



Sixty-Seventh Report of the Board of Management

OF THE

BALLARAT DISTRICT BENEVOLENT HOME AND MATERNITY HOSPITAL

(Incorporated)

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 30th JUNE, 1924.

TO THE GOVERNORS AND SUBSCRIBERS.

In accordance with the annual custom, your Board has the honor to lay before you for your consideration the Report and Balance Sheet for the year ended 30th June, 1924.

FINANCIAL.

The income for the year was £17,897/10/10, and the expenditure £16,686/2/5, being £1,211/8/5 less than the receipts. The overdraft now amounts to £536/1/9, as compared with the overdraft of £1,751/9/8 on 30th June, 1923.

1-HOME.

The daily average number of inmates for the year was 207.87, being 16.27 more than last year. The number of inmates in the Home on 30th June, 1924, is 193, as against 226 last year.

The average annual cost per head for maintenance was £36/3/63, as against £35/0/8½ for the previous year—an increase of £1/2/10½.

2. MATERNITY HOSPITAL.

The number admitted to the Maternity Hospital was 53; 49 children were born—33 males, 16 females, four still-born.

6-BEQUESTS.

Bequests amounting to £6,058/11/7 have been received.

7-OFFICE-BEARERS.

It will be the business of this meeting to elect a President and two Vice-Presidents, Hon. Treasurer, and seven members of Committee, who retire by the effluxion of time, and offer themselves for re-election, together with the retiring President (Mr. J. Fraser). It will also be necessary to elect Honorary Solicitor, Honorary Medical Officers, Honorary Dentist, Honorary Oculist and two Auditors.

8—GENERAL.

A review of the past year's work discloses many important events which call for notice.

UNVEILING OF TABLET.

The unveiling of the tablet erected by the Board of this Institution to the memory of our late highly esteemed medical officer, Dr. McGowan, on 13th June last, took place at the Home. The subscribers and inmates fully appreciated the great work that Dr. McGowan had done during his 20 years as medical officer. He was genial and obliging, and did all in his power to make the lives of the old folk happy and contented. One of the outstanding features of his character was his readiness at all times to help the poor, and the tablet will remain as a permanent record of the esteem in which he was held by all.

Dr. GUYMER.

Dr. Guymer was appointed Medical Officer in the place of the late Dr. McGowan, and has occupied the position for twelve months, and carried out his duties in so kindly and considerate a manner that he has gained the confidence of the old folk.

ENTERTAINMENTS.

During the year many entertainments were provided the inmates, and were greatly enjoyed by them. On several occasions the old folk themselves provided concerts of no mean order. The Soldiers, City and Salvation Army Bands submitted programmes on Sundays to the delight of all. I wish to extend my best thanks to all those people who helped to pleasure the inmates in this kindly way.

SPIRITUAL HELP.

Our Spiritual assistants, both lay and clergy, have carried on their good work during the year, and have been constant in their attendance, and have given great comfort to the inmates, and our grateful appreciation is tendered to them for their efforts.

Mr. GREENWOOD.

Mr. Greenwood, whose good work will live in the memory of all associated with the Home, died during the year. He was for 40 years ministering to the spiritual wants of the inmates.

THE APPEAL.

During the year an appeal for £3000 was made to enable this Board to carry out certain necessary works at the Home. The highly satisfactory result was principally due to the untiring zeal and enthusiasm of a splendid working committee of both ladies and gentlemen, and especially to the assistance of a few gentlemen not members of our Board. Mayor and Mayoress W. Elsworth, and also, in their turn, Mayor and Mayoress R. J. Cooke, lent great assistance to the movement. We realise that the appeal was made in a season of depression, and our time being limited, it speaks volumes for the organising work of the Committee and the generous spontaniety of the citizens of Ballarat and district. The ladies of Ballarat and district worked with unabated energy, and the splendid result of £1000 collected by them calls for our very grateful thanks. The appeal resulted so successfully that we are now in a position to carry out the very necessary work at the Home.

HIGH TEA.

The ladies who have for 23 years provided high tea to the inmates repeated their thoughtful effort this year, and my thanks are given them.

HONORARY STAFF.

The Honorary Staff deserve my best thanks for their many valuable services rendered. These gentlemen are always willing when called upon to give thier services to the Institute.

THE STAFF.

It affords me pleasure to report that our staff, viz., Mr. Con. Burrow (Secretary and Superintendent), Matron Gent, and Mr. W. Palmer (Collector), and the staff generally work together in an admirable manner. Their heavy responsibilities are borne in a cheerful and willing spirit. The general cleanliness and perfect order maintained in the whole establishment speaks highly for the good management, and our best thanks are due to all concerned for the very fine way in which they carry out their duties.

NURSE TUXEN.

The death of Nurse Tuxen shortly after resigning her position as maternity nurse was greatly regretted.

THE PRESS.

I have also to thank the Press for their kind assistance in publishing reports of our meetings, etc., which prove very helpful to us.

CHRISTMAS TREE.

In addition to the usual treat at Christmas, a Christmas Tree was given by our lady friends for the first time. This gave great pleasure to the old folk, and recalled to them happy memories of their youthful days. A concert terminated a very enjoyable evening, and to the ladies and gentlemen who subscribed to and organised the effort I extend my heartiest thanks.

PICNIC BY THE MAYOR.

During the year his Worship Mayor R. J. Cooke kindly invited all the old folk to a picnic at the Gardens, which was a most enjoyable treat, and during the proceedings the Mayor expressed the pleasure he felt in doing something for their enjoyment. The old folk gave the Mayor a hearty cheer for his thoughtful kindness.

IMPROVEMENTS.

In addition to the extensive and valuable improvements already effected, a great deal yet remains to be done. Among the more important is the rebuilding of the out-door recipients' delivery room and store rooms. The sewering of the building will mean to us an expenditure of a very large sum of money. The painting of the front of the building must soon be undertaken, and this also will involve the outlay of a considerable amount

OPENING OF WOMEN'S NEW SITTING ROOM.

As a result of representation made to the then Treasurer of the State, Sir W. McPherson, it was agreed that the congestion in our women's department should be relieved by erecting a new women's day room, addition to the women's dining room, and matron's quarters.

The Hon. Sir Alex. Peacock and Lady Peacock kindly consented to perform the ceremony of opening these new buildings. The function took place on Saturday, 26th July, in the presence of a large and representative gathering of friends of the Institution.

These additions fill a long-felt want, and assist materially in affording that comfort to the aged female members which our subscribers would wish them to have.

The furnishing of the women's day room has been in part supplied by several generous supporters of the Home. It is desired that further assistance in regard to furnishing both the women's and men's day room be obtained. Donations for this purpose will be gratefully accepted.

RENOVATIONS.

A great deal of work has been done during the past year by the Building Committee. All of the interior walls of the buildings have been plastered. The wood-work of the wards and passages has been painted. The expense involved has been heavy, but the improvement to the appearance of the wards, as well as the added comfort to the inmates justify the outlay.

In conclusion, as President, I thank the Board for the assistance and courtesy afforded me at all times. I have endeavored to faithfully fulfil my duties, and the work has been a pleasure to me, and I trust to be able to do all in my power in the future to assist this noble Institution in the good work which it is doing.


