## SEVENTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

To mie Governons aid Subscribers-
Your Committee have the honour to report that their year of office has proved one of great labour aud responsibility.

The crowded state of the Institution, the rapidly increasing Ont-door Relief, and the stoppage, comparatively, of several lucrative sources of reveune, cansed much anxiety during the year; and the oner ous duties comnected with the management of this great Institution have only been clischarged at a large expenditure of time and labour, especially in directing that diflicalt, and trying branch of the Asylum's operations--the Out-door Relief:

It is, therefore, very gratifying to find the debt of the Institution at the end of the year, viz, $£ 117115 \mathrm{~s} .10 \mathrm{~d}$, not so lurge as was at one time anticipated, from the excessive demands which were made upon the Asylum's resources.

In spite of the general depression, and the faliture of certain sourecs of revenue which will be referred to presently, the income from all sources shows an advance upon prerious years, especially in the item "private subseriptions," which has been largely increased.

It will be seen, therefore, that great energy has been shown in wrorking up the general subscriptions; this fact, together with the liberality of the public in responding to the calls which have been made on their charity, has prevented what would otherwise have been a very critical financial position at the close of the year.

The bank overdratt on the 31st December was $£ 304615 s .10 \mathrm{~d}$. Against this amount the sum of £1875 is due on account of Goverument grant-in-aid; leaving a debit balance of £1171 15 s .10 d .

At the end of the year the numbers remaining in the Asylum were 196 males, 31 females; total, 227.

During the year there have been admited 134 males and 73 females (including births); so that in all 431 persons have been resident in the Asylum.

Of thesc there have been discharged 130 mates and 77 females (included in these figures are 42 deaths wheh have taken phace during the year)-total, 207; Iearing in the Asyhum on the 31st December 200 males, 27 females; total, 227.

The daily arerage number of immates for the year 187 . was 235 , as against 230 for 1873 , an excess of 5 inusates per diem. It is necessary to explain here that this increase would have been rery much larger if the Asylum was extensive enourh to contain all the deserving applicants for admission, for at periols during the year the Committee were able only to admit cases as racameies arose from death and other causes.

The average cost per head of inmates for 187.1 was $£ 17 \mathrm{LSs} .2 \mathrm{~d}$, being $3 d$. per head under the previous year.

The following Return shows the numaber of inmates on the last day of the year, and the diseases which inctpacitato them from earning a living :-


The reader is requested kindly to panse here anil rellect a little on the above return.

It will be at once seen that the Asylum is ar home for "poor humanity under almost every distressing form of disease or result of aceident to which itis liable. Not only is the helpless paralytic, the wasting consumptive, the poor imbecile, the mimed and deformed, the aged and inftrm, well cared for'; but oren thoso unfortunates to whom the sun is for ever darlisenel, riz, the blind, are admitted, the return showing mo less than 2 cases now resident, receiving the utmost sympathy, and the remaindor of their days rendered as comfortable as the incurable nature of their comp liunt admits.

It should be observed that the inmates represent erery chass of the community; they are admitted from the farm, the station, the office, the workshop, and from the mine. The mechanic, the labourer, and indeed every kind of trado and labour is represented. How great then is the claim of this heavily-burdened Institution upon all classes; and yct, alas, how little does the general
public know of the grand and comprehensive work done by it, even in the couse of one short year.

It is quite certain that the Benerolent Asclum will never receive that extra amount of support to which it is so well entitled, until tho public, not content with merels reading its Annual Reports, will individually make a visit of inspection, and judge for themselves. They will be courteously received by the Master, and the working of the Institution thoroughly explained. They will see sulficient around then to move the sternest heart to compassion; and they will resolve, no doubt, to do their rery utmost to help financially the noble Institution they have just inspected.

To prore this position, the following short extracts from the Asylum's Visiting Book will suftice to show the surprise aud gratification which visitors foel ank express on inspecting tho Institution:-

Extract No. 1.

Aiter waliring through the wards and offices of this establishment with the Master, it afforls me great plensure, as an English J. P. and Poor Law Guardian, to record my high estimation of the cleanliness and order which averywhere exists, which would place the Ballarat Benerolent Asylum on a high platform were it compared with English establishments of a similar Eind.

## THE LYING-TN HOSPITAL.

The Lying-in Hospital continues to be conducted in the same excellent manner as of old, under the supervision of the experienced and efficient Matron and Sub-Matron, and elicits the highest encomiums from all who pay it a misit.

An idea prevails abroad that the inmates received into the Lying-in Hospital are drawn from the rimks of the prolligate and abandoned. Such is not the case. The larege mijority belong to respectable families. In their shame, fearing disgrace and exposure, they fly to the Institution for refuge, in many cases from parental displeasure. Every eflort is kindly made to elicit their name, address, parentage, $\&$ c, in most instances successfully.

The thoughtial reader will at once perceive what an amount of" social and moral grood has been eflected by the efforts of your Committee in this direction.

To quote a flaw instances. Parents are of ten reconciled to their erring but repentant daughters; marriages in some instances have been effected; the miserable runawnys find that human pity and sympathy exist even for them in their shane; in sery many cases situations are secured for the convalescent; and last, but not least, the dreadful and unntural crime of infinticide is greatly diminished. Who shall say, or who can linow, what crime has been averted by the existence of this noble branch of the Institution; and even those few who hold that Lyinr-in Hospitals have a tendency to promote immorality, must agree that it in only one instance an agonized mother in her shome and anguish has been saved from sacrificing the life of her ofts pring, tho Lying-in Hospital in connection with the Ballarat Bencrole ist Asylum has not been built in vain.

Your best thanks are due to the Committee of Ladies, who during the year have so kindly visited and inspected the Lyin. ${ }^{\text {r--in }}$ Hospital.

## OUT-DOOR RELIET:

This branch of relief has seriously increased during the year; the books showing an increase of $2 \overline{5}$ adults and 45 children per week over 1873 ; the averago for 1874 being 405 adults and 564 chiidren, against 380 adults and 519 children for the your previous.

You will form some idea of the magnitude of this item by its cost for the year, viz, £ £31.4, 10 s . Id. You will perhaps a . surprise, "How is it that the Asylum's Out-door Relief las assumed such large proportions. Distress and poverty are not very apparent to us; in what manner is this large sum of £33l4 10s. ld. expended?" The question is certainly a very natural one under the circumstances; for your Committec are well aware that the general public have bat very little iden of the extent of the distress and poverty existing in Ballarat, Sobastopol, $\mathbb{d} c$ owing to the effectual, though silent, way in which rolief is
administered by the Committee, chiefly through the exertions of those gentlomen who act as risitors to the sereral distriets, and who at in great expenditure of time and labour visit the poorest and most wretehed haunts of the suffering poor, and who, in the discharge of their oft uupleasant duty, come in contact with cases of want and misery, sights and scenes, that the majority of the inhabitants would scarcely believe credible.

It is, alis, a common thing for visitors to report that they discovered a family living in, or rather under, an old shed, with holes in the roof and wall, without food and without fire; the father lying ill on it heap of rags; the mother and her children with but searcely afew rags to cover them, lying hutdled on the damp earthen floor, without bedding and without covering, not one of then lnowing from whence the next meal is to come.

This is but one of the many phases of human want and suffering with which your visitors become aequainted in the course of their labours; and it is owing to the fact that the Asslum relieves and cares for the sick, the widow and the orphan, wherever its risitors come aeross them in their wreteheduess, that the general public is so little aware of the want and suffering existing all around them.

The causes for the extent of the Out-door Relief are, of course, numerous; but the two chief causes undoubtedy are-lst. The depression in mining. Not ouly have most of the "large companies ceased operations, thereby throwing hundreds of men out of employment, but what has prored even a greater evil has been the stoppage of so many large tribute parties. Hoping almost against hope, hundreds of miners have persevered in these parties, drifting into hopeless debt, and earning little or nothing. On the breaking up of these tribute parties their funilies are left without any mens The father in most iustances goes up the country in search of work, and his wife and children are at once thrown upon the Benevolent Asylum. Hundreds of pounds have been expended in rolieving cases of this description. 2nd. Intemperance and wife-desertion. The want and misery caused by intemperance and wife-desertion can scareely be calculated; numbers of fimilies have nothing between them and staration but the rations supplied, owing to the drunken habits of the husbrad and father.

Your Committee is frequently placed in the most painful position; they cannot compel the drunken scoundrel to work, and the law does not help them to do so; they cannot see worthy wives and innocent children starve; human sympathy intervenes, and relief is given, but with the greatest reluctance, and a strong desire that some mode could be found for severely punishing the inhuman cause of so much distress. Wifis-desertion also is inereasing year by year to an extent that Government will soon have forced upon them the necessity for further legislation on the subject.

It is impossible, in the narrow limits of an ammal report, to do justice to the Asylum's Out-door Relict, with its ever varying phases of human suffering; it must sulfice to state that your Committee have done their best to deal with it impartially, and to the best of their judgment to check immosition.

The visitors have patiently endenwoured to probe to the bottom all questionable applieations. In doing this thandess work they have travelled over miles and miles of erromnd in all weathers, and at all times of the day and night, elicitime information which has frequently proved of ereat value; but their yeur of offee orer, they foel thankful that in tho perfomance of their bilhicult and responsible duty they have been the means of alleviating so mueh misery and distress. With 385 arlults ind 50.5 children on the outdoor list woekly to supervise, you will see that the members of your Comaitec have it heary task to perform, recuining plenty of time, firmess, experience, and nice discrimination, especially in the discharge of their duty as visitors.

It has been before mentioned that, while the tofal receipts have increased, several important items of revenuc have grently fallen off; these itcms are church collections, gold-mining companies, accident fiands.

The two last items-viz, gold-mining companies and atecident funds-must of course be expected to decrenso; but as regards ehurch collections, your Committec, in thanking hoartily those ministers and congregat ionswhich lave so liberally mate coller aions during the year, would earnestly appeal to the members of thise churches who used to support the Institution, to replace the collections which have been withdrawn, and to aceord ats of old their kindly support for 1875 .

At your last annual meeting directions were eqien to your Committee to consider the best means of recornizine the scrices and speeial extra services of Mr. D. Cazaly, the secretary and Colletor: After consideration, it was resolved that the secretary's salary be increased by $\mathfrak{E} 50$; that in bonus of $\mathbb{E} 50$ le wiven, and the next amual meeting of subscribers be reemmmented to grant another bonus of $£ 50$. Your Commiltee therefore bey to recommend the same.

For many years, in one anmall report after another, your Committee have protested against the unequal way in which the Institution is supported, as shown by its amalysis of subseriptions. It is still the case that Ballarat is burdened to supprort eases for which it is not responsible; a large number contimue to be admitted who have for years beeu resident over one hundred miles away. While it is true that these cases belong to the Asylum's district, it is also painfully true that the inhabitants of distant shires contribute little or nothing. Miserable support is received from station-holders and station lands. Your Committeo trust their successors in office will take some vigorous action in this
direction, and either firmly close the doors of the Institution against the admission of cases from these parts, or compel the wealthy station and farm holders who abound in the Asylum's distriet to contribute to the Institution into which they pour their incurable and broken-down cascs. The time has at length arrived when this must be done. The large reduction made lately by the Batlarat City Council in their grant, aud on the abore grounds is in most respects just; but the loss accruing from these reductions will have to bo made good by the imhabitants of the surrounding shires and their respective councils, or our successors will find that they will be neeessitated to narow the Asylum's district to the area from whence it derives its main support. From the Shires of Wimmera, Stawell, St. Arnaud, Taibot, Lexton, and Ararat, very little is coutributed, while 49 cases were receivel from these shires during 1874 , at an expenditure of $£ 892$.
l'inally, your Committee trust that, though commencing their labours with adebt of E1171 L5s. 10d., their sucessors will have a prosperous and successtul ycar.

Happily, the Benevolent Asylum during the last year or two has been gainiag great ground in the sympathy and ippreciation of the public, which is beginning at length to cutertain a just idea of the namernitudo and blesseduess of the work which it performs. This growing sympathy has been liberally shown by the contributions received, and ine kindly efforts which have been made on atl sides (within a certain radius of Ballurat) to assist the Institution in its need by the aid of fietes, concerts, soirces, \&c.

Your Committee trust this appreciative sym pathy will continuc; for thoy are convined that just in proportion as the people becone acpuainted with the work done by this noble Institution, so will be the measure of the support accorded.

It is impossible to deny that, in comparison with the public and moral good it has achiered, its large expenditure, its many branches ot rehef", and the area of its operations, the Institution has searcely received from the public that extra financial support to which it is entitled; but, as has been observed, a change is taking place for the better in these respects, so that your Committee have little doubt that, with God's blessin, c , the labours of an energet ic Committee, united with the perseverame of its zealous officers, will be crowned with success, and that the year 1875 will be a prosperous and happy one for the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum and Lying-m Hospital.

## $R$ ULES

OF TIE

## BALLARAT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM,

adopted by the governors, jan. $24,1867$.

## Obricets:-

To Relieve the Aged, Infirsi, Disabled, and Destitute, and TO MINISTER TO TIEIT NHCLSSITLES, LCCORDING TO TIE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

## LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of $£ 10$ and upwards ; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of $£ 20$ or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; anf person appointed by any society paying the sum of $x 20$; the executor, or, if more than ono, the first named in any will, by which a bequest of $£ 20$ or upwards, shall be paill to the Institution, shall be Life Governors, and my other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to tho Iustitut ion, shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOFERNOLS.
2. A donation of not less than $£ 20$ from a shife council, road board, or municipal council, shall entitle the mayor, presidont, or chairman of the body donating to be an Anmal Governor. Every subseriber of f1 and upwards, annually, shall bo an Aunund Governor, to date from the time of payiag sucls subscription, and entitled to vote at all the yearly and other speciai meetings of Governors ; provided, in the case of a now subseriber ho shall have paid bis donation or subseription seven days betore such it meeting.
3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees,
a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Oflicers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually, by and from the Governors, in the month of Jamuary in each year.
4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired term, except in the case of a Trustee, or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of the Governors.
5. The annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of January in each rear, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.
6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on recciving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twentyfour Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days. notice in one or more of the daily Ballarat papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting, except that for which it shall have been summoned.
7. At the annual or other special meeting of Gorernors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if atter the expiration of half-an-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall hare power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time, within seven days, when such adjourned meeting shall be held.
8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the institution ; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment; and shall appoint sub-committees for all necessary purposes, and auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but no deliberative vote.
9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be members ex officio of all committees.
10. All sub-committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.
11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of January in each year.
12. Any member of the Comntice of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medieal Officers) absenting himself for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.
13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have any pecuniary interest.

## THEASURER.

14. All moneys receired on account of the Institution, shall be paid into the bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Tastitution, under the direction of the Committec of Manargmont.

## sechetalit.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and committee meetings ; take minutes of all the procecdings ramsacted at such meetings, and trans cribe them carctilly into the books kept for that purpose ; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.
16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions, and all moneys due to or receivable by the Institution, in all censes giving receipts, and shall, within fourteen days of the time of receipt of moneys, pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting of the Gencral or House Conmittee, an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.
17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the elerical business of his deprertment, keep the areonuls of tho Institution under the direction of the several Committees, compile all reports of the Committees, fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical cluties connected with the office of Treasurer.

## TONORAMY MEDICAI OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qua lified medical practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themsclves; shall have aceess to the Institution at all times; perform all surgicel operations, and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.
19. Any Honorary Medieal Officer neglecting his duty withont reasonable cause, shall cease to hold ollice.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the rules, shall give the Secretary at loast fourteen days notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
