THE THIRTY-FIRST REPORT

OF THE
COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

Ballararat District Benevolent Asylum

For Year Ending 30th June, 1888.



TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS,—

The Committee at the close of another year are pleased to report that the general condition and workings of the Institution in all its various branches are in a highly satisfactory state, and they express feelings of gratitude to the subscribers and friends who have generously assisted in placing means at their disposal to alleviate the sufferings of the destitute and aged poor of the district.

In our last report we referred to the laying of the foundation stone of the new Victoria ward for chronic patients. We have now the gratification of announcing its completion. It was formally opened on the 14th February by the President, Mr. John Hickman, J.P., in the presence of the Committee and a number of ladies and friends. The ward has been greatly admired by the public and visitors from various parts of the world, and is highly appreciated by the poor suffering patients, who will end their lives there. This ward has also received the highest encomiums from the Government Inspector, Captain Evans, for its suitability for the purpose for which it has been erected. In regard to light, ventilation, and loftiness, it approaches perfection. Captain Evans, the Inspector of Charities, paid his annual visit to the Asylum on the 2nd June, and expressed great satisfaction at the orderly and cleanly condition of the house and grounds. He likewise audited the books and accounts of the Institution, the same being found correct.

The Committee desire to impress upon their successors the absolute necessity of renovating and painting the buildings, a work which is much needed. With this object in view the architect has submitted an estimate of the probable cost, which is about £700. To meet this extra outlay some special effort will have to be made during the coming year.

The Committee have much pleasure in reporting that the financial position of the Institution is sound. The bank overdraft as seen by the balance sheet submitted being only £255 6s. 10d.

The daily average number of inmates for the year has been 257, or 11.50 more than that of the previous year. The number of inmates on the 30th June, 1887, was 209 males and 54 females; total, 263. The number admitted during the year was 82 males and 76 females; total, 158. Total of all, 421. Of these 63 males and 70 females were discharged; 32 males and 10 females died; total number discharged and died, 175, leaving 246 inmates in the Asylum, viz., 196 males and 50 females, on 30th June, 1888. The average cost per head has been £16 3s. 9d., as against £18 3s. 9d. for the year ending 30th June, 1887.

Thirty-three cases were admitted during the year into the Lying-in Hospital; 32 children being born, viz., 12 males and 20 females, one being still-born. No deaths occurred during the year. The average period spent by the patients in this department is 41.27 days.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The cost of out-door relief amounted to £2076 5s. 10d., as against £2119 15s. 6d. the previous year, being a reduction of £43 9s. 8d.

Being an increase of 7 adults and a decrease of 19 children. The average cost per head per annum is £3 3s. 5d., or per week 1s. 2 $\frac{3}{4}$ d.

Mr. John Murray, J.P., one of the Vice-Presidents, resigned during the year, his place on the Committee being filled up by the appointment of Mr. David Cooke; Mr. W. Scott being appointed Vice-President. The Committee also lost the services of Mr. T. Taylor, who left the district. His resignation occurring towards the close of the year it was deemed inadvisable to fill up the vacancy till the annual election.

Visitors will doubtless observe a pleasing change in the aspect of the grounds of the Asylum. While the ornamental is not neglected, due attention is paid to the kitchen garden, which

not only supplied abundance of vegetables for the whole of the establishment, but left a surplus which realised the sum of £37 15s. 3d. The whole reflects great credit upon Mr. Saunders, the gardener.

The Committee desire to express their high appreciation of the efficient manner in which the Superintendent and Matron of the Institution, and also the paid Medical Officer and the Secretary, have discharged the duties of their respective offices.

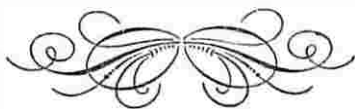
The Committee gratefully acknowledge the subscriptions, both large and small, received during the year, which appear in the appendix. Amongst those received the Committee desire specially to make mention of the following munificent donations and liberality in the cause of the poor they would wish to see emulated by other gentlemen of affluence:—A Friend, £150; Mr. Martin Loughlin, J.P., £50; Sir W. J. Clarke, £40; a Friend, £25; Sir Samuel Wilson, £20; Mr. H. D. Cane, £20; Mr. Andrew Munro, £20; and Mr. G. L. Nase, £20.

The system of affording relief adopted by your Committee will compare favorably with the Poor Law system obtaining in the Old Country, under which the condition of the pauper, as he is termed, is little removed from that of the prisoner in the gaol. The quantity and quality of the food which he receives is just barely enough to keep body and soul together; he is also degraded by being obliged to wear a workhouse uniform, and the rigid unvarying nature appertaining to the system is calculated to make him keenly feel his position and lose his individuality of character. Here on the contrary our inmates receive an ample supply of nutritious, wholesome food, consisting of meat, bread and vegetables, with tea or coffee, and are clad in good warm clothing like that worn by people outside, which is also kept neat and clean, partaking as little as possible of the appearance of uniform. They are also provided with clean beds, and allowed exercise daily in the grounds of the Institution. They are, moreover, permitted to go out to see their friends once a week. Every opportunity is afforded for Ministers of their respective denominations visiting them, and they are besides allowed on Sundays to attend their various churches for Divine service. The system of giving out-door relief partakes as little as possible of an eleemosynary character unlike the mode obtaining in the Old Country, where paid relieving officers discharge this duty in a perfunctory manner—this portion of the Committee's labors being carried out by themselves. The city and town are mapped out into districts for this purpose, two of the members being appointed for each. The recipients are visited by the members of each district once a month, who make a report to

the General Committee as to whether it is desirable or not to continue the relief afforded. These visits are in most cases looked forward to with pleasure by the recipients themselves, who are grateful for the sympathy and advice which they receive from the visitors, and which make them feel that though poor they are not utterly neglected. Deserted wives and widows left with young helpless children are thus provided with timely assistance, which enables them to bring them up in their own houses, so that they may become useful and respectable members of society. Several young men now in good positions in the Colony have been brought up in this manner. The Committee would here remark that there is little if any abuse of the charity, and if there is, a few rations will count for nothing when it is taken into account that by being too rigid there would be a possibility of some persons perishing of want.

The Committee desire to make special reference in this report to the very valuable services rendered to the Institution by the Treasurer, Mr. C. C. Shoppee, J.P., in connection with a business of great importance with which they had entrusted him. This business was, by his skill, prudence and indefatigableness, brought to a successful issue, resulting in a great benefit to one of the inmates of the Asylum as well as to the Institution itself. The Committee are fully persuaded that the governors and subscribers are under a deep debt of gratitude to this gentlemen for the services above referred to.

In conclusion it has been the earnest endeavor of your Committee to relieve God's poor, irrespective of creed or country, and they hope that the beneficent system of relieving the poor which has worked so successfully for the past thirty years in connection with the Ballarat Benevolent Asylum will be perpetuated by those who shall succeed them.

RULES

OF THE

Ballararat District Benevolent Asylum,

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS:

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE, AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upward from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions toward such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President, or Chairman of the Body donating, to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards, annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided, in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually by and from the Governors in the month of July in each year.

4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired terms, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a general meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of July in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half an hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment; and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be members *ex officio*, of all Committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of July in each year.

12. Any member of Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and Committee meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all monies to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within fourteen days of the time of receipt of monies, pay over the same into the bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting to the General or Executive Committee an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Secretary.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
