THIRTY-SIXTH REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

Ballanat B istict Benevolent Asylum And LYING-IN HOSPITAL, FOR YEAR ENDING 30TH JUNE, 1893.

To the Governors and Subscribers.

The Committee of Management of the Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum have the lonor of laying before you their thirty-sixth Report, together with the Balance-sheet, for the year ending 30th June, 1893.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 308, being 24 more than that of the previous year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1892, was 226 males and 67 females; total, 293. The number admitted during the year was 100 males and 124 females; total, 224; total of all, 517. Of these, 61 males and 106 females were discharged, 27 males and 7 females died, leaving in the Asylum at the end of the year 238 males and 78 females; total, 316, being an increase, as compared with former year, of 12 males and 11 females; total, 23. The average cost of maintenance per head has been £18 9s. 04d, as against £17 15s. 23d. for the year ending 30th June, 1892.

It is gratifying to note that the mortality for the year has been much smaller than previous ones, considering the increased number of inmates.

Mr. Brett, Inspector of Public Charities, made his annual official visit to the Asylum on the 10th January, 1893. He reported favourably upon the condition of the Institution, and the general health of the inmates, and also that the books and accounts were correct and in good order. A number of useful suggestions which he made in connection with the management of the House have been carried out by your Committee. The value of the produce derived from the garden for the past year, taken at market rates, is estimated at £202 18s. 2d., the vegetables supplied to the House amounting to £201 7s. 2d. and the surplus sold realising £1 11s. 0d.

LYING IN HOSPITAL.

The number of cases admitted during the year was 66; 6 adults and 1 infant remaining from the previous year; total, 72 adults and 1 infant. 61 children were born, and 1 still-born (31 males and 31 females); 61 adults and 57 infants were discharged, and 1 died, leaving 11 adults and 4 infants in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1893. The average period spent by these patients in the Institution was 43:33 days.

The Committee desire to express their appreciation of the excellent manner in which both the Master and Matron have discharged their respective duties. Everything is done by them that can be done for the comfort and happiness of the inmates; and the greatest care is taken that the food, which is plentifully supplied, is properly cooked and served up. The Asylum is a model of neatness, cleanliness, and order; and the happy condition of the old people is a constant subject of remark from visitors.

OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The amount expended in out-door relief during the year was £2,356 0s. 6d., showing an increase of £323 2s. 6d., as compared with the previous year. The average number of recipients per week for the year ending 30th June, 1892, was 377 adults and 199 children; total, 576; and for the year ending 30th June, 1893, 411.25 adults and 24528 children; total, 656 5.3; being an increase of 34.25 adults and 46.28 children. The average cost per head per annum for each adult and child was £3 11s. 94d., and per week, 1s. 44d. The number of persons actually receiving relief, both in-door and out-door, on the 30th June, 1893, was 1005.

Notwithstanding the demands made upon the Institution during the past year, owing to the unprecedented depression which has prevailed through want of employment, your Committee are glad to say that all the urgent and legitimate wants of the poor have been duly satisfied. Your Committee, at the same time, desire, heartily, to acknowledge the special charitable efforts made by the Unemployed Relief Committee to cope with the large amount of destitution existing in Bailarat this winter, whereby they have been releved from the strain that would otherwise be put upon their resources.

FINANCIAL.

We submit a statement of receipts and expenditure of the Asylum from the 1st July, 1892, to the 30th June, 1893, duly audited. In consequence of the heavy demands made upon the funds of the Institution, and the falling off in the subscriptions, together with the reduction of ± 500 in the Government grant-inaid, there is an overdraft of ± 568 13s. Od. remaining at the end of the year.

A communication has been received from the Under Treasurer, enjoining on the Committee the strictest economy in the expenditure, as it is feared that a further reduction will be made in the grant to Charitable Institutions.

SPECIAL DONATIONS AND EFFORTS.

The Committee desire to acknowledge with thanks the following liberal donations:—Mr. Martin Loughlin, J.P., £50; Sir W. J. Clarke, Bart., £40; the Executors of the late Mr. Ashton, £25; Sir Samuel Wilson, per Mr. A. Fisken, £20; Star of the East G. M. C., £20. They also gratefully acknowledge the sum of £33 14s. 6d., collected at the United Masonic Choral Service in aid of the Asylum.

The Committee desire to express their appreciation of the great and spontaneous efforts made by the Chinese in connection with the Carnival held by them, in aid of the three Ballarat Charities, in November last, whereby the sum of £96 16s. 8d. was handed over to the funds of this Institution. The Carnival was got up by them on a scale of great splendour, and entailed upon them an expenditure of hundreds of pounds.

The Committee desire to express their thanks to the Ministers for the collections made at the various Churches. They also desire to express their thank fulness to the Ladies' Visiting Committee, and the other ladies who have contributed to the comfort of the immates and out-door recipients. Also to all those who have taken an interest in the Institution by getting up entertainments, and by assisting in various other ways, such as supplying the immates with books, newspapers, magazines, &c.

Before closing this report, your Committee express the hope that in view of the reduction already made in the Government Grant, and the still further reduction indicated—and this in the face of the heavy demands that are now being made upon them through the prevailing depression (which they trust will soon pass away)—the friends of the Asylum in the past will continue their support, and that a number of new subscribers will come forward, and thus obviate the necessity for introducing a Poor Law.

GENERAL REPARKS.

The desirability of introducing a Poor Law into the colony is at present engaging some share of public attention. Your Committee, however, are of opinion that a Poor Law in a new country like this would be an anomaly, and that under it the treatment of the poor would, undoubtedly, be worse than what obtains under the system for their relief in this colony. Moreover, the expense would be much greater, and this would go on increasing, and it would lack the humanity which characterises our method. The Benevolent Asylums in this colony are a kind of alms-houses, in which the aged and infirm find a refuge in their declining years, and where they are kindly treated. The workhouse in the old country, on the contrary, is an institution something between an infirmary and a gaol. Besides, the expense of administering the English Poor Law is simply enormous, while the rations the paupers get are barely sufficient to keep body and soul together. The duties in connection with out-door relief, under the Poor Law, are fulfilled by paid relieving officers, similar duties being performed, gratuitously, by the members of your Committee, who are told off for certain districts in the City and Town, and who, necessarily, put more humanity into their work than officers who perform their duties in a perfunctory manner. The Poor Law system in England is controlled, or rather is under the iron rule of a highly centralised body-the Public Service Board-so that very little discretionary power in administering relief is left to the local guardians. The system adopted here, which is a compromise, has hitherto worked exceedingly well. The voluntary contributions received from the public are supplemented by a Governmentgrant-in-aid, and the only control the Government exercises is through its officer, the Inspector of Charities, who annually visits the Asylum with the view of seeing that the funds are properly administered, and that the house is in a good condition. It is a maxim agreed upon by all civilised countries, that for the sake of humanity the poor should not be allowed to starve; but there is a higher motive still, and one resting on a surer foundation, namely, charity. The person who is compelled by law to pay a Poor Rate may, by doing so, fulfil the duties that devolve upon him as a member of society, but this is not charity.

In conclusion, your Committee trust that under the beneficent care of Divine Providence, this noble institution will continue, as heretofore, its work of charity.

RULES

OF THE

B_intat Bistrict Benevolent Asylum,

Adopted by the Governors, 24th January, 1867.

OBJECTS:

TO RELIEVE THE AGED, INFIRM, DISABLED, AND DESTITUTE, AND TO MINISTER TO THEIR NECESSITIES, ACCORDING TO THE ABILITY OF THE INSTITUTE.

LIFE GOVERNORS.

1. Every donor of £10 and upwards; every person not being a paid collector, who shall raise in one or more collections, in one year, the sum of £20 or upward from persons not claiming membership on account of their contributions towards such sum; any person appointed by any society paying the sum of £20; the executor, or, if more than one, the first named in any will, by which bequest of £20 or upwards shall be paid to the Institution, shall be Life Governors, and any other person elected at a meeting of Governors, on the recommendation of the Committee, in consideration of special services rendered to the Institution shall be a Life Governor and entitled to vote.

ANNUAL GOVERNORS.

2. A donation of not less than £20 from a Shire Council, Road Board, or Municipal Council, shall entitle the Mayor, President, or Chairman of the Body donating, to be an Annual Governor. Every subscriber of £1 and upwards annually, shall be an Annual Governor, to date from the time of paying such subscript ion, and entitled to vote at all yearly and other special meetings of Governors; provided in the case of a new subscriber he shall have paid his donation or subscription seven days before such meeting.

3. The Institution shall be governed by a Committee of Management consisting of a President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, a Treasurer, three Honorary Medical Officers, and sixteen Governors. In the month of July in every year, one-third part of

the elected members of the Committee shall go out of office, except the Trustees (but may, nevertheless, be re-elected), and the persons who shall go out of office shall be those who have been the longest in office without re-election; or when two or more shall have been in office for the same length of time, then those who shall go out of office shall be determined by lot.

4. If any member of Committee shall die, or resign by letter under his hand addressed to the President of the Asylum, or become insolvent or compound with his creditors, or become convicted of any treason, felony, or misdemeanor, or be absent from four consecutive ordinary meetings of the Committee, hisoflice shall become vacant, and the remaining members of Committee may declare his office vacant, and temporarily appoint thereto a qualified contributor to the Asylum until the next Annual Meeting for the election of the Committee, when the person thus temporarily appointed shall retire, in addition to those herein before provided for, except in the case of a Trustee or Honorary Medical Officer, who must be elected at a General Meeting of the Governors.

5. The Annual Meeting of the Governors of the Institution shall be held in the month of July in each year, when a general report of the affairs of the Institution, from the Committee of Management, shall be submitted for consideration, and the necessary elections proceeded with.

6. It shall be competent, at any time, for the President to call a Special Meeting of Governors, on receiving a requisition signed by eight members of the Committee of Management, or twentyfour Governors, requiring him to do so, on giving seven days' notice in one or more of the Ballarat daily papers of such meeting and requisition, and no business shall be transacted at such Special Meeting except that for which it shall have been summoned.

7. At the Annual or other Special Meeting of Governors, ten Governors shall form a quorum; but if after the expiration of halfan-hour after the time appointed for such meeting, a quorum be not present, the Governors then present shall have the power to adjourn such meeting, and to appoint a time within seven days when such adjourned meeting shall be held.

8. The Committee of Management shall manage and direct the general business of the Institution; shall frame bye-laws for its internal regulation, the same not being contrary to the general rules; appoint and discharge all salaried officers and servants of the Institution; shall meet one day in each month, and at other days as they shall appoint; admit and discharge patients, and make rules and regulations respecting them and their treatment; and shall appoint Sub-Committees for all necessary purposes, and Auditors. The Chairman of Committees to have a casting, but not a deliberative vote.

9. The President, Vice-Presidents, and Treasurer shall be members ex officio of all Committees.

10. All Sub-Committees shall have at least five members, three to form a quorum.

11. The accounts of the Institution shall be audited in the month of July in each year.

12. Any Member of Committee of Management (except the Trustees and Honorary Medical Officers) absenting himself for two months without assigning a reasonable cause, shall cease to be a member of the Committee, and another shall be appointed in his stead.

13. No Member of Committee shall vote on any question in which he shall have a pecuniary interest.

TREASURER.

14. All moneys received on account of the Institution shall be paid into the Bank appointed by the Committee of Management, to the credit of the Treasurer of the Institution, and shall be appropriated to the purposes of the Institution, under the direction of the Committee of Management.

SECRETARY.

15. The Secretary shall attend all Annual, Special, and Comnittee meetings; take minutes of all the proceedings transacted at such Meetings, and transcribe them carefully into the books kept for that purpose; and carry out all the directions of such meetings in all particulars incident to his department.

16. The Secretary shall collect subscriptions and all moneys to or receivable by the Institution, in all cases giving receipts, and shall within fourteen days of the time of receipt of moneys, pay over the same into the Bank to the credit of the Treasurer, submitting at each meeting to the General or Executive Committee an account of the sums and names of the person from whom the same have been receive d.

17. The Secretary shall conduct the correspondence and the clerical business of his department; keep the accounts of the Institution, under the direction of theseveral Committees; compile all reports of the Committees; fill the cheques, and perform all the clerical duties connected with the Office of Secretary.

HONORARY MEDICAL OFFICERS.

18. The Honorary Medical Officers of the Institution shall be duly qualified Medical Practitioners, and shall attend when required, the rotation of duty to be left to themselves; shall have access to the Institution at all times; perform all surgical operations and record the same in a book kept for that purpose at the Institution.

19. Any Honorary Medical Officer neglecting his duty without reasonable cause shall cease to hold office.

Any five Governors wishing to make any alteration in the Rules, shall give the Secretary at least fourteen days' notice, requesting him to give due notice of such intention to the Governors.
