TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS—

It will interest you to know that your Committee have had the honor of administering the affairs of this great and useful charity through the twenty fifth year of its existance, and that on the completion of a quarter of a century's experience in dealing with the misery, suffering, and want of an immense district, embracing a population of 150,000 souls, your Committee are enabled to present a report of their year's work of so favorable a character.

Although the loss financially, arising from the New Australasian Mine disaster was very large, in consequence of so many sources of revenue being diverted to the fund for the relief of the widows and survivors of that sad catastrophe, and in face of great mining depression, and general dulness of business, yet your income has been well sustained, and this must be considered as exceedingly creditable under the adverse circumstances.

The balance due bank amounts to £1779 10s. 5d., against which the sum of £1400 is due from Government, leaving a debit balance of £379 10s. 5d.

The daily average number of inmates was 253, an increase of six upon the year previous.

The average cost per head, £19 13s. 2d., is 1s. 7d. more than 1882.

The total expenditure shows an increase of £560 12s. 11d., due mainly to the increased price of meat, on which important item of consumption there has been an advance in cost of no less than £670 12s. Fortunately, other items, such as flour, potatoes, groceries, &c, were much cheaper, so your average cost per head would have considerably increased.

At the end of 1882 there remained in the Asylum 243 cases. There were admitted during the year 213; so that in all 456 cases have been resident. 214 of these have been discharged or died, leaving in the Asylum on 31st. December 242 cases.

The garden produce is estimated in value to amount to £152 0s. 6d., and the dairy realised a net profit of £155 11s. 10d.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The cost of Out Door Relief was £2450 0s. 9d., an increase of £250 6s. 1d., caused partly by the advanced price of meat, and partly by the increase in the number of recipients.

During the year 1880 to 1882 inclusive, a steady fall took place annually in the number of Out Door Recipients, but the past year shows an increase of no less than 21 adults and 35 children per week. To the depression in mining, and general dullness of business, is no doubt owing this advance in numbers.

The average cost per week of each individual was 1s. 3½d., an increase of ½d. over previous year, the cause of which has been already referred to. The number of rations issued were 38,279, an increase of 2873.

The number of families relieved was 472; ditto of individuals 1030; the weekly average being 388 adults and 348 children.

It is not your Committee's intention in this report to enter at any length upon the difficulties and details of this most important branch of the Institution's work, arduous as it is, and entailing as it does so much anxiety upon those who administer it, but you will be pleased to know that a few weeks ago a most searching examination of the whole of the Out Door cases elicited the important fact that in not a single instance could a case be found of positive imposition, and although the public were intreated and challenged by means of the Press to give confidential information of cases imposing on the Charity, up to this time not one case has been brought forward. No better proof of the vigilance with which the Out Door Relief is administered can be afforded.

Grateful reference must be made to the authorities of St. Patrick's Church in raising so handsome a collection on Good Friday, also to the Charity Sunday Committee for its generous efforts, to the gentlemen who so kindly and effectually supervise the Out Door cases at a distance, and your honorary medical officers, Drs. Whitecombe, Radcliffe, and Usher, ever ready as they are to give their able professional aid when called upon.

Such valuable and useful service to the Institution has been rendered by the several branches of the Ballarat District Mutual Improvement Association, in giving first-class concerts to the inmates every three weeks, and at their own cost purchasing a first-class piano, which is kept at the Asylum under the Master's charge, that your Committee have the greatest pleasure in recommending that Mr. W. H. Burton and Mr. W. D. Hill, nominated by the Association, be elected Life Governors of the Institution as a mark of your appreciation of the valuable services rendered.

During the year conferences have been held with ladies representing the Committee of the Female Refuge *in re* the advisability of that Institution taking over the lying-in cases from the Benevolent Asylum. Nothing practical has been the outcome at present, but as this important question has been postponed for a month, our successors in office will no doubt deal with it, in the best interest of both Institutions.

The limits of this report will not permit of this matter being dealt with at length, but as many of you are not aware of the causes which led to the conferences referred to, it should be pointed out that every year the applications for admission to the Asylum are increasing, and great pressure felt from the want of room, so that the time is not far distant when you will be called on to

decide whether you will erect a new wing at a large expense, or hand over the lying-in cases to the Refuge Committee, in doing which you will, subject of course to the consent of the Government, have to render the ladies adequate financial assistance.

Uneasiness has been felt for a long time at the possibility of a fire breaking out at the Institution, and the absence of all precautions for extinguishing the same should such occur.

Having secured by the kindness of Mr. Service, an increase in the grant-in-aid, your Committee were determined that this danger should exist no longer, and the following precautions have been carried out.

1st. A large main has been laid down from Pyre street along Talbot street and into the rear of the Asylum grounds, and a stand-pipe with two branches affixed thereto; hose in connection therewith has been purchased of sufficient length to throw a stream of water over the extremest portions of the building. In addition pipes have been carried into every ward with taps, hose, and nozzles attached, so that at the smallest appearance of fire every portion of the ward concerned can be reached. Your Committee is greatly indebted to Captains Morris and Hemmah for kindly planning out and supervising the whole work, and also to Mr. Cameron, foreman of the Water-Commission, for gratuitously superintending the laying down of the mains, &c

The great extent of the Asylum's work, and the many interesting details connected with its several branches of relief, renders it very difficult for your Committee to be as brief and concise as an annual report demands.

They cannot but express their regret that the work done so silently and without publicity is so little known generally, and it is to be hoped that some plan will be presently devised by which the work and its results may be lucidly and effectively brought under the notice of the residents of Ballarat and district.

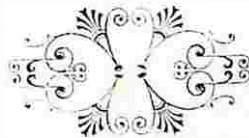
The foregoing, therefore, must be looked upon as but a slight sketch of the year's proceedings, containing little more than an account of the Institution's finances, &c.

Your Committee, however, cannot close their Report without referring to the statement of their predecessors that the coming

17th March will fully complete the twenty-fifth year of the Asylum's existence, the foundation-stone having been laid on the 17th March, 1851), and endorsing fully their suggestion, that the close of such an interesting epoch shall be celebrated in some fitting way in which all can join who have worked for, or assisted in carrying out, the grand and noble work of the Institution during the past closing period of a quarter of a century.

Such a gathering will not only afford a pleasant occasion for past and present members of Committee, Subscribers, and well wishers, to meet and compare experiences, but it may also be made most useful as a means of disseminating valuable and extensive information in connection with the Asylum's work.

Last, but not least, the principle underlying such an interesting gathering would naturally be a feeling of thankfulness to the Great President of all Charities for the uniform and unbroken prosperity and success that has attended the Asylum's work throughout so long a period, for the unmeasurable good that has been effected, the extent of which, both moral and physical, is known to the All Seeing One alone, and to afford a pleasant opportunity for all heartily to join in expressing the hope that the conclusion of another twenty-five years labors on behalf of suffering humanity will find the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum as effective in its humane work, and as prosperous in condition, as for the period which will close on the coming 17th March, 1884.

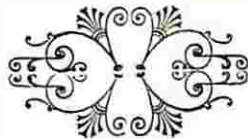

RULES

OF THE

Ballarat Benevolent Asylum,

Adopted by the Governors 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS:—

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE,
AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO THE
ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upwards from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution, shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President,

or Chairman of the body donating, to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided, in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management, consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually by and from the Governors in the month of January in each year.

4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired term, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of January in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half an hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its

internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment: and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be members, *ex-officio*, of all committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of January in each year.

12. Any member of the Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and committee meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all moneys due

to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall, within fourteen days of the time of receipt of moneys, pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting of the General or House Committee an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Secretary.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified medical practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations, and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
