THE FORTY-SIXTH REPORT

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To the Governors and Subscribers.

I.-THE ASYLUM.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 328.61, being I less than last year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on 30th June, 1903, was males 241, and 74 females; total, 315, being a decrease as compared with former year of I male.

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The average cost of maintenance per head was $\pounds 13$ 15s. 5d. and 10-11ths, as against $\pounds 16$ 8s. 3d. for last year.

II.-LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

The number admitted during the year was 50, 2 adults remaining from last year; total, 52 adults; 42 children were born, viz:--20 males and 22 females. 47 adults and 38 children were discharged; 1 adult and 1 child died; leaving in the hospital 4 adults and 2 children on 30th June, 1903. The average period spent there was 32'20 days.

III.-OUTDOOR RELIEF.

The amount expended on out-door relief during the year was \pounds 1661 103. 4d., showing an increase of \pounds 71 6s. 6d., as compared with last year. The average number of recipients per week for the year ending 30th June, 1903, was 279.32 adults, and 177 28 children; total, 436.60; and for the previous year, 315 adults, 133 children; total, 448; being a decrease of 36 adults, and increase of 14 children. The average cost per head per annum for each adult and child was \pounds 3 12s. 9 $\frac{1}{3}$ d, and per week 1s. 4 $\frac{3}{4}$ d., as against \pounds 3 10s. 11 8-9ths, and 1s. 4 $\frac{3}{8}$ d. for the previous year.

The total number of persons receiving relief, both indoor and outdoor, on 30th June, 1903, was 784. In addition to these, 3660 dinners have been given to passing vagrants, and taken at 4d. each, totals $\pounds 61$.

IV.__THE FARM.

The receipts and expenditure during the year at the small farm are as follows:—Produce sold, $\pounds 240$; produce used at the Asylum, $\pounds 100$ IIS. 7d; total, $\pounds 340$ IIS. 7d. Stock on hand, on 30th June, 1903, $\pounds 157$ 16S.; grand total, $\pounds 498$ 7s. 7d. Expenditure, including wages, horse-feed. &c., purchase of pigs and poultry, farm improvements, rates and rent, totals $\pounds 429$ 6s. Id.; also stock brought forward from last year of $\pounds 198$; making a grand total of $\pounds 627$ 6s. 1d.; being a loss of $\pounds 128$ 18s. 6d. Improvements during the year have been effected amounting to $\pounds 22$, which brings the farm account as a loss of $\pounds 108$ 18s. 6d.

V.-FINANCIAL.

At the close of last financial year the debit balance stood, £ 1553 148. 8d., from which had to be deducted £ 1065. representing fourth instalment of Government grant not then received, leaving us £488 148. 8d. overdrawn at the bank. The expenditure of this year of £6867 178. 1d., added to that amount, totals £ 1356 118. 9d.; the receipts, £ 7082 198. 9d., being deducted, leaves a debit balance on 30th June, 1903, of £ 273 128.

VI.—REPORT OF THE INSPECTOR OF PUBLIC CHARITIES.

The Inspector paid his usual annual visit to the Asylum, and expressed himself as being thoroughly satisfied with the internal workings of the Asylum, and that cleanliness and good supervision reign supreme.

It will be the business of this meeting to elect a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and eight members of Committee, in place of those who retire, viz., Messrs. W. Gale, J. Phillips. W. Coltman, J. Long, A. W. Hager, W. White, D. Cooke, and Hon. J. Y. McDonald, but who offer themselves, and are eligible, for re-election; also, three Hon. Medical Officers, Hon. Oculist, Hon. Solicitor, and two Auditors.

X.-GENERAL.

The best thanks of the Committee are due to the Hon. Oculist, Dr. Gutheil; the Hon. Medical Staff, Drs. Jordan, Gardiner and Richards, for the good service they rendered the Institution in case of need.

Once more we have the pleasure of recording the good exertions put forth by Mr. G. Lovitt, in securing a substantial sum of money with which to procure tobacco for the old men in the Asylum, and which always proves a great treat indeed to them.

Owing to the abnormally-high prices of provisions prevailing, the utmost vigilance had to be exercised in the expenditure of a gradually-declining revenue. With this view, a special sub-committee had been appointed to report upon the possibility of effecting further retrenchments. It is satisfactory to be able to report that, by a judicious system of a revision of the dietary scale, and in other directions (as recommended by the sub-committee), considerable savings have been effected, without in the least affecting the efficiency of the Institution, so that, notwithstanding the extra cost of supplies generally, the cost per head of inmates has been reduced from \pounds_{10} 8s. last year, to \pounds_{13} 15s. 6d. this year—a saving of \pounds_{2} 12s. 9d per inmate. No appreciable difference in the average expenditure of out-door relief has been possible.

The revenue from the various sources shows a considerable falling off as compared with former years, and had it not been for the receipt of several handsome legacies, the Institution must have become, to a very considerable extent, financially embarrassed.

The President, Rev. Mr. Cairns, having in March last been granted leave of absence, whilst on a tour through Europe and America, the senior Vice-President, Mr. Grainger, has, during Mr. Cairns' absence, ably occupied the presidential chair.

During the year a considerable sum had to be expended in extensive renovations, cementing the walls, alterations to tower, &c.

Dr. Mitchell having, on 4th August last, resigned his office of non-resident medical officer, Dr. McGowan has been elected in his place.

Mr. Dimsey, one of the founders of the Asylum, and for a number of years an active member of committee, is strongly recommended to be placed on the roll of Life Governors, also, Mrs. J. P. Murray, in respect of a handsome donation received from an old colonist.

The net proceeds of the Birthday Carnival, 1902, were \pounds 145. The best thanks are due to the organiser, Mr. Theo. Saunders, Superintendent, Matron and the ladies and gentlemen who so ably assisted in the function.

It is with regret that we record the reduction of their annual donation of several Shires and Boroughs. We are o^f opinion that the subsidies of the City and Town Councils are absuredly inadequate, and should be consideralby increased.

During the year Mr. Seward resigned his seat on the Committee, and Mr. White has been appointed in his place. In accordance with the Bye-laws the seat becomes vacant, and Mr. White being eligible for re-election, has been nominated for the vacant seat accordingly.

A number of Chinese recipients of outdoor-reliel have recently been shipped off to China. This will relieve the Asylum to the extent of \pounds 100 annually, or thereabouts.

To emphasize the trifling effect the Old Age Pension law was having on the Asylum resources it will suffice to mention that there was only one male inmate left this year as compared with the year previous—a very insignificant saving, it must be admitted. This, however, may be accounted for by the indiscriminate admittance of persons from all parts of the State at the mandate of the Under Treasurer, while at the same time our Grant-in-aid was being continually cut down by the Government.

In 1897 the Endowment and Reserve Funds amounted to $\pounds 6124$; this year it has dwindled down to $\pounds 3755$. So, in order to make up for loss of ordinary revenue, the sum of $\pounds 2369$ had to be drawn from funds intended as a nucleus of a perpetual endowment. Unless, therefore, the public becomes more liberal in their support to Charitable Institutions a Poor Law or Charity Tax—a thing so very much dreaded—is certainly within measurable distance; indeed, will be almost inevitable.

We regret exceedingly to have to record the death of Mr. A. T. Morrison, who was for a great number of years the Auditor of the Institution's books and finances.

We subjoin for the information of governors and subscribers as well as the public generally a table showing the drift of the affairs of the Asylum the last seven years.

We think that a society such as has been worked with wonderful successful results in London, and known as the "League of Mercy," and which is being started in Melbourne as a "Volunteer Help League," might with advantage be set on foot. This by organised and systematic effort would collect regularly throughout the city, town, and district, the small amounts which numbers would then be only too willing to contribute. The members of the League give their time and labor to this praiseworthy work, so that the cost of collection would be comparatively small, and the various charitable institutions would benefit to the fullest extent in connection with the efforts put forth.

OUR CHARITIES.

THE BENEVOLENT ASYLUM.

OPEN GATES TO ALL.

From the Evening Echo, Wednesday, July 29, 1903.

Of all her charities Ballarat is proud, and justly so, but there is none of wider scope, and which sweeps in the derelict of both sexes with larger and more comprehensive embrace, than the Benevolent Asylum. It is strange, indeed, how many there are in Ballarat who are really unaware of half the good work undertaken and carried out by this institution, which comprises under one head quite a number of charities. People will say, "Oh, yes, of course, the Asylum is a wonderful institution of its kind. It takes in all the old folk who are too poor to support themselves and too old and feeble to work, and it feeds and clothes them, and looks after them." Are these people aware that, in addition this, is provided a lying-inhospital, where no trying ordeal of cross-questioning has to be undergone by suffering womanhood, where the only claim for admission is urgent need. That here a girl is received for a few weeks before the time of her trouble, and receives the attendance she would get in a hospital; that she is kept there for a fortnight, or longer, if necessary, after the event, and that everything is done that can possibly be done to look after her welfare on leaving the institution. Are these people aware that this institution receives cases that a hospital refuses, that it is in

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very truth a home for the destitute, where the wanderer, whose one claim is poverty and necessity, can be taken in, fed and clothed, and that so great is the popularity of the institution, and so kindly and considerate the management, that applications are constantly received not only from all parts of the State, but from other States in the Commonwealth ? Even far Westralia has contributed its quota to the list of admissions. This is a good, but somewhat inconvenient, character to have established, and as a consequence the resources are taxed to the utmost The average number of inmates for the year ending 30th of June was 329, and to-day there were within the institution 316 persons of either sex. The total expenditure for indoor accommodation, including the work of dealing out the out-door relief, was £4526 6s. for the year, making a cost per head of £13 158. 6d.. Considering that that means food, clothing and lodgings, it is a remarkably small sum. For outdoor relief during the past year £ 1661 18s. has been expended, making an average of £ 3 125. 9d. per head.

The scene when on Wednesday mornings the weekly rations are being distributed is a busy one, and around the store-room are gathered a crowd of recipients of relief, mostly women, with a large sprinkling of Chinese, aged, wrinkled men mostly, whose span of life is nearly run. There sits Mr. Atkinson, the superintendent, not at the receipt of custom, but at the distributing table, marking down the amounts to be given in each case, calling this name and that, with a cheery nod for this one, and a bright smile for this, looking for all the world like one of the old-time pictures of mine host distributing fare at ancient hostelry. It is a wonderful scene, and gives the onlooker some faint idea of the wide-spreading charity which not only cares for those within its gates, but looks after and saves from want and destitution those in poor circumstances outside. "Fourteen, two and a half, eleven." Mystic figures are called out, and into one bag is poured a quantity of flour, and into a smaller one tea and sugar. Bread

in hot, smoking loaves is handed over, and when the meat supply runs out orders are signed and issued on a leading butcher for the amount allowed. Sometimes it is the mother of a family, sometimes one of the youngsters; now and then a man comes as emissary and provision carrier, and in cases where the provisions cannot by reason of distance be sent or distributed, a small sum sufficient to purchase necessaries is despatched to the needy ones. It seems strange indeed that many old folk should prefer the pittance of an old age pension, which is, after all, charity in a very patent disguise, to the solid comforts obtainable from such an institution as the one under notice.

The immense extent of the building and its adjuncts can hardly be estimated from the outside, and it is only a prolonged and thorough inspection which reveals the magnitude of the enterprise. Away in a portion of the grounds by themselves are a row of small brick cottages set apart for the use of aged couples, and right cosy and comfortable they looked with their two little rooms, and, in all probability, more approach to home comforts than the old people have known for many a year. In one of these are to be found a venerable couple, a veritable Darby and Joan, seated one on either side of the little fireplace, and with their few treasures in the shape of photographs and little nick-nacks hanging up on the walls. In the long, weary years of life they were not divided, and together they spend in comparative comfort and ease the last declining span.

Within the main building are dormitories for male and female, ground floor rooms for those unable to climb the stairs, and on upper stories for those too afflicted; while, saddest sight of all, are the bed-ridden wards, whose inmates will never leave those cots till carried forth for the last time. There are diningrooms, several of them, to accommodate the large number of inmates, and also the casual visitors, for, to the credit of the management, be it said, no one is refused a meal, and, as Mr. Atkinson remarks, "No one in Ballarat need starve." Naturally there are to be found amongst so many old people those with cranks and crazes, and notable amongst them is one very old woman who is convinced that she is possessed of great wealth, and asserts she has an order to get whatever she wants from the shop of Mr. Harry Davies. What view that enterprising merchant might take of the affair is another matter, but the old party is quite satisfied that she is being prevented from doing a lot of purchasing by Mrs. Atkinson, wife of the superintendent. As can easily be understood from the age of most of the inhabitants of this miniature city, they are not very easy to manage or get on with, so it speaks volumes for the kindly, ready tact and sympathetic patience of both Mr. and Mrs. Atkinson that their presence is welcomed in all wards and that the petulance of old age and suffering gives way monentarily to a gleam of pleased recognition, and that even those too deaf to hear the enquiries after their health smile an acknowledgment. The food supplied smells and looks appetising, and judging by the onslaught of the old men and women, its taste was to their liking. Plenty for all, and always some for the wayfarer, and yet no one can accuse the institution of being extravagantly managed.

In the lying-in hospital was a bright, cheery room, a bright fire burning in the grate, and a cheerful, kindly-looking nurse seated by it, and on her lap the latest Australian native to see the light of day within the hospitable shelter of this wondrous institution. Here was indeed a picture giving some idea of the width of the charity. The \circ ld resting a while for the inevitable last summons and the infant with all the world before it. It is charities such as these, administered as is thisone, that deserve the heartiest and staunchest support from the city and the State to which they are a credit.
