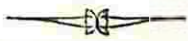

SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE
COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM,

JANUARY, 1860.

THE Committee of Management of the BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM in presenting to the Governors and Subscribers the Report of their proceedings during the last year, have to congratulate them and the public in general upon the completion of the first portion of the much required Benevolent Asylum, which they hope will, in the course of a few weeks, be opened for the reception of the aged, infirm, and destitute.

The foundation stone, as before stated in the last half-yearly Report, was laid with Masonic honors on the 17th day of March, under the auspices of Thomas Francis Gell, Esq., D.P.G.M. The portion of the building at present erected is the South wing: it was completed on the 4th of October, and is capable of affording accommodation for eighty inmates exclusive of apartments for Master and Matron, and offices for Medical Officers and Secretary.

The total cost of building this wing has been £3,765 4s. 2d.,—particulars of which will be found on referring to the balance sheet appended to this Report.

Although your Committee have to congratulate themselves, and thank the public for the liberal support received at their hands, in the erection of this building, they regret to state that owing to the building having cost more than was at first anticipated, they have been obliged to borrow £725 5s. 5d. from the Furnishing and Maintenance Funds to meet the liabilities upon it; and your Committee being desirous to make the Institute available to the poor and infirm as soon as possible, notwithstanding the pecuniary difficulties under which they labour, have lost no time in furnishing the Asylum for the reception of inmates, relying upon the sympathy and liberality of the public for the means of paying off the debt, as the funds to meet this furnishing expenditure was especially raised by the ladies of Ballarat, to whom too much praise cannot be given for their untiring exertions at the Bazaar, held during

Easter week, in the Council Chambers, by which the sum of £572 was raised and given to the Asylum for that purpose.

In connection with the Bazaar, your Committee cannot refrain from noticing the liberality of Mr. W. Bridges, in presenting the Institution with the tapestry picture, the "Albute Money," the sale of tickets for the lottery of which realized the sum of £53 10s., and the result of the drawing leaves it still the property of the Asylum.

In addition to the customary subscriptions and donations, the Committee have the pleasant duty of tendering their sincere thanks for the special efforts made on behalf of the Institution by the Hon. George Coppin, Esq., M.L.C., and the proprietors of the Theatre Royal and Chinese Theatre.

The thanks of your Committee are also justly due to the Municipal Councils of Ballarat, for the continued support afforded by their monthly donations.

Your Committee would also express their acknowledgement of the services rendered by the Medical Profession, in attending the destitute sick when called upon by the Institution.

Your Committee in laying before you a statement of the relief afforded by this Institution, cannot but express their sorrow at the great increase in poverty and distress in this district; during the past half-year 146 families in Ballarat, and the out-lying districts, have received out-door relief, varying from 5s. to £1 per week, and for periods from one week to six months. The total amount of expenditure under this head being £1500 2s. 7d. for the past year; and in no case have the Committee administered relief without first investigating into the circumstances and character of the person applying, however arduous the task, or great the distance to visit them.

The number of destitute persons receiving weekly aid from the Institution at the commencement of the past half-year, was 40; since, 106. New cases have been relieved, of whom 36 were casual; 9 have succeeded in procuring suitable employment; 9 have left the district, 3 were admitted into the hospital; 24 were discharged as sufficiently recovered to provide for themselves, and 8 were found to be impostors, and consequently were debarred from any support from the Institution. 57 remained on the books, of whom only 20 are fit subjects for admission into the Asylum, the remaining 36 being destitute widows, with, in some cases, families of 4, 5, and 6 children. In reference to this class, your Committee would appeal to the ladies especially for cast-off clothing, both for adults and children, as in most of these cases, the children especially, — are in a most deplorable state for the want of

clothing. Any donations left with the Master at the Asylum, will be thankfully acknowledged.

Your Committee feeling deeply impressed with the heavy responsibility devolving on those to be entrusted with the management of the Asylum, desire to impress upon all classes the necessity of giving them their warmest co-operation, in supporting an institution which is not only intended to afford shelter to the aged, infirm, and the destitute, but will have to take in hopeless cases of disease and suffering that are not admissable to the hospital or any other institution; also, in the absence of other institutions, it is very much to be feared that the Asylum will, to some extent, have to be converted into a refuge for orphans and lying-in cases, for whom as yet Ballarat has no separate asylum.

In order to meet the requirements of the Institution for the ensuing year, £2,500 has been placed on the Estimates for its maintenance, which your Committee considering inadequate for the purpose (the building being nearly £800 in debt, and the present furnishing and maintenance funds not being sufficient to meet their liabilities,) have applied to the Members of the Legislative Assembly representing this District to have an additional £1,500 placed upon the Estimates in aid of the Asylum.

In order to claim the proposed grants from Government, the sum of £1500 must be raised by voluntary contributions.

An especial appeal is made to the mining community on Ballarat and the outlying districts who have not (with the exception of some few companies, among whom the Allied Armies, British Mining, and North Grenville Companies stand foremost) responded in as liberal a manner as might have been expected to the calls made upon them, particularly when it is taken into consideration that some of the most distressing and expensive cases on the books of the Institution are widows and orphans of miners, and miners suffering from chronic diseases caused by mining operations.

In June last Mr. Stephen Cooper was appointed Secretary and Collector, in the place of Mr. A. A. Tarte, resigned.

On the 10th January Mr. W. H. Boughen was elected as Master, and Mrs. W. H. Boughen as Matron to the Asylum.

In conclusion your Committee would urge upon all classes the necessity of extending their constant support to an Institution which has for its objects the relief of those who cannot help themselves, and also to impress upon the mind of the public at large the heavy responsibilities under which your new Committee take office, to provide for the increased expenditure consequent upon the opening of the Asylum, and increase of destitution on Ballarat.

L I F E G O V E R N O R S .

1. Every donor of £10 or upwards, every person who shall raise by one or more collections in one year the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum. Any person appointed by any Society, paying the sum of £20. The Executors, or if more than one, the first named in any will, by which a bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution, shall be considered Life Governors.

A N N U A L G O V E R N O R S .

2. Every Subscriber of £1 and upwards annually, shall be considered an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors, provided he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. That the Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a President, two Vice Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, four Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors.

4. That the aforesaid officers, except the Trustees, with the Committee of Management, shall be elected annually by the Governors in the month of January in each year.

5. That in the event of a vacancy occurring in any of the Honorary Offices of the Institution, the election of a successor shall be at a general meeting of Governors to be convened for that purpose.

6. That the annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution, shall be held in the month of January in each year, to receive report from the Committee of Management, and elect Honorary Officers for the ensuing year; and that a half-yearly meeting of the Governors shall be held in the month of July in each year, to receive a half-yearly report of the Institution.

7. That it shall be competent at any time for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days notice in not less than two of the daily Ballarat Papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned.

8. That at the annual, half-yearly, or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half-an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, ten Governors shall not be present, such meeting shall stand adjourned to the same hour on the day next following, when if five Governors be present, they shall form a quorum at such adjourned meeting.

9. That at the annual, half-yearly and all special meetings of Governors, it shall be lawful for any Governor duly qualified, to vote by proxy, provided that such proxy shall be in writing, signed by the Governor giving the same, and the name of the person thereby authorised to vote for such Governor, inserted therein.

10. That the Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution, shall frame Bye-laws for its internal regulations, the same not being contrary to the general rules—appoint and discharge all officers and servants of the Institution—shall meet one day in each week, and at other days as they shall appoint—admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment, and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but no deliberative vote.

11. That the President and Vice President shall be members ex officio of all Committees.

12. That all Sub-Committees shall have five members, three to form a quorum.

13. That the Committee of Management shall, at each annual, and half-yearly meeting of the Governors, present a general report of the affairs of the Institution.

14. That the accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the months of July and January in each year.

15. That no member of the Committee of Management, or officer of the Institution shall become security for any Contractor, directly or indirectly, or vote in any contract in which he may have any interest whatsoever.

16. That any member of the Committee of Management absenting himself for one month without reasonable cause shall cease to be a member of the Committee of Management, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

TREASURER.

17. That all monies received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and be appropriated by him to the purposes of the Institution under direction of the Committee of Management.

18. That no payment shall be made by the Treasurer out of the monies of the Institution until ordered by the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

19. That the Secretary shall attend all annual, half-yearly, special, and Committee meetings, and take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose, and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

20. That the Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all monies due to, or receivable by the Institution, and in all cases give receipts for the same, and shall pay over the same to the Treasurer once in each week, with an account of the sums received, and the names of the persons from whom received by him since the previous payment.

21. That the Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, and the clerical business of his department, and keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees.

22. That the Secretary shall compile all Reports of Committees, fill the cheques, and perform the clerical duties connected with the office of Treasurer.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

23. That the Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend daily, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves.

24. That the Honorary Medical Officers shall have access to the Institution at all times and perform all Surgical operations, and report the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

25. That any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty for one month without reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Institution, and another officer shall be appointed in his stead:

INTERNAL GOVERNMENT OF THE ASYLUM.

DUTIES OF MASTER.

26. The Master shall have the charge, control and Management of the Institution, and of the inmates and hired servants thereof, subject to the Regulations and Orders of the Committee.

27. He shall have power to suspend Servants for gross misconduct, until the next meeting of Committee.

28. He shall keep an exact inventory of all the goods belonging to and in the Asylum, and shall present a Report thereof to the Committee, the first meeting in January and July of every year.

29. He shall examine, both as regards quantity and quality, all supplies, and enter an account thereof in the supply book, which shall be regularly laid before the Committee.

30. He shall keep an exact account of the Admission and Discharge of Inmates, and also of all out door Aims people, the nature of the relief given, and its period of continuance in the Register Book.

31. He shall keep a Diet Book, according to the Dictary of the Committee, and according to the orders of the Honorary Medical Officers, as to sick inmates, so as to exhibit the individual, and aggregate consumption of provisions.

32. He shall regularly visit every part of the Institution connected with the men's department daily, to enforce proper order and cleanliness.

33. He shall report all disorder, neglect, and misconduct to the next ensuing Committee.

OF MATRON

34. The Matron shall in like manner superintend and daily visit the departments belonging to the Female inmates and maintain order and cleanliness therein.

OF ATTENDANTS.

35. The Wardsmen and Wardswomen shall carefully keep clean their several Wards, and attend such inmates as may become sick, according to the directions of the Master or Medical Officers.

36. They shall withdraw when desired from the Ward on the entry of the Committee, and shall not receive any kind of gift or remuneration for anything done or to be done in virtue of their situation, upon pain of peremptory dismissal.

37. They shall immediately report any infringement of the Regulations to the Master or Matron, as the case might be.

MISCELLANEOUS.

38. The Master and Matron shall not both be absent from the Asylum at the same time, and neither of them shall be absent from the house from ten p.m. to eight a.m., nor more than three hours at one time, without permission of the President or Committee.

39. Any inmate behaving in a disorderly manner, or leaving the premises without permission of the Master shall be forthwith reported to the Committee, and be liable to be dismissed.

40. Any inmate entering into any Ward but his or her own, without permission, or playing at cards or dice, gambling or smoking tobacco in the house, or habitually spitting on the floor, or being guilty of other improper or rude behaviour, or using indecent or profane language, or defacing or injuring the property of the Institution, or refusing to obey the directions of the Honorary Medical Officers or Master or Matron, shall be forthwith reported to the Committee and liable to dismissal.

41. All inmates who are judged by the Honorary Medical Officers to be capable, are to give their services under the direction of the Master or Matron in the work of the house, or in the cultivation of the garden and grounds.

42. The Master and Matron shall respectively preside at the Meal Tables of the Male and Female inmates, and duly say Grace before and after Meals.

43. The inmates shall be at liberty to receive Religious Instruction from the Ministers of the Church to which they belong, at such times as the Committee shall appoint.

44. That no applications for admission be received without the usual forms being filled up and by a Governor. And no applicant shall be admitted into the Asylum until *one week* shall have elapsed from the date of his or her application, in order to afford time for inquiry, but in the event of any urgent cases arising, the President and any three members of the Committee shall have the power of dealing with such cases as they shall require.

45. That in electing to any appointment by the Committee, when there are more applicants than are required, the voting shall take place by voting cards, and the lowest on the poll shall be struck off and the vote taken again for the remaining candidates, until one or more has a majority of the members of Committee then present, and so on with the remainder of the candidates, always striking off the lowest, until the required number have been elected by such majority.

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT
OF THE

STANDING RULES AND ORDERS.

ORDER OF BUSINESS.

1. The business of the Committee shall commence at the hour appointed, or as soon after as a quorum shall be present.

2. The presence of five members shall constitute a quorum of the Committee; but if, at the expiration of twenty minutes from the time appointed for the Committee to meet, there is not a quorum, such meeting shall proceed to business.

3. The minutes of any preceding meeting, not previously confirmed, shall be read as the first business at all meetings of the Committee, in order to their confirmation; and no discussion shall be permitted thereon, except as to their accuracy as a record of the proceedings.

4. The reading of the correspondence unconnected with the orders of the day, and the bringing up of reports of Committee and Notices of motion, shall have precedence in the orders of business, but shall not be introduced during the consideration of the orders of the day.

5. Orders of the day shall include all matters arising out of the proceedings of former meetings of the Committee; any business which the Chairman may think fit to bring under consideration; and such orders shall take precedence in the rotation in which they stand in the minute book.

NOTICES AND MOTIONS.

6. No member shall make any motion initiating a subject for discussion, or for re-considering a motion previously disposed of, except in pursuance of a notice given at a previous meeting of the Committee, and such notice must be given either previous to the Committee entering upon the orders of the day, or after such orders shall have been disposed of.

7. Every member in giving notice of motion, shall read it aloud, and deliver to the Chairman a copy of such notice, together with his name, and the day proposed for bringing on such notice of motion.

8. A member may give notice for any other member not then present, by putting the name of the member for whom the notice is given on the notice of motion.

9. No motion entered on the notice paper shall be proceeded with unless the member who has given such notice, or some one authorised by him, be present when the business is called in order. Notices not so proceeded with shall be struck out of the paper.

10. Any motion not seconded shall not be further debated, but shall lapse.

11. Any member who has proposed a motion may withdraw the same by leave of the Chairman, but should such motion be seconded, such leave can only be granted provided there is no negative voice.

12. The Chairman may order a complicated question to be divided.

13. So soon as a debate upon a question shall be concluded, the Chairman shall put the question to the Committee in a distinct and audible manner.

14. The question put, shall be resolved in the affirmative or negative by a show of hands.

15. No question or amendment, which is the same in substance as any question which has been resolved in the affirmative or negative, shall be a resolution of the Committee, unless carried by two-thirds of the members present.

AMENDMENTS.

16. A question having been proposed, may be amended by leaving out, substituting, or adding words, and such amendments shall be resolved by a majority of votes.

17. An amendment proposed, but not seconded, will not be entertained or entered on the minutes.

18. Amendments may be proposed to an amendment, as if such amendment were an original question.

19. When amendments have been resolved, the main question as amended shall be put.

20. When amendments have been lost, the original question shall be put.

ORDER OF DEBATE.

21. Any member desirous of proposing a motion or amendment, or of discussing any matter under consideration, must rise and address the Chairman, and no member when speaking shall be interrupted, unless called to order, when he shall sit down; in which case the member calling to order shall be heard thereon, in preference to any other speaker, and the question of order shall be disposed of before the subject is resumed, or any other subject entered upon.

22. No member may speak to any question after the same has been put by the Chairman, and the voting has been given in the affirmative or negative thereon.

23. When two or more members rise to speak, the Chairman shall call on the member who, in his opinion, first rose in his place.

24. A motion may be made that any member who has risen, "be now heard," or "do now speak."

25. A member may speak to any question before the Committee, and upon any amendment proposed thereto, and upon a question or amendment proposed by himself, or upon a question of order arising out of the debate, but not otherwise.

26. That any member proposing or seconding a resolution or amendment, shall be held to have spoken, and that the mover shall only have the right of reply.

27. Whenever the Chairman rises during a debate, any member then speaking, or offering to speak, shall sit down, so that the Chairman may be heard without interruption.

28. Any member having used objectionable words, and not explaining or retracting the same, or offering an apology for the use thereof, to the satisfaction of the Committee, will be censured by the Committee, and shall not be allowed to hold his seat or vote on any question, until the offensive words shall have been retracted by him, or an apology rendered to the satisfaction of the Committee.

SUSPENSION OF STANDING ORDERS.

29. It shall be competent, by a vote of two-thirds of the members present, for the Committee to suspend any order herein contained, provided the effect of such suspension shall not be the rescinding of any resolution previously adopted by the Committee.

SUB-COMMITTEES

30. That the foregoing Rules and Orders shall also regulate the proceedings of all Sub-Committees.
