THE THIRTIETH REPORT
 OF THE

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS,—

Since your last meeting, the Committee are pleased to report that the management and general arrangements connected with the workings of the Institution have progressed smoothly and satisfactorily, and they trust that what they have done in the interest of the Institution during the past 12 months will meet with your general approval. This being the close of the first financial year that the books of this Institution have been kept in accordance with the Government ledger, therefore, you will perceive a slight difference in the Balance-sheet submitted. Although the past year has been one of great scarcity of money, coupled with the falling off in mining dividends in this district, and the numerous efforts put forth in collecting for other distant claims (such as the Bulli and Lady Loch funds), we are pleased to say, through great energy and untiring efforts, the list of subscribers has been considerably increased, and the receipts will compare favorably with previous years.

In addition to the Maintenance Fund, a special appeal was made to the public in aid of the Building Fund, and by this effort they were able to claim the Government Special Grant of £500, and, with a legacy of £240 16s. 6d., the Building Fund was increased to the sum of £1002 10s. This was thought a sufficient sum to warrant the Committee in calling for tenders for the erection of the new ward, when that of Messrs. Drew and Rogers was accepted, for £875.

The pleasing duty of laying the foundation and memorial stones of the new "Victoria" Ward, by your President (Mr. Joseph Phillips) and Treasurer (Mr. C. C. Shoppee), took place on the 29th April, 1887, with great *eclat*, and in honor of this event the inmates were regaled with refreshments. It is expected that the new ward will be finished and opened by the end of October. In consequence of the remarks made by the President at the laying of the foundation-stone, viz., "that he hoped that the day was not far distant when they would be in a position to build cottages for the old married couples, so that they might pass their days together, and not be separated as

at present," the Committee are pleased to say that the Rev. R. Johnson Mercer, who was present at the ceremony above alluded to, was so much impressed by the President's remarks that he kindly sent a donation of £5 as a nucleus of a fund for that purpose, which has been supplemented by £5 donated by Mr. E. Morey, and placed to Building Fund No. 2 Account. Through the interest that the Rev. R. Johnson Mercer has displayed, and does take in the well-being of the Institution, the Committee feel deeply indebted to him, as, by his interposition, this charity has derived substantial assistance—notably, a sum of £240 16s. 6d., on the 25th March.

The former Committee having entered into arrangements for the repairs of the building, and as suggested by them, a deputation went to Melbourne, and waited upon the Premier, with a view to obtain an additional sum to augment the Maintenance Fund, but we are sorry to say they were only able to gain the sum of £100. The sum of £784 4s. has been expended on building repairs, and £866 5s. 9d., being bank overdraft from previous year, making together the sum of £1650 9s. 9d. taken from the Maintenance Fund, leaves a heavy debt of £1471 11s. 2d. to commence the year upon which we are entering, and the Committee would suggest to the incoming Committee that an increased amount in the maintenance grant will be urgently needed. And in addition to this, a sum of £500 will be required from the Government to enable the Committee to make a commencement with the long-needed cottages for the married couples, and it will therefore be necessary to send down a deputation to wait upon the Government to obtain the required assistance, viz., maintenance grant and a special building grant of £500.

In consequence of the ever-increasing poverty in the district, the Committee have been compelled to turn the large reading-room upstairs into a sleeping ward, thereby giving accommodation for 18 more inmates, and having done this, the Asylum is still crowded out, and cases are waiting to be admitted; hence the necessity for an increased grant to maintain the poor and destitute in our midst. When the present Hospital Ward is relieved of the chronic cases by the opening of the "Victoria" Ward, an additional 12 beds will be made up.

In honor of the Jubilee Celebration, the inmates were treated to Christmas fare, and a Musical Entertainment in the evening.

For a great part of the past year the Committee have been deprived of the valuable assistance of two of their prominent members, viz., Mr. James Oddie and Mr. J. Ferguson, the former having left for England, and the latter for Gippsland.

The Government Inspector, Captain Evans, visited the Asylum in March last, and audited the accounts, and, with trifling exceptions, reported that he was much pleased with the general well-appointed arrangements and workings of the Institution.

The daily average number of inmates of the Asylum has been 245 $\frac{1}{2}$, or 13 $\frac{1}{2}$ more than that of last year, and the average cost per head is equal to £18 3s. 9d. per annum, as against £17 10s. 9d. for 1885. This increase is partly accounted for by the maintenance account being chargeable with building maintenance and furniture maintenance for the year, as ordered by the Government Inspector. At the end of last year there were 257 inmates in the Asylum—male and female, and during the past 12 months 186 more have been admitted, making together 443. Of these, 125 have been discharged and 55 died: together equals 180; thus leaving 263 in the Asylum, on the 30th June, 1887. Births during the year:—Males, 18; females, 15; total, 33.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The cost of out-door relief for the year has amounted to £2119 15s. 6d., as against £2181 19s. 3d. for 1885.

The cost of each individual ration was as follows:—Adults, 1/11, including 3 lbs. bread, 8 lbs. meat, 2 lbs. flour, $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. sugar, 2 ozs. tea. Children—8 $\frac{1}{2}$ d., including 2 lbs. bread, 2 lbs. meat, 1 lb. flour.

The number of cases admitted into the Lying-in Hospital during the past 12 months is 38; 35 confinements took place, resulting in the birth of 33 children and two still-born; mortality, one woman and two children; one woman left without being confined.

In conclusion, we may state that in addition to other duties, the Committee have devoted some time to the revision of their code of bye-laws, for the more efficient and harmonious working of the machinery of this charity.

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS :

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE,
AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO
THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards ; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upward from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions toward such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution, shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President, or Chairman of the Body donating, to be an Annual Governer. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided, in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually, by and from the Governors in the month of July in each year.

4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired terms, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of July in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half an hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment; and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer, shall be members *ex officio*, of all Committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of July in each year.

12. Any member of Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and Committee meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all monies to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within fourteen days of the time of receipt of monies, pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting to the General or House Committee an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Secretary.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold Office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
