THE THIRTY-SECOND REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum AND LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

For the Year ending 30th June, 1889.

To the Governors and Subscribers.

At the close of another year it will be interesting to you to hear that the number of applications for relief is considerably less than that of the previous year, the number of out-door applicants exhibiting a marked difference. You will also observe a slight variation in the average number of inmates.

The Committee are pleased to report that in terminating their year of office, each branch in connection with the Institution is in a very efficient state.

The Balance-sheet submitted shows that the financial position will compare favourably with most of the former years, the bank overdraft standing at £380 ls. 10d. on the 30th June, 1889.

All the urgent and legitimate demands of the poor which have been made on your Institution have been successfully met by your Committee.

The labour and difficulty of discriminating between the absolutely needy, and cases of imposition, is at no time easy, but the number of your representatives gives a power that could hardly be attained by a smaller board, as but few local cases of distress come before any meeting that the needs and circumstances of each are not known to one or more of the gentlemen present.

Remoter cases of destitution are watched over and duly reported on by a number of gentlemen resident in country towns and shires,

who are appointed annually; and no district connected with your charity is without a vigilant representative to assist the indigent and guard against imposture.

In the year 1887, a fund having been opened for the purpose of erecting a number of cottages for the use of destitute and infirm married couples, a deputation consisting of the Hon. David Han, M.L.C., and Messrs. James Russell, M.L.A., and C. C. Shoppée, J.P., at the commencement of the financial year, waited on the Hon. the Premier, soliciting a special grant in aid of this fund. These gentlemen succeeded in obtaining the promise of a grant of £500 from the Government, which amount has been received. This sum, together with other special amounts collected, furnished the means that warranted your Committee in calling for, and accepting, tenders for the erection of five brick cottages, all of which are expected to be ready for occupation in the coming spring.

The long-needed work of painting the exterior of the Asylum was begun on the 25th March last, and it will, when finished, very much improve the appearance of the imposing Elizabethan pile, of which the citizens of Ballarat and Ballarat East may well feel proud. The interior, too, has been painted where found necessary, and the walls whitened, the work being done by some of the inmates, the whole presenting now a cheerful and cleanly appearance, justifying the encomiums that have been passed upon it by numerous visitors, both British and Colonial, for cleanliness.

Since our last report the daily average number of inmates for the year was 252 $\frac{1}{2}$, or 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ less than that of the previous year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1888, was 196 males and 50 females; total, 246. The number admitted during the year was 105 males and 70 females; total of all, 421. Of these, 87 males and 70 females have been discharged (including 43 who have died); total 157, leaving in the Asylum at the end of the year, 214 males and 50 females; total, 264.

The average cost per head for this year has been £16 7s. 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ d, as against £16 3s. 9d. for the year ending 30th June, 1888.

Thirty-seven cases were admitted during the year into the Lying-in Hospital, three adults and three infants remaining from the previous year; total, 40 adults and three infants. Thirty-one children were born (15 males and 16 females), and 2 stillborn, and 35 adults and 31 infants discharged, leaving five adults and three infants in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1889. No deaths occurred during the year, which speaks well for the care and management of this department. The average period spent by these patients in the Institution was 32.70 days.

The returns from the dairy show a considerable profit, as will appear from the following statement, estimating the price of milk

and butter at 3d. per quart for the former, and 7½d and 1s. 2d. per pound for the latter:—

The estimated value of produce derived from the garden amounts to the sum of £242 15s. 2d.. The vegetables supplied to the Asylum amounts to £231 3s. 5d., while the surplus sold realised the sum of £11 1s. 9d.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The cost of out-door relief during the year amounted to £1,770 1s. 6d., as against the sum of £2,076 5s. 10d. the previous year, showing a reduction of £306 4s. 4d. The average number of recipients per week for the year ending 30th June, 1888, was 416 adults and 239 children, and for the year ending 30th June, 1889, 364 adults and 189 children, being a decrease of 52 adults and 50 children. The average cost per head per annum for each adult and child was £3 4s. 0½d., and per week, 1s. 2½d. The Committee reiterate what was said in their last report as to the manner in which this delicate part of its duties are carried out:—"The system of giving out-door relief partakes as little as possible of an eleemosynary character, unlike the mode obtaining in the Old Country, where paid relieving officers discharge this duty in a perfunctory manner—this portion of the Committee's labors being carried out by themselves. The city and town are mapped out into districts for this purpose, two of the members being appointed for each. The recipients are visited by the members of each district once a month, who make a report to the General Committee as to whether it is desirable or not to continue the relief afforded. These visits are in most cases looked forward to with pleasure by the recipients themselves, who are grateful for the sympathy and advice which they receive from the visitors, and which make them feel that though poor they are not utterly neglected."

The Committee desire to make special reference to the noble and munificent bequest of £5,000 made to this Institution by the late Hon. Francis Ormond.

The subscriptions, both great and small, which have been received from all sources during the year, are very gratefully acknowledged, and the Committee desire specially to mention the following


liberal donations, viz.:—A Friend, £70; Sir W. J. Clarke, £40; A Friend, £40; Hon. James Campbell, £25; Hon. David Ham, £20; Sir Samuel Wilson, £20; and Mr. Martin Loughlin, J.P., £20. Valuable assistance has been rendered in raising funds by the Ministers and Congregations of the various churches, and all these efforts are fully appreciated. The Committee also return their thanks to all concerned in raising the handsome sums collected on Charity Sunday. Thanks are also due to those Ladies and Gentlemen who have kindly given their time and services in getting up benefits in aid of the funds of the Institution.

The Honorary Medical Officers, Drs. Whitcombe, Radcliffe and Usher, are cordially remembered for their kind and gratuitous labours in attending the suffering poor.

The Committee are also grateful to the Ladies' Visiting Committee, who have kindly administered comfort and consolation to the afflicted inmates.

Your Committee also desire to express their acknowledgment for the kind services rendered by many friends in forwarding contributions, such as books, illustrated, and other newspapers, flowers, fruit, &c., for the use of the inmates; and they trust that they will continue these acts of kindness, which, no doubt, are duly appreciated by the recipients.

In conclusion, your Committee trust that the like liberal support will be accorded in the future, as received in the past, so that the Institution may be in a position to keep pace with the requirements for relief of the poor of the district.



RULES

OF THE

BALLARAT DISTRICT BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS:

To RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE,
AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO
THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upward from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions toward such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution shall be a Life Governor.

ANNUAL GOVERNOR S.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President, or Chairman of the Body donating, to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscription, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors, all of whom, except the Trustees, shall be elected annually by and from the Governors in the month of July in each year.

4. In the event of any vacancy occurring in the Committee of Management, the said Committee shall have the power to fill up the vacancy for the unexpired terms, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a General Meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of July in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a special meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition, signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twenty-four Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such special meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the annual or other special meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of half an hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment; and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting, but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be members *ex officio* of all Committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of July in each year.

12. Any member of Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months, without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all annual, special, and Committee meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all monies to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within fourteen days of the time of receipt of monies, pay over the same into the Bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting to the General or Executive Committee an account of the sums and names of the persons from whom the same have been received.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution under the direction of the several Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques and perform all the clerical duties connected with the office of Secretary.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
