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#### THIRTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMPUTTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

## Ballwart District Venebolent Isylum

AND LYING-IN V-HOSPITAL,

READ AT THE

Annual Meeting of Governors, held on the 19th of Jan., 1871.

To the Governors and Subscribers-

In accordance with annual custom, your Committee have the honour to lay before you an account of their stewardship. This duty they perform with very pleasurable feelings. For, when the gloomy prospects of the institution at the commencement of the year 1870 are considered, and compared with the present,

they feel there is just matter for congratulation.

Your Committee commenced the performance of their duties with great anxiety, the debt upon the institution being no less than £2810 12s. 3d., and this at a time, when a season of unusual depression was evidently setting in, bringing with it the certain consequence of a great increase in the demands for admission and out-door relief; in addition, there appeared but little hope of receiving that assistance from Government, to which the institution is justly entitled.

One of the first efforts of your Committee, was to bring under the notice of the Government, the rapid growth of the institution in consequence of the many varieties of relief afforded by it, its critical financial condition, together with the large amount of subscriptions raised from time to time and for which no considera-

tion had ever been received.

Every exertion was made in the form of correspondence, statistics, and deputations, to explain the workings of the institution, and the immense district with which it has to deal; and your Committee rejoice that their endeavours were finally successful, as the following grants-in-aid testify, viz: building, £1000; maintenance, £4500; maintenance, lying-in hospital, £1500—in all, £7000.

Your Committee at the same time applied themselves to carry out the recommendation of their predecessors, having reference to procuring grants-in-aid from the several shire councils, and road boards in the district, which have for so many years owed

so much to the Asylum.

A Sub-Committee was appointed to wait on the several bodies, with the necessary statistics, &e., the result being that a donation was voted by each shire council, the only exception being that of the Bungaree Road Board, which, under the plea of being unable by the provisions of the Act to vote money for charitable purposes, declined to give any assistance; this exception your Committee much regret, as the district of Bungaree is a heavy burden upon the institution, while, from the scattered nature of the population, very little in the way of contributions can be procured.

These sums, though far from bearing any proportion to the claims of the Asylum upon the shire councils, must be considered as important, as establishing the principle that those bodies should support the institution; but your Committee earnestly trust that

for the year 1871 the amounts will be largely augmented.

The successful efforts made with the Government, and shire councils, with a much larger subscription list than could reasonably have been anticipated during a time of such depression, together with the watchful economy that has been observed as regards the expenditure, have been the means of considerably reducing the debt on the institution, for, as will be seen by the balance sheet, the overdraft on the 31st December, 1870 was £1239 Ss. 7d., against which there is a sum to be received from Government of £625, so that the debt at the end of the year was £614 Ss. 7d., which, as compared with the position of the institution at the commencement of the year, will no doubt be considered very favourable.

At the end of the year 1869, the numbers remaining in the Asylum were 167 males, 19 females and 2 children; total, 188.

During the year there have been admitted 166 males, 110 females and 136 children, (including 30 children born in the

house); total, 412; so that in all 600 persons have found a

home in the Asylum.

Of these there have been discharged (including those who have left of their own accord) 146 males, 105 females, and 103 children, —354, together with 30 deaths which have taken place during the year; total, 384; leaving in the Asylum on the 31st December, 1870, 187 males, 24 females, and 5 children; total, 216. Daily average number of inmates during the year, 216.

The average individual cost of maintenance amounts to £21 4s. 4d., being £1 19s. 10d. less than that of 1869. This decrease is partly owing to the reasonable contracts for the supply of provisions, and to the strict supervision which has

been exercised over the expenditure during the year.

The bakehouse, creeted in the early part of 1869, having been in operation during the whole of the year, has had a fair trial, the result being a saving to the institution of the sum of £33 5s. 3d. as compared with the amount that would have been chargeable under the old system of purchasing the bread consumed at

the Asylum.

Your Committee have to express regret at the failure of their repeated endeavours to procure the removal of the Chinese lepers Some concession, however, has been obtained from Ballarat. from Government in the form of a special grant-in-aid of 10s. per week for each leper; supplementing the 5s. per week, each receive from the Asylum. Several of these poor creatures have during the year succumbed to their disease, four lepers only remain, and your Committee having given strict orders for the destruction of the buts immediately they become vacant, there is every reason to believe that ere long, there will be no fixed abiding place on Ballarat for persons suffering from this terrible complaint; meanwhile, it will no doubt afford you unmixed satisfaction tolearn, that the remnant of the lepers, in consequence of the assistance from Government before mentioned, are well cared for, and properly tended; that everything is done for them, considering the nature of their complaint, to minister to their necessities and alleviate their sufferings.

The donations received from the several shire councils, were accompanied in each instance with an application for a Life Governorship in connection with the amount. Your Committee, after a careful consideration of the rule relating to life governors, resolved to refer its construction to the consideration of your Annual Meeting, as also the propriety or otherwise, of amending the said rule, to meet the requirements of the shire and municipal

councils.

It has for years been a question of doubt with your several Committees, whether it is properly the duty of the non-resident surgeon to visit poor sick persons outside the institution, and prescribe medicines and medical comforts. In the course of the year, a conference on the subject was held between your Committee and a Sub-Committee from the Ballarat District Hospital. At the several meetings, the matter was exhaustively gone into, but the conference, finding their powers limited by the rules, resolved to refer the question to the annual meeting of each institution. This question will, therefore, come before you this

evening for consideration.

During the year, Ballarat has been visited by two disastrous floods; the latter being unprecedented in its destruction of property and consequent distress. At a public meeting, it was resolved that the town should be canvassed for subscriptions in aid of the sufferers, and a proposition was carried, that your Committee should receive the funds so raised, and, in conjunction with the Ladies' Clothing Society, dispense the relief. The meeting expressing their opinion, that in this way much imposition would be avoided, and the funds carefully dispensed. This, though adding greatly to their labours, your Committee willingly accepted. The amount received amounted to £611.7s. 5d., and refief in clothing, bedding, fuel and cash, amounting to £607.10s. 5d. was dispensed to a large number of persons who had severely suffered, leaving a balance in hand of £3.17s.

The institution was visited in October by the Royal Commissioners on Charitable Institutions, who, after a close inspection of the institution, including the method of keeping accounts &c., expressed in terms of high eulogium, their satisfaction with the management of the institution, and their intention of reporting their opinion to that effect in their report to Government.

That important adjunct to the institution, the Lying-in Hospital, has, your Committee are pleased to report, worked exceedingly well during the year. The cases received have included many very respectable, but poor married women, whose homes were quite unfit for them to live in during their accouchement, and there can be no doubt, that the admission of these poor women to the very superior advantages of the lying-in hospital has been

the means of preserving life.

The cases admitted, in cluded as usual a number of single women, mostly very young; but your Committee desire to call your particular attention to the important fact, that in all these unfortunate cases, not one was found bearing the character of habitual and hardened vice, and the experience of your Committee goes to prove, that abandoned women keep clear of the institution. We think that the attention of the public has been too little directed towards the great and beneficial results achieved by the working of the Lying-in hospital. When the anxiety and agony of mind felt by some of the poor youthful applicants for admission is borne in mind, with the dreadful temptations also to which they

are liable, in consequence of having left their homes, and ashamed as they are to appeal to their friends, the Lying-in hospital must be considered as serving a most noble purpose, in offering a shelter to these poor outcasts, where, with good treatment, the utmost kindness, and judicious advice, they may be persuaded if they have any inclination to do so, to resolve for the future to The attention of the public should also be live blameless. directed to the fact, that the interest of your Committee in these unfortunate young women, does not cease with their admission. Every endeavour is made, when they are convalescent, to procure places for them, their career after leaving the institution being watched with much interest; and, in many instances your Committee can testify to the excellent conduct, and blameless life of those, who, but for the noble hospital in question, would have been outcasts, and probably entirely lost. Your Committee would, therefore, urge upon the public generally to bear these things in mind, when waited upon by the collector of the Institution, as the working of the lying-in-hospital is necessarily expensive, and must, though an adjunct of the Asylum, be considered as a separate institution.

The secretary having reported that the returns from Sebastopol had fallen off and that the out-door relief to that place was
rapidly increasing, as well as the application for admission, your
Committee, in the course of the year, made a special appeal to
the public of that borough for assistance. They are happy to
state that the appeal was handsomely responded to. A monster
tea meeting and concert was organised, which, owing to the
great perseverance and energy brought to bear on all sides,
resulted in a grand success, no less a sum than £100 11s. 9d.
being realised for the institution; and the inhabitants of
Sebastopol are certainly entitled to your best thanks, for the noble
manner in which they came forward to assist the Asylum in its

need

A considerable increase has taken place during the year in the weekly average of out-door relief. In 1869, the weekly average was 245 adults and 253 children—as against 269 adults and 371 children in 1870; making an average weekly increase of 24 adults and 18 children. In the face of this increase, however, the total cost of out-door relief is very nearly the same as in 1869, owing to the reasonable prices for provisions which have ruled during the year.

One or two very distressing features connected with out-door relief should certainly be mentioned, viz, the large and increasing number of invalid husbands, who, with their wives and families, burden the institution. The greater proportion of these cases are miners (with large families) whose constitutions have either become enfeebled by the unhealthy nature of their occupation

or who have been disabled by mining accidents from work ing; The increase, also, in the number in some cases, permanently. of widows, whose husbands have been killed in claims, has caused your Committee much pain and anxiety. Scarcely a week passes but brings with it some deplorable mining calamity, in which one or more poor miners are hurried into eternity, in many instances leaving their widows and children entirely destitute; in most of these cases, immediate application is made to the Asylum for assistance, which, when granted, continues for years. Committee earnestly hope to see, during 1871, a very great reduction in the number of fatal mining accidents, and they also trust that the various gold mining companies, and accident funds. will seriously consider the heavy, and to some extent, hitherto unacknowledged claims, that the Benevolent Asylum has upon - them, for sympathy and support.

During the course of the year, Mr. Mark Young, Vice-Prest dent, resigned in consequence of his removal to Melbourne. The resignation was accepted with much regret; and the best thanks of your Committee were conveyed to him for the valuable services which had been rendered by him to the Institution. Mr. R. Wrigley was unanimously elected Vice-President in his place.

and Mr. J. McCaffierty, a member of your Committee.

On reference to the Table giving a return of the places from whence have been received during the year the cases admitted to the institution, it will be seen that a number of cases came from the Wimmera, Western, and other far-off districts. From these places, during the year, no contributions have been received. Your Committee would, therefore, respectfully recommend to the consideration of their successors in office, the desirability of adopting some plan, by which the whole of the stations in these and other districts may be visited and solicited to contribute, in return for the heavy claims this institution in particular has upon them.

For the collections in aid of the Institution made at Christ Church, St. Patrick's Church, St. Andrew's Church, St. Paul's Church, St. Peter's Church, and the Wesleyan Churches of the Lydiard Street Circuit, the thanks of your Committee are due and hereby conveyed to the respective ministers and con-

gregations,

Your Committee also desire to return their thanks to the press for its continued interest, and courtesy, and especially for the willingness with which it brought to bear its powerful influence in supporting the claims of the institution upon the Government for extended assistance.

The produce of the garden for the past year, estimated at market rates, amounts to £169 7s. Od., and the returns from the iray, charging the current price, leaves a profit balance of £141

7s. 8d. From the sale of pigs, &c, a profit of £95 15s. 10d. has also been realised.

Finally, your Committee trust that the year 1871 may be a prosperous and happy one for the Ballarat Benevolent Asylum, and that all classes will unite to respond in a large-hearted way, to the claims which this noble and rapidly growing institution has upon their pity and sympathies. Owing to the many varieties of relief afforded, its expenditure is necessarily large, and it must ever be borne in nind, that the judicious action of your Committee, in uniting the different kinds of relief under one management, and thus avoiding the erection, and consequent heavy expenses of separate institutions, has been the means of a great saving of the public funds, but your Committee do not see that this course has had any appreciable effect in increasing, as it ought to do, the contributions. It cannot be too often repeated, that the Benevolent Asylum in not one institution, but several, combined under one management, including in its recipients every form of human misery and suffering. The blind, the lane, the mutilated, the deformed, the aged, infirm, and destitute, masting consumptive, and all forms of chronic disease; the widow and orphan, the leper, and other forms of woe and want, to onune rous to mention, find shelter, aid, and sympathy, under the corprehensive relief afforded by the Ballarat Benevolent Asylum. The space at the disposal of your Committee, is too limited to do justice to the claims of the Asylum upon the public for sympathy and support, but they trust, that under the influence of Divine Providence, the hearts of all may be moved to compassion, who are able in any way to contribute to the necessities of the Institution, and so lessen in some degree, the great extent of human misery, and destitution, that exist all around.

#### RULES

OF

# The Ballarat Benevolent Asylum,

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

#### Objects:-

To relieve the Aged, Infirm, Disabled, and Destitute, and to minister to their necessities according to the ability of the Institute.

#### Life Governors.

1. Every donor of £10 or upwards, every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which a bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution, shall be a Life Governor.

#### Annual Governors.

- 2. A donation of not less than £20 from a shire council, road board, or nunicipal council, shall entitle the mayor, president, or chairman of the body donating to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all the yearly and other special meetings of Governors, provided, in the case of a new subscriber, he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such a meeting.
- 3. The institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen

Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually, by and from the Governors in the month of January in each year.

- 4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired term, except in the case of a Trustee, or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of the Governors.
- 5. The annual meeting of the Governors of the institution shall be held in the month of January in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.
- 6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days notice in one or more of the daily Ballarat papers, of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned.
- 7 At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half-an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time, within seven days, when such adjourned meeting shall be held.
- 8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the institution, shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulations, the same not being contrary to the general rules, appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the institution, shall meet one day in each month and at other days as they shall appoint, admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment, and shall appoint sub-committees for all necessary purposes, and auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but no deliberative vote.
- 9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be numbers ex-officio of all Committees.
- to. All sub-committees shall have, at least, five members, three to form a quorum.
- 11. The accounts of the institution shall be audited in the month of January in each year.
- 12. Any member of the Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself

for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have any pecuniary interest:

#### Treasurer.

14. All moneys received on account of the institution, shall be paid into the bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the institution under the direction of the Committee of Management.

Secretary.

- 15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and Committee meetings, take ninutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose, and carry out all the directions of such meeting in all particulars incident to his department.
- 16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions, and all moneys due to or receivable by the institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall, within fourteen days of the time of receipt of moneys pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting of the General and House Committee, an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.
- 17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department, keep the accounts of the institution under the direction of the several Committees, compile all reports of the Committees, fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Treasurer.

#### Honorary Medical Officers.

- 18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the institution shall be duly qualified medical practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves, shall have access to the institution at all times, and perform all surgical operations, record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the institution.
- 19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause, shall cease to hold office.
- 20. Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
