murtoa a very live Committee has rendered great service, and the contribution of £100 from that centre is a splendid achievement. In addition to the work accomplished by the Committee at Murtoa, the Catholic Ladies' Guild conducted a Linen and Gift Day for the Hospital, the response being a splendid one. Our best thanks are conveyed to this organisation for their help. At Natimuk a small band of enthusiasts keeps the Hospital before the residents, and does really excellent work. The newly-formed Committee at Rainbow again did excellent work, the returns from that centre totalling £36. During the year a Committee was formed at Rupunyup. At a most enthusiastic public meeting in that town a very strong executive was elected, and residents at Rupunyup are very anxious to assist the Hospital in every way. In addition to the executive committee, a Ladies' Auxiliary has also been formed. Owing to wear-and-tear conditions, it was not possible to hold a band recital as was expected, but during the year we received the sum of £42 from this centre. We welcome the establishment of this new Committee, and are hopeful of establishing similar Committees in other towns and districts. It is a matter for regret that the Committee at Dimboola has not been so active as in the past. Dimboola has in past years given great help to the Hospital, and we are hopeful that the coming year will see a re-valuation of its activities in this town.

SCHOOLS APPEAL.—The annual appeal made to the schools of this district has met with a wonderful response, the total amount of goods and cash received totalling approximately £230. This is the equivalent of maintaining two occupied beds for the year, which is the aim of the organisers of the appeal. The scheme is of great value to the Hospital, and our grateful thanks are extended to Mr. E. B. Pederick (District Inspector), Mr. Geo. Kent (Honorary Secretary), the executive committee, teachers and scholars for the splendid results achieved.

OBITUARY.—It is with regret that we have to report the passing of one of our esteemed members of the Committee of Management. We refer to the death of the late Mr. P. Learmonth, who for a very long term gave valuable service to the institution in many capacities.

WOOD DAY.—The annual Wood Day was again organised by Mr. G. W. Cochrane, and, although the result was not quite up to last year's effort, a splendid stack of wood was delivered to the Hospital. This annual effort means a considerable saving in fuel, and we are indebted to those gentlemen who delivered wood, the stackers who assisted with the unloading, and to Mr. Cochrane for his organising work.

THANKS.—Throughout the year gifts of all kinds have been numerous, and to all donors we would express thanks. To the local, district and metropolitan paper offices we extend thanks for copies of papers.

ers regularly received. The Horsham Town Brass Band has on all occasions been willing to assist the Hospital, whether it be giving recitals at the Hospital for the patients or playing at functions organised on behalf of the Hospital, and we tender our sincere thanks to this body of men.
