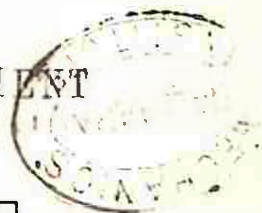

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT
OF THE
BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS :

THE term for which your Committee were elected having expired, they have much pleasure (in presenting a brief summary of their proceedings during the past year, before resigning the trust reposed in them), in stating that the ability of the institution to minister to the necessities of the poor has kept pace with the requirements of the district, numerous and heavy as these have been. They would also refer with gratitude to the large increase in the amount of contributions, and especially of private subscriptions, the receipts from this source for 1867 being £381 14s. 3d. in advance of the previous year.

The numbers remaining in the Asylum at the end of 1866 were 110 males, 12 females, and 57 children; total, 179. Admitted during 1867, 149 males, 68 females, and 19 children born, making a total of 396 persons to whom a home has been afforded by the institution. Discharged and left during the year, (including 47 deaths), 139 males, 61 females, and 9 children; total, 209. Remaining in the Asylum at the close of 1867, 120 males, 19 females, and 48 children; total, 187. Average number of inmates during the year, 199.

The average cost of maintenance amounts to £21 8s. 0½d., being £3 os. 6½d. less than that of 1866.

The amount expended in out-door relief during the year is £1784 3s. 0½d., showing a decrease on the previous year of

£676 12s. 7½d. ; the average weekly number of persons to whom assistance has been afforded in this way being 185 adults and 284 children. The diminution in the cost of maintenance has been principally occasioned by the low prices at which the various articles of consumption have been obtained.

The state of the Chinese Lepers, who have continued dependent upon the bounty of the Asylum, has been the subject of recent agitation, both through the medium of the press and public meetings, and, in reply to a letter sent by direction of your Committee, suggesting that a lazaret-house for their reception be erected in some convenient locality, a communication was received from the Under-Secretary, stating that the amelioration of the condition of the persons referred to was under consideration by the Government.

It will be seen by reference to the balance sheet that the overdraft due to the Colonial Bank of Australasia on the 31st December, 1867, was £3166 1s. 5d. To meet this, however, there is an amount of £3152 15s. 3d. due from Government to the Asylum, which has not been paid owing to the difficulties between the Houses of Parliament.

Your Committee regret that they have to report the death (which occurred in May, 1867), of the late respected Secretary and Collector, Mr. Henry Cordukes, who filled the office for a period of three years. Subsequent to his decease, Mr. Peter Cazaly was duly elected his successor.

During the year the additions to the building, referred to in the last report, have been completed, and occupied as a hospital ward and a dormitory. The Asylum now affords accommodation for 274 inmates. The opening of the wing was inaugurated by a ball and soiree, from which the sum of £47 15s. was realized ; and the Committee acknowledge, with thanks, the services rendered on that occasion by Miss Julia Mathews, Miss Hoffmeister, the Glee and Madrigal Union, and the stewards of the ball.

In honor of the visit of H.R.H. the Duke of Edinburgh a feast to the poor was organized, the Royal Reception Commission having requested your Committee to act with them in making the necessary arrangements. Donations to the same were liberally given, and provisions, consisting of bread, meat, tea, coffee, raisins, currants, &c., were distributed, according to scale, to 528 adults, and 1035 children, affording, in many cases, ample food for a week's consumption. Comparing the satisfactory manner in which the same passed off with the scenes of confusion enacted at the "free banquets" given elsewhere, your Committee cannot but congratulate themselves upon the plan adopted.

The special thanks of your Committee are due to Mr. R. G. Bachelder, of the American War Diorama, for his kindness in devoting to the Asylum half of the gross proceeds of one of his entertainments, amounting to the handsome sum of £27 2s.

The donation of £51 18s. 9d. from the A.I.O.O.F. (Ballarat District), merits particular notice, and, as Mr. F. S. Dobson, certifying barrister under the Friendly Societies' Act, has given it as his opinion that money may legally be voted from the funds of such societies to charitable institutions, your Committee trust that other Orders will not be backward in following the commendable example of the A.I.O.O.F.

For the collections in aid of the institution, made at St. Patrick's, St. Andrew's, St. Paul's, and St. Peter's, Christ Church, Dawson-street Congregational Church, and the Wesleyan Churches, the thanks of the Committee are accorded to the respective ministers and congregations. The special collections, made by Mr. M. Burnett, are also gratefully acknowledged.

The thanks of the Committee are due to Messrs. H. J. Cutler and S. Lambie, who kindly accompanied and greatly aided their Collector in his tour through the districts of Scarsdale and Clunes.

Donations of books, illustrated papers, &c., have been received from Messrs. W. L. Mullen, J. C. Molloy, J. Campbell, and —

Eason, to whom, as well as to the proprietors of the local *Star*, *Evening Post*, *Courier*, and *Punch*, and the Melbourne *Argus*, *Herald*, and *Australasian*, for gratuitously supplying copies of their journals for the use of the inmates, the best thanks of your Committee are hereby conveyed.

The thanks of your Committee are also due to the local press, for the cheerful manner in which publicity has been given to their transactions, and to the representatives of the district in Parliament, for the willingness they have at all times displayed to further the interests of the institution.

The value of vegetables supplied to the house from the garden during the year, charged at market rates, amounts to £149 19s. 3d. In connexion with the garden, the thanks of the Committee are due to Dr. Mueller for a share in the annual distribution of plants, &c., from the Botanical Gardens, Melbourne.

Deducting expenses, the produce of the dairy for the past year, estimated at contract prices, leaves a profit balance of £214 2s.

Your Committee have pleasure in testifying to the efficient manner in which the various officers of the institution have discharged the duties devolving upon them.

Your Committee trust, in conclusion, that the ensuing year may be a remarkably successful one in the annals of the institution. In order that such may be the case, they would earnestly impress upon the public generally the urgent need for increased support, and specially would they appeal to the directors and shareholders of mining companies on behalf of the charity they represent, as miners, permanently disabled by accidents, are received as inmates, and the wives and children of men accidentally killed are supported by the Asylum.

R U L E S
OF
THE BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM,

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS:

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE, AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES ACCORDING TO THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 or upwards, every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which a bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the institution, shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all the yearly and other special meetings of Governors, provided, in the case of a new subscriber, he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually, by and from the Governors, in the month of January in each year.

4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired term, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of Governors.

5. The annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of January in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the daily Ballarat papers, of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if, after the expiration of half an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time, within seven days, when such adjourned meeting shall be held

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution, shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulations, the same not being contrary to the general rules, appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution, shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint, admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment, and shall appoint sub-committees for all necessary purposes, and auditors. The chairman of committees to have a casting but no deliberative vote.

9. The President and Vice-Presidents shall be members *ex-officio* of all committees.

10. All sub-committees shall have, at least, five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of January in each year.

12. Any member of the Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for

two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have any pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All monies received on account of the Institution, shall be paid into the bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and committee meetings, take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose, and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions, and all monies due to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall, within fourteen days of the time of receipt of monies, pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting of the General and House Committee, an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department, keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees, compile all reports of the Committees, fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Treasurer.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified medical practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves, shall have access to the Institution at all times, and perform all surgical operations, and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause, shall cease to hold office.

20. Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
