## THE BALLMRAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Is submitting a Report of their proceedings for the past year, the Committee of Management have the pleasure of congratulating the Governors and Subscribers upon the continued prosperity and tesfulness of the Institution, notwithstanding the increased demands made upon it for assistance, as shown by the following statements.

The numbers remaining in the Asylum at the end of 1865, were 103 males, 17 females, 56 children; total, 176. Admitted during 1866, 119 males, 35 females, 9 children, and 12 children born; making a total of 351 persons to whom the Institution has afforded a home. Discharged and left during the year, 112 males, 40 females, 8 children; total, 160. Died, 26 males, 3 females; total, 29. Remaining at the close of 1866, 110 males, 12 females, 57 children; total, 179. Average number of inmates during the year, 1821.

The average cost of maintenance per head during the year amounts to £24 8s. 6d., which shows an increase on the previous year of £2 3s. 6d. It will be seen by reference to the financial statement that there is an increase in several items of expenditure, the chief cause of the increased cost of maintenance being the high price paid for meat during the great apart of the year.

The expenditure of £2460 15s. 8d. in out-door relief, shows an increase on the previous year of £390 18s. 8d. Your Committee have used every effort to secure the administration of out-door relief only to deserving persons, but have been unable to avoid an increased expenditure, the average number of families on the books duing the year being £179½, consisting of 206 adults, and 321 children, the average cost per family being £13 14s. 2d. The numbers on the books at the close of the previous year were 172 families, consisting of 181 adults, and 279

children. The Chinese out-door recipients of relief are still a heavy tax upon the Institution, and your Committee would recommend that some active measures be taken to ensure the necessary provision for the care of those suffering from leprosy before another winter.

The continued increase in the demand for accommodation for cases requiring medical treatment, induced your Committee to renew the application previously made to the Government for a building grant, which resulted in the sum of £1800 being allotted for that purpose. Having thus far succeeded they determined to provide a hospital ward for the accommodation of the class of inmates above referred to, who have hitherto been confined to two small wards, where the ventilation for that purpose is incomplete. It was found, however, that to carry out the original design of the building, the necessary ventilation could not be obtained, the Committee therefore requested Mr. Doane, the architect, to prepare a design providing increased height to the proposed addition to the main building, and in accordance with his recommendation the north wing has been extended 80 feet westward, by a width of 26 feet, thereby forming two large wards the lower one it is proposed to use as a hospital ward, the upper one as a dormitory. Plans were also prepared by Mr. Doane, for work-rooms and other out-offices, where those of the inmates who are able to work may be employed; and in September last a contract was entered into with Mr. Thomas Nicholls, for the completion of the whole works for the sum of £1669 10s.; the contract is now nearly completed, and the buildings will be ready for occupation in a few weeks.

The iron entrance gates, mentioned in the report of 1865, have been received at a cost of £88; the importers, Messrs. Eyres Brothers, having kindly presented to the Institution, and erected on the stone piers at the entrance to the grounds a pair of very handsome lamps, made from a design furnished by them to the manufacturer. The Committee also desire to acknowledge, with thanks, the kindness of the Borough Council of Ballarat, in agreeing to light the two lamps at the entrance gates, gratuitously.

The Committee desire to acknowledge, with thanks, the receipt of £100 from the executors of the late Matthew Campbell, Esq., who, for a number of years was honorably connected with public arfairs in Ballarat, and has left substantial proof of his sympathy

with its charitable institutions.

The special thanks of the Committee are due to those gentlemen who took part in carrying out the United Demonstration of Boxing Day, 1865. The net proceeds paid over to the Institution in the early part of 1866, amounted to £175 13s. In addition to the usual subscriptions, your Committee desire acknowledge, with thanks, the special collections made in aid of the Institution by the ministers and congregations of Christ Church, St. Peter's, St. Andrew's, Dawson Street Congregational Church, Presbyterian Church, Buninyong, and the Wesleyan Churches.

Also, donations of books, &c., for the use of the inmates, from Mrs. A. Joyce, Norwood Station, per Rev. J. J. Halley, Mrs. B. Hepburn, Mr. W. P. Bechervaise, Mr. James Campbell, Mr. H. Smith, and the late Mr. Tugwell.

The produce of the dairy for the past year, charging 4d per quart for milk, and 1s. 6d. per lb. for butter, together with £2 2s. 6d. for calves sold, amounts to £276 5s. 2d., which deducting cost of forage, & c, £130 1s. rod., leaves a profit of £146 3s. 4d. The return of vegetables supplied to the house during the year from the garden, charged at market rates, amounts to £127 13s., being £13 6s. 4d. in excess of the previous year.

Your Committee have to report that in September last, the President, Mr. Doane, tendered his resignation in consequence of his being professionally employed as architect for the additions to the building; and at a special meeting of Governors, held on the 8th of October, Robert Lewis, Esq., was elected President for the unexpired portion of the year.

Before resigning their trust, your Committee desire to record their satisfaction with the manner in which the salaried and honorary officers of the Institution have discharged their various duties during the past year, and in conclusion, to tender their most sincere thanks to those ladies and gentlemen who have, by visiting and other means, evinced their desire to protect and further the objects of this valuable Institution, and they trust that the same liberal support hitherto accorded to the Asylum will be Continued.

#### RULES

OF

# THE BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM,

Adopted by the Governors 24th January, 1867.

#### OBJECTS:

TO RELIEVE I'ME AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE, AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE,

#### LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 or upwards, every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise by one or more collections in one year the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which a bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the institution shall be a Life Governor.

#### ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying sucsubscription, and entitled to vote at all the yearly and othe special meetings of Governors, provided, in the case of a new subscriber, he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a president, two vice-presidents, five trustees, a treasurer, three honorary medical officers, and sixteen governors, all of whom, except the trustees, shall be elected annually by, and from the Governor, in the month of January in each year.

- 4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired term, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a General Meeting of Governors.
- 5. The annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall held in the month of January in each year, when a General teport of the affairs of the Institution from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.
- 6. It shall be competent at any time for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the daily Ballarat papers, of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned.
- 7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but, if after the expiration of half-an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time, within seven days, when such adjourned meeting shall be held.
- 8 The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution, shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulations, the same not being contrary to the general rules, appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution, shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint, admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment, and shall appoint sub-committees for all necessary purposes, and auditors; the chairman of committees to have a casting but no deliberative vote.
- 9. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be members exof licio of all Committees.
- 10. All Sub-Committees shall have, at least five members, three to form a quorum.
- 11. The Accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of January in each year.
- 12. Any member of the Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for

two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have any pecuniary interest.

#### TREASURER.

14. All monies received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution under the direction of the Committee of Management.

#### SECRETARY.

- 15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and committee meetings, take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose, and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.
- 16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all monies due to, or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall, within fourteen days of the time of receipt of monies, pay over the same into the Bank to the credit of the treasurer, submitting at each meeting of the General and House Committee, an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.
- 17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence, and the elerical business of his department, keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees, compile all reports of the Committees, fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Frensurer.

#### HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

- 18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified medical practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves, shall have access to the Institution at all times, and perform all surgical operations, and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.
- 19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause, shall cease to hold office.
- 20. Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
