FIFTY-EIGHTH REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

Ballarat District Benevolent Asylum and Lying-in Hospital

(Incorporated),

For the Year Ending 30th June, 1915,

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

In accordance with the annual custom, your Committee have the honor to lay before you for your consideration the Report and Balance. Sheet for the year ending 30th June, 1915.

FINANCIAL.

The income for the year was £5955 6s. 5d., and the expenditure was £6605 10s. 11d., being £640 4s. 6d. more than the receipts, thus leaving an overdraft of £1288 13s. 4d., as compared with the overdraft of 30th June, 1914, of £645 0s. 10d.

1.—ASYLUM.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 217.72, being 7.97 more than last year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on the 30th June, 1915, was 217, being an increase of 13 as compared with the previous year.

The daily average number of inmates was 217.72, as against 209.75 for the previous year. The average cost per head for maintenance was £22 0s. 5\frac{1}{3}d., as against £22 12s. 11\frac{1}{3}d. for last year.

2.—LYING-IN HOSPITAL.

The number admitted to the Lying-In Hospital during the year was 49 adults (4 adults remaining in from previous year), total 53. 38

children were born. Two adults and three children died. There were 1 male and 3 females still-born. The average period of time spent by the adults in the Hospital was 24.33 days. The number remaining

3.—OUT-DOOR RELIEF.

The amount expended on the Out-Door Relief during the year was £686 11s. 11d., an increase of £144 7s., as compared with last year, in consequence of higher price of provisions and increase in number of applicants.

The average number of recipients weekly for the year ended 30th June was 110.63, being an increase of 12.67. The average cost per head was £6 2s. 7\frac{1}{4}d., as against £5 10s. 7\frac{1}{3}d. the previous year.

365 meals were supplied to travellers, at the value of 4d. per head.

The total number of people on the books, in-door and out-door, on the 30th June, 1915, was 510, an increase of 53.

7.—OFFICE-BEARERS.

It will be the business of the meeting to elect a President, two Vice-Presidents, Treasurer, and seven members of Committee, viz., Messrs. A. Hager, W. White, J. Lawn, R. Hall (who retire by filuxion of time),

Owing to the death of the President, Mr. D. B. Wheeler, Mr. J. Drummond was appointed to the position for the balance of the year, and stands for re-election.

Messrs. J. McVitty and T. O'Loughlin having retired from the Committee, and the death of Mr. Wheeler, it will be necessary to elect three members to fill their places.

Messrs. J. Oliver, J. Fraser and W. G. Ballhausen were elected during the year by the Committee, and together with the three Hon. Medical Officers, Hon. Oculist, Hon. Dentist, Hon. Solicitor, and two Auditors, offer themselves for re-election.

GENERAL.

The death of our President, Mr. D. B. Wheeler, on the 9th March, after an illness of three months, was a great loss to this Committee and the Charitable Institutions of Ballarat. Although well over the allotted years of life, our late President was an energetic and sympathetic member of our Committee. His kindly courtesy endeared him to all who were associated with him. In the long history of this Institution the death of Mr. Wheeler was the first occasion upon which it has been necessary to record the death of its President.

Following the policy of the Committee in improving the Asylum buildings so that the inmates may have every reasonable comfort, and the staff every opportunity to economically discharge their duties, several important improvements and additions have been made during the year.

The most important addition was the building of the Day Room for the male inmates. It had been recognised for some years past that the old Smoke House was both insanitary and too distant from the main building. The Committee is indebted to the ex-Premier, the Hon. W. Watt, and to the Premier, Sir A. Peacocck, for their generous interest in the cause of charity. As a result, the fine brick structure now in use is the means of enabling our old men to spend the winter days in comfort. The Committee recognises the valuable help rendered by the Members of Parliament for the District, more particularly Capt. M. Baird, M.L.A., and the Hon. F. Brawn, M.L.C.

The Premier, Sir A. Peacock, accompanied by Lady Peacock, formally opened the Day Room on Saturday, June 5th, in the presence of a large and representative gathering of citizens. Advantage was taken of the visit of the Premier to bring under his notice the urgent need for a new hot water service and kitchen. Sir Alex. Peacock was impressed with the economical advantages to be gained by installing these services, and promised to favorably consider the allocation of sufficient money by way of a building grant for this purpose,

Early in the year the electric light was installed in the main buildings, and the result in convenience and economy has amply justified the expense.

In addition to the above improvements, the Superintendent and Secretary, Mr. Con. Burrow, has had several of the wards painted, and a good deal of asphalting laid and various other renovations, all of which assist in keeping the Asylum buildings in a fresh and attractive condition.

Owing to their leaving Ballarat, two members of the Committee resigned during the year, viz.: Mr. R. J. McVitty and Mr. T. O'Loughlin. The following gentlemen were appointed in their places, Mr. J. Oliver and Mr. J. Fraser. Mr. H. G. Ballhausen was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the death of the late Mr. D. B. Wheeler.

During the short period that I have acted as President, I have occasion to note the extremely rapid rise in the cost of maintenance. This is due to the drought of 1914, and also the great war which we are fighting on the Continent of Europe.

For every reason then it will be required that the closest examination be made of our expenditure with a view to the most economical management, consistent with the obligations resting upon this Committee.

It is evident that the demands upon our funds during the ensuing year will be very heavy. Notwithstanding the many patriotic appeals to our subscribers, I hope that the citizens of Ballarat and district will continue their generous support of the aged and the helpless old folk. Owing to the operation of the Old Age Pensions the difficulties in managing this Asylum are greatly increased. of the Institution do not benefit in any way whatever from the admis-On the contrary, our expenditure is increased sion of pensioners. On admission to the Asylum the pension ceases, and, invariably, the pensioner seeks relief at our hands, because he or she requires the skilled attention of our doctor and nurses in the sick They thus become a heavy tax on our resources. fore appeal to all charitably disposed citizens to assist our Committee by remembering the Benevolent Asylum when distributing their funds in charity.

The Officers and Staff are, as ever, loyally assisting in maintaining the high reputation which this Institution holds.

Visiting friends, clergy and lay, gave valuable services in both spiritual and material comfort to the inmates. Many generous gifts have been recorded throughout the year, for which I desire to thank the donors on behalf of the inmates.

In conclusion, I desire to express my appreciation of the considerate assistance rendered to me by the Members of the Committee.

For the Year ending 30th June, 1916.

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

In accordance with the Annual custom, your Committee have the honor to lay before you for your consideration the Report and Balance Sheet for the year ending 30th June, 1916.

Financial.

The income for the year was £5940 11s. 5d., and the expenditure £5700 4s. 11d., being £240 6s. 6d. less than the receipts, thus leaving an overdraft of £1085 3s. 10d. as compared with the overdraft of 30th June, 1915, of £1295 5s. 4d.

The amount of £240 shown on the balance-sheet as a surplus to credit on the year's business is not a real credit to the funds. During the year the sum of £296 was received from the Government on account of the smoke-house, which was built last year. The whole of the expense for this building was paid out of the funds of the institution, and the Government granted the amount in moieties. The £296 shown was the second instalment of this amount. In addition, the amount of £300 was received from a bequest nearly three years ago, but the settlement of the estate was made this year. It will thus be seen that the Asylum's receipts have been some £500 less than the expenses for the year.

1—Asylum

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 212.88, being 5.44 less than last year. The number of inmates in the Asylum on 30th June, 1916, was 199, being an increase of 2 as compared with the previous year.
