



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

# SIXTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

# PLEASANT CREEK HOSPITAL.

For the Year 1874.

To the Governors, Subscribers, and Contributors of the Pleasant Creek Hospital.

DURING the year that has passed, the affairs of the Hospital have been in a satisfactory state, both financially and otherwise, although we regret to notice certain fallings off in contributions that ought not to have occurred. The sum obtained from the pastoral districts show a somewhat serious decline from that collected in 1873 and some previous years, if we except the munificent donation of £125 subscribed by H. Nicoll, Esq., of Warranooke Station, which is the most liberal, by far, that was ever received from one individual in aid of the funds of the charity, and which follows many large amounts given by the same gentleman during previous years. But there are good and sufficient reasons, which were referred to in the last annual report sufficiently accounting for the altered state of the subscription-lists sent into the country districts. Concurrently with the foundation of hospitals both at Horsham and St. Arnaud, it is but reasonable to expect that persons residing near those places, distant so many miles from Pleasant Creek, should accord their aid to institutions more strictly local than our own, to which they formerly liberally subscribed. But as some years must elapse before the new establishments are strong enough to give all the aid necessary to relieve the sick and maimed who may hereafter need help throughout the wide Wimmera and Richardson districts, it is hoped that the past well-intentioned efforts of the Board of Management of your institution in relieving all cases of sickness or other trouble will not be overlooked in the future. We are sorry to state that the subscriptions from the working miners are the least satisfactory part of the local list, and hardly show that amount of gratitude and appreciation for the benefits in which their order participates most extensively. This falling off was referred to in

last year's report, but no improvement is yet visible. We have to mention that individual subscriptions have been more liberal than usual. Amongst other special donations should be mentioned those of Thomas Brown, Esq., £25; W. H. Osmand, Esq., £25; Isaac Newton. Esq., £25; and Duncan M'Kellar, Esq., £25. The gentlemen named have been added to the list of Life Governors, also Mr. T. Y. Smith who was nominated for that honour by the Easter Festival Committee which body contributed the handsome sum of £156 16s. 6d., being half the result of a benefit given for the Miners' Accident Society and Hospital. Through the co-operation given in connection with the Hospital Sunday Services the sum of £84 11s. was raised, of which £50 15s. 11d. was collected at the open-air service on the Hospital grounds. From the various sources of income mentioned in the donation-list the receipts amount to £1,085 15s. 1d., being £735 17s. 4d. from the mining, and £349 17s. 9d. from the pastoral districts. The total expenditure for the year has been £3,546 10s. 5d., embracing a sum amounting to £1,100 17s. 4d., in which is included the cost of completing the new ward and other important works of a permanent and necessary kind. On the expenditure side also appear sums covering the cost of surgical appliances and medical works, the latter being intended as a library of reference for the use of the medical staff. Such a library has long been a necessity, and the want of it greatly felt. It will, doubtless, be increased from time to time, as the resources of the charity will permit. The Government grant for maintenance for the current year is £1,600, but nothing is allowed for building purposes, notwithstanding the heavy outlay incurred during the last year. The Board consider it has received but scant justice by this decision.

The following is a summary of the Resident-Surgeon's report for the year 1874:—In-door patients admitted, 406; out-door patients treated, 467; the total attendances on the latter being 2,526. The daily average of in-patients was 40, and of out-patients, 16½. There remained in the Hospital at the end of the year, 32, and the deaths for the year were 27 in number, being a trifle under 6½ per cent, which is an exceedingly low death-rate, and speaks well for the Resident-Surgeon and the hon medical staff, who have ever been ready to assist in cases of emergency.

To the hon. Surgeons—Messrs. Bennett, O'Donnell, and Colquhoun—we desire to record a special vote of thanks for the many and valued services performed during the year.

To many of the residents of the district, mentioned below, we have to express gratitude for donations of books, papers, and other presents calculated to increase the comfort of the patients, viz., to the proprietors of the Argus, Ararat Advertiser, Pleasant Creek Chronicle, Pleasant Creek News, Landsborough Times, and Southern Cross; J. Holt, Esq., Ledcourt, for illustrated papers (very amusing to the patients); to E. C. Grant, Esq., for magazines, linen, &c.; to Mr.

James Clark, for a very liberal supply of papers, &c.; to Messrs. S. C. Browne and W. K. Nicolas for fruit, and to Messrs. Gray, Campbell and C. Scherer, for tobacco, pipes, &c.

We have had under consideration the question of having the Institute incorporated under the provisions of the Act, No. 220, Victoria 27. A sub-committee appointed recently brought up their report, from which we take the following summary:- "As the committee appointed to report on the advisability or otherwise of having the Pleasant Creek Hospital incorporated under an act of the Victorian Parliament, entitled 'An Act for Hospitals and Charitable Institutions' (June 2nd, 1864), we beg to state that, having considered the provisions of the enactment referred to, we deem it politic to bring the subject under the notice of the subscribers at the coming annual We have arrived at the conclusion that if the institution were registered under the enactment referred to, considerable benefits would be experienced, amongst which we might mention that the subscribers would for the time be the proprietary, and the committee or directory appointed by them would be enabled to exercise a more legitimate control over the management of the institution. The mode of retirement from office would also be an improvement, as the act provides that only one-third of the Board of Management shall retire each year, thus ensuring that there would always be a considerable portion of the Board in office, who had gained experience in the affairs of the Hospital. Under the new arrangement the absurd system of balloting, now inseparable from the yearly elections, would be dispensed with, and the subscribers would be enabled to record their votes in the manner that ensures the greatest freedom of action, and which is more in accordance with the advanced intelligence of the time. We further believe that the very fact of a few vacancies only occurring each year would have the effect of causing greater interest to be felt in the annual polling at the hospital meetings, and this result could not be otherwise than highly beneficial."

For the reasons therein given we recommend that steps be taken to have the institution so incorporated, but request the decision of the subscribers on the subject at the present meeting.

In surrendering their trust into your hands, the Board is able to contemplate with satisfaction that the improvements made during their term of office have added greatly to the efficiency of the institution. They also leave the finances in a satisfactory state as compared with many preceding years.

We would, in conclusion, impress upon all well-wishers of the charity to spare no efforts in the future towards enlisting that hearty support and co-operation from all classes of the public, without which substantial aid cannot be given to the sick and suffering in the community.

## RULES

OF THE

# PLEASANT CREEK HOSPITAL

For 1875.

1. The Hospital will afford, gratuitously, surgical and medical aid to any poor person requiring them, irrespective of creed, country, or colour; but any person who shall be admitted, under any circumstances, and shall be found able to pay, shall be required to do so. Paying patients may be received, under certain condi-

tions, according to the Bye-laws.

2. The Hospital shall be managed by the Patrons, President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, an Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Surgeons, and a Committee of Management not exceeding twenty-four; twelve of whom shall be residents of outlying districts. The above-named officers, with the exception of the Treasurer and Trustees, shall be elected annually, at the Annual General Meeting, in the month of January in each year, by duly qualified Subscribers.

3. Should a vacancy occur in any of the above-named offices, it shall be filled at the then or next ensuing General Meeting of Subscribers; but in all cases, except those of Treasurer or Trustees, the Board is empowered to temporarily fill the

vacancy.

4. The duly-qualified electors shall, at each Annual General Meeting appoint two Auditors, not members of the Board, to examine the accounts; but in case either of such Auditors neglect or refuse to perform his duty, the Board is empowered to temporarily appoint another Auditor or Auditors. And also it shall be competent for the President, or, in his absence, a Vice-President, at the request of not less than ten duly-qualified Subscribers, to convene by advertisement a meeting of Subscribers at any time, for the purpose of electing Auditors, if any emergency arise to warrant the same.

5. The Board of Management shall include all officers named in the second rule; it shall direct the collection and distribution of funds; appoint and dismiss all paid officers and servants; frame regulations for the management of the Hospital; present a report to the Annual General Meeting; and conduct the affairs of the Hospital generally; and may, from among themselves, from time to time, appoint committees for any purpose which, in their opinion, would be better regulated and managed by means of such committees; and it may fix the quorum of such com-

mittees, and may continue, alter, or discontinue such committees.

6. The Board shall meet for general business once, at least, in each month, and for special business whenever requisite; such meetings to be convened by the Secretary at any time or place that may be ordered by the Board, the President, a Vice-President, or upon the requisition of not less than three members of the Board. At any meeting, seven members shall form a quorum, and, in the absence of the President, or Vice-Presidents, one of the members present shall be elected to act as

chairman.

7. That every Contributor of £25 in one sum shall be a Life-Governor, with the privilege of voting at all meetings of Subscribers, and of nominating five in-door and five out-door patients in each year. And every Contributor of £1 and upwards, to £5, shall be entitled to nominate one in-door and one out-door patient for each pound subscribed during the year of such contribution; provided that the funds and accommodation of the Hospital will admit of the reception and treatment of such patients. The Board shall also have power to add to the list of Life-Governors such persons as by their eminent services may have added within one year the sum

of £25 to the funds of the Hospital; and members of the Board are not to be limited in the number of patients they may recommend. Life-Governors alone shall be

entitled to vote by proxy.

8. That no person shall hereafter be qualified to vote at any meeting of Subscribers, unless he shall have been a Subscriber of at least £1 sterling to this Hospital for the space of six months previous to such meeting; provided always that where a Subscriber shall have paid his subscription for the year immediately preceding the year in which any public meeting shall take place, the payment of his abscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting shall entitle such Subscriber to vote.

9. That accidents, and such cases as may be deemed of decided emergency by the Medical Officer in attendance, be received at any time; and that in ordinary cases natients shall be admitted daily (Sunday excepted), at such hours as may be from time to time appointed by the Board, on the recommendation of a Subscriber of at least £1 sterling for the then current year, countersigned by a member of the Board, who shall certify that such patient is not capable for providing for medical attendance; but patients shall be admitted at any time on a special order, signed by the

House Committee and one of the Honorary Surgeons.

10. That no female for the purpose of confinement, child under five years of age, insane person, or one affected with an infectious disease (with the exception of cases of accident or emergency as per Rule 9), shall be admitted except by the

express permission of the House Committee or Board of Management.

11. The House Committee shall at least once a week visit the Hospital, for the purpose of inspecting the arrangements thereof, and of enquiring of the patients if they are properly attended to, and shall report in writing to the next meeting of the Board any alterations or suggestions they may think necessary; such committee to be selected by agreement amongst the members during the sitting of the Board.

12. If any member of the Board shall neglect his duty for the space of two

months (the Trustees excepted), he shall suffer disqualification (unless upon wellfounded excuse), and another shall be appointed in his stead if the Board think fit. And any contractor to the Hospital, being a member of the Board, shall absent himself from its sittings while any subject relating to his contract is under consideration.

13. The Board shall have power, from time to time, to make, rescind, alter, or amend any bye-laws for the due management of the affairs of the Hospital; but no such bye-laws shall be made, rescinded, altered, or amended, unless upon seven days' notice thereof being given to each member, and only upon being carried by a majority of two-thirds of a meeting consisting of not less than fifteen members of the Board.

14. That no alteration or rescinding of Rules shall be made except by dulyqualified contributors, in public meeting assembled, of which the Secretary shall have given at least seven days' notice by public advertisement, stating the business for which such meeting shall be convened.

#### HONORARY TREASURER.

15. The Honorary Treasurer shall receive all money on behalf of the Hospital, and invest the same in such bank or banks as the Board shall direct to the credit of the Hospital. He shall pay all accounts after the same have been signed by the Chairman of the meeting as having been approved by the Board, by drafts on the bank or banks, which shall be countersigned by the President, or one of the Vice-Presidents, and by the Secretary. He shall also keep an account of all money received and paid by him, and report the same at least once a month to a meeting of the Board.

#### HONOBARY SURGEONS.

16. The Honorary Medical Officers shall consist of legally-qualified Medical Practitioners, who shall be elected for one year. They shall have access to the Hospital at all times; they shall assist the Resident Surgeon in the performance of all capital surgical operations—but no such operations shall be performed without previous consultations of the medical staff-and they shall regularly consult in all cases of importance or protracted continuance in the Hospital.

#### RESIDENT SURGEON.

17. The Resident Surgeon shall be a duly-qualified medical practitioner, who shall reside on the premises, and shall not be absent therefrom for any lengthened period without the permission of the Board. He shall not engage in private practice under any circumstances, except in cases of consultation at the request of other surgeons; provided such consultations will not interfere with his duties as Resident Surgeon.

#### SECRETARY.

18. The Secretary shall convene the Annual General Meeting in the month of January, in each year, at such time and place as may be fixed by the Board, by advertisement in the local papers, at least seven days previous to the meeting.

19. He shall convene Special Meetings of duly-qualified Subscribers in the same manner, when directed by the Board, or on the written application of ten duly-qualified Subscribers of at least £1 each; the object of such meeting to be stated in the advertisement, and shall give special notice to each member of the Board of such meetings.

## BYE-LAWS

OF THE

## PLEASANT CREEK HOSPITAL.



#### RESIDENT SURGEON.

1. The Resident Surgeon shall receive all applicants with properly-signed certificates of admission (except they are disqualified by Rule 10), examine the nature of their cases and decide on their fitness to be either in-door or out-door patients, and discharge all patients when he considers they are fit to be discharged—his actions in such admitting or discharging to be subject to the approval of the House Committee.

2. He shall have charge of patients in the Hospital, and of their treatment; but in all cases of difficulty or danger, or long continuance in the Hospital, he is requested to consult the Honorary Surgeons.

3. He shall superintend and control all servants of the Hospital, and in case of neglect of duty, or insubordination, may suspend any of them, and report thereon to the House Committee.

4. He shall keep such accounts respecting the patients as the Board of Management may direct, in books to be kept for that purpose, and report to the Board such

cases as he may think necessary.

6. He shall have charge of all surgical instruments, drugs, and chemicals; carefully examine them, both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects, in either respect, to the Board; make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose; and keep an account of the receipts and expenditure, or loss and breakage of all such instruments, drugs, and chemicals. And he must, in the absence of a Dispenser, perform such duties as would devolve upon that officer.

6. He shall enter regularly, in books kept for the purpose, the names of patients as they are admitted or discharged, together with the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment. He shall receive all money and other property belonging to patients, and account for the same to the Board when required.

7. He shall accompany the Honorary Surgeons through the wards, and report to them the state of the patients; visit each patient every morning and evening, and enquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to; and if any cause of complaint exist, immediately remove the same, or report it to the Board at its next meeting.

8. He shall perform all surgical operations and post-mortem examinations, keep the key of the dead-house, and give due notice to the Honorary Medical Officers when a consultation is to be held, or an operation to be performed; but in all cases of emergency shall act to the best of his judgment.

#### SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

9. The Secretary and Collector shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the Hospital, compile all reports, conduct the correspondence, attend all meetings, and bring all business before the same; earry out their resolutions, and perform all derical duties that may be ordered by the Board.

10. He shall collect subscriptions and all money due to the Hospital; in all cases give receipts for the same, and pay to the Treasurer, at least once in every month, all money he may have received, and render an account of the same to the

Board.

#### NURSES.

11. The Nurses shall live in the Hospital, and shall not leave it for any length of time without the permission of the Resident Surgeon; they shall obey the orders of the said officer, be regular in their attendance, behave with tenderness to all natients, and with civility and respect to strangers.

12. They shall pay great attention to cleanliness, personally, in their respective wards, and in all things entrusted to their charge, particularly to the bedding of the patients, and have it changed as often as may be necessary, taking care that

it is thoroughly dried and aired.

13. They shall administer to the patients the medicines and diet at the time and in the manner directed by the Resident Surgeon, and not permit them to take any which have not been prescribed; they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the said officer, and watch attentively the state and symptoms of the patients, and report the same to the Resident Surgeon.

14. They shall not permit patients to receive from visitors medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor allow any portion of the medicines or diet, nor anything to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without

an order from the Resident Surgeon.

15. They shall be careful to collect and carry all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c., to the dispensary, at which they shall attend at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.

16. They shall not admit any stranger without permission from the Resident

Surgeon, except during the hours appointed for that purpose.

17. They shall be obedient to the regulations of the Hospital, and report immediately to the Resident Surgeon any impropriety of conduct or infringement of the rules by any patient, visitor, or other person; and if such complaint is not properly attended to, report the same to the Board at its next meeting.

#### PATIENTS.

18. The patients shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner, strictly observe all the directions of the Resident Surgeon and Nurses, take their medicines and diet at the time directed, and not take any other than those prescribed; neither shall they conceal or put away any portion thereof.

19. They shall not leave their ward and go into another ward, leave the house, or remain out for a longer time than may be granted, or introduce visitors, or receive medicines, victuals, liquors, tobacco, nor anything, without the express

leave of the Resident Surgeon.

20. They shall not gamble, spit on the floor, deface, or injure any part of the ward, furniture, bedding, or clothing; nor sing, blaspheme, nor use rude or indecent language; neither shall they smoke without permission from the Resident

Surgeon.

21. Any Patient having cause of complaint shall make the same known to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to remedy the same; if not remedied, the same complaint may be made to the Official Visitors, or to the Board at its next meeting; but if complaints are not made before a patient leaves the Hospital, or within two days after leaving, they cannot be entertained.

22. Patients deemed able by the Resident Surgeon to assist in the work of the Hospital shall, at his request, so employ themselves.

23. Patients shall not sit up after 8 p.m. in winter, or 9 o'clock in summers and all patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so shall rise at 7 a.m. in the summer and 8 o'clock in the winter.

24. Out-door Patients shall attend at the Hospital between 9 and 12 o'clock a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, and must observe the rules relating to in-door Patients so far as may be practicable. In-door Patients, in ordinare cases, shall be admitted daily (Sunday excepted) between the hours of 10 and 12 a.m.

25. Paying Patients may be admitted, provided the wards are not all occupied

by ordinary Patients.

26. The Admission Tickets of Paying Patients to be signed by two Members of Committee, and the charge for admission shall be fixed by the House Committee

subject to the approval of the Board of Management.

27. Paying Patients to receive the same treatment as ordinary Patients, and they must abide by the same rules, it being left to the Resident Surgeon to place them in any ward, either separate or with ordinary patients.

#### PATIENTS AND VISITORS.

28. Patients and Visitors are requested not to give any fee, reward, or gratuits

to any officer, nurse, or other person connected with the Hospital.

29. Visitors are admitted daily between the hours of 2 and 5 o'clock in the afternoon, except persons from a distance, who may be admitted at any time by permission of the Resident Surgeon; but no Visitor will be allowed to remain more than one hour, except ministers of religion, who may visit the patients at any time: but all Visitors must retire when requested by the Nurses.

30. Visitors shall not give to or leave with any Patient medicine, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the permission of the Resident Surgeon; nor interfere with the Nurses, nor disturb the Patients by loud

talking or unnecessary noise.

31. Any Visitor or Patient violating any of the Rules of the Hospital, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire or be dismissed, and will not be readmitted at any time without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or the Board.

#### GENERAL.

32. Any Officer, Nurse, Servant, or other person in any way connected with the Hospital, who shall receive, directly or indirectly, any fee, reward, or gratuity, shall be immediately disqualified and dismissed, and not be permitted in future to hold any office or appointment belonging to this Hospital.

#### MEMORANDA.

The friends of the Institution are informed there is a Library for the use of the Patients, and that donations of books, periodicals, &c., will be thankfully received; as also OLD CLEAN LINEN, Calico, and Blankets.

Each Patient should, if possible, be provided with a change of clean clothing. particularly with cotton and flannel shirts and stockings.
