## THIRTY-SECOND ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## COMMITTEE OF MANAGEMENT

OF THE

## STAWELL HOSPITAL AND BENEVOLENT ASYLUM

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FOR THE HALF-YEAR TO DECEMBER 31, 1890.

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To the Governors, Subscribers and Contributors of the Stawell  
Hospital and Benevolent Asylum.

Since last we submitted to you a report of our doings, your Committee have been considering as carefully as they could the ever-pressing question of ways and means, and we venture to say with some results of a hopeful sort. Our endeavour has been to bring the expenditure of your Institution down to the limit of our income, and also to raise the income up to the level of as economical an outlay as would secure efficiency.

In both directions we have accomplished something tangible, and are happy to be able to say that we feel financially in a better position than you found us occupying six months ago; at the same time we are convinced as much thoughtful effort will devolve upon our successors as will give them field for abundant work. We would much sooner see them able to receive both into the Hospital and Benevolent Departments every pressing and deserving case, than that they should be compelled for want of means and room to shut the door against one sick or infirm person, and we feel as fully assured, as we ever were, that if the claims of our charity were fully and faithfully set before the people of our town and district, that end would be largely secured.

Subscribers and friends will bear in mind that our report now is for the six months ending 31st December last. For that time the revenue from all sources has been L1121 0s 3d as against L1090 19s 9d for the corresponding period of 1889, and the expenditure L1103 7s 11d as against L1208 1s 7d for 1889.

Strenuous efforts have been made to induce the Government to increase the maintenance grant, and bring us up to the level of other institutions of similar size and receiving even a smaller number of patients, but we regret to say we have not yet succeeded.

The number of in-patients for the last six months has been about 30 less than for the corresponding period of 1889, and out of out-patients about 20 less, while the asylum inmates have been about the same.

Owing to the generosity of several members of your committee and a number of private friends, notably Mr. Matthews, who requested that two out of his ten monthly subscriptions of a guinea each should be applied to this object, the Christmas extras for the patients were scarcely any charge upon the maintenance fund.

The appeal for private aid made some time ago has been responded to by increased subscriptions, as evidenced in the excess of last half-year's receipts over those of the same period of 1889, while the collections of last Hospital Sunday were the largest yet received.

Special and very grateful mention need be made of the Carnival held on our National Holiday in aid of the funds of your institution and the Free Library, which, owing to energetic and laborious efforts on the part of many of our fellow citizens, supported by the liberal givings both of town and country, will result in a handsome addition to our maintenance fund. To all who labored and contributed to make this carnival such a splendid success, your best thanks are due. Your committee have also received several contributions of firewood, and they hope for a yet larger number.

Special thanks are due to the Girls' Friendly Society of Holy Trinity Church for their late sale of gifts in aid of the library of your institution, which will doubtless result in a handsome addition to the books provided for the patients, donations of books and periodicals being at all times most acceptable for the hospital. Your honorary surgeons still deserve your sincere thanks for their skill and attention, as do those benefactors who supply newspapers and periodicals gratuitously to your institution.

We would also mention that Mr. W. J. Belling has offered his services as honorary dentist to the hospital, and we cordially recommend the acceptance of his offer.

Our term of office expires with this meeting, and you require to elect auditors and a new committee, the members of the retiring committee being eligible for re-election. For our successors we would speak a continuance, yea, an increase of the lively interest lately manifested in the maintenance of this institution in a state of thorough efficiency, that both the sick and infirm may receive kindly shelter and skilful treatment under its friendly roof.

## SUPPLEMENTARY REPORT.

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**FOR THE HALF-YEAR TO 30th JUNE, 1891.**

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15TH AUGUST, 1891.

To the Governors, Subscribers and Contributors of the Stawell  
Hospital and Benevolent Asylum.

Your Committee have pleasure in stating that the position of the Hospital has considerably improved during the past financial year. The figures being Cr. balance at June 30th, 1890, L371 10s 2d; Cr. balance June 30th, 1891, L859 8s 7d. It will be remembered that the critical nature of our position in June, 1890, lay in this—that we had been obliged to draw upon our Reserve Fund (L1856 8s 9d, legacies left to the Institution), and that the whole of this sum had disappeared—L1193 12s in liquidating the debit balance of 1888-1889, and the rest in the Ordinary Expenditure of the year, except the balance, L371 10s 2d above mentioned. It was perfectly evident that, if this disparity between the Ordinary Receipts and Expenditure continued, the Institution would soon have become seriously embarrassed. That this has, for the time at least been avoided, is mainly due to two causes—the generous liberality of the public, and the improved health of the district.

The Receipts (L2,581 14s 4d), were L358 5s 11d in excess of last year. It was thought by some that the special efforts in connection with the Carnival celebration in January would reduce the Private contributions to the Hospital. It is pleasing to

state that not only was this surmise incorrect, but that on the contrary, the private contributions for the past financial year exceeded by over L100, the receipts from the same source in the preceding period. The collections on the Hospital Sundays at the open-air services and in the Churches were slightly above the average, the same is also to be said of the donation from the Corporate Bodies.

Your Committee would desire to place on record their hearty appreciation of the work done by the ladies of the town and district in connection with the Carnival Bazaar at Easter. The Bazaar was the result of several months labour, and, coming as it did so soon after the Carnival, was very successful. The moiety (L115) to which this Institution was entitled, was received by us after the accounts had closed. It will, therefore, appear in next year's Balance-sheet.

One item occurs in the statement for the first time, we refer to the Receipts resulting from making a small charge to Out-patients for Medicine and advice. As this regulation only came into force on January 1st, the receipts are for six months only.

Coming to the Expenditure side, we gladly draw your attention to the fact that, whereas the total cost of the Institution in 1889-1890 was L2514 15s, in 1890-1891 it was only L2093 15s 11d, a saving of L420 19s 1d. This, of course is chiefly owing to the smaller number of both In-door and Out-door Patients.

The daily average of the former has fallen from 57·24 to 42·2, while with the latter, the reduction is still more remarked. The figures being 1889-1890—Out-patients, 330; 1890-1891—Out-patients, 220.

Your Committee have given earnest and prolonged consideration to the question of the more economical and satisfactory working of the Institution. Several important changes—notably the separation of the duties of Secretary and Collector and the appointment of a Matron—have been made. As, however, the alterations only came fully into effect after the close of the financial year, the result cannot yet be properly estimated

The Inspector of Public Charities paid a visit to the Hospital in May, and in his report recommended a number of alterations and additions in reference to the fittings and general arrangements of the Institution. Some of the suggestions have been adopted, and others will be attended to as soon as means permit. The forms of admission for both In and Out Patients have been amended in accordance with the Inspector's request, and it is very desirable that, in future, the new forms only should be used. With some of the recommendations contained in the report, your Committee could not agree. The proposal in particular to use this Institute as a Benevolent Asylum only, and that our sick should be sent to Ararat or Horsham was thought very impracticable, when it is remembered that Stawell is a mining town where urgent cases are more likely to occur, and has, moreover, a population greatly in excess of the towns named.

The Royal Commission on Charities have also paid a visit to the Institution and taken evidence. No report has been issued, as the Commission has not yet concluded its labours in other parts of the colony.

The Rev. Samuel Kelso, who has been a member of the Committee for over 22 years, has resigned his seat. Your hearty thanks are due to him for the great services which he has rendered to the Institution. The vacancy has been filled by the appointment of Mr. Thos. Kinsella, himself an old and valued member of past Committees.

In conclusion, your Committee beg to say that, while the financial position of the Hospital has improved, and there is now no special cause for anxiety, yet it is of the greatest importance that contributions to the Institution should in no way decline. Painting and other repairs are needed, and must receive attention. We trust, therefore, that Subscribers will continue to exercise their utmost liberality so that the efficiency of the Institution may be maintained, and the buildings kept in a creditable state of repairs.

## **RULES**

OF THE

# Stawell Hospital & Benevolent Asylum.

1. The Hospital and Benevolent Asylum will afford gratuitously surgical and medical aid, and maintenance to any poor person requiring them, irrespective of creed, country, or color; but any person who shall be admitted, under any circumstances, and shall be found able to pay, shall be required to do so. Paying patients may be received, under certain conditions, according to the Bye-laws.

2. The Institution shall be managed by the Patrons, President, two Vice-Presidents, five Trustees, an Honorary Treasurer, the Honorary Surgeons, and a Committee of Management not exceeding twenty-four, twelve of whom shall be residents of outlying districts. The above-named officers, with the exception of Treasurer, and Trustees, shall be elected annually, at the Annual General Meeting, in the month of January in each year, by duly qualified Subscribers. The Committee to be elected shall be nominated at or before such meeting, but nominations cannot be received (except for members of the outlying districts) without the consent of the person nominated.

3. Should a vacancy occur in any of the above-named offices, it shall be filled at the then or next ensuing General Meeting of Subscribers; but in all cases, except those of Treasurer or Trustees, the Board is empowered to temporarily fill the vacancy.

4. The duly qualified electors shall at each Annual General Meeting, appoint two Auditors not members of the Board, to examine the accounts; but in case either such Auditors neglect or refuse to perform his duty, the Board is empowered to temporarily appoint another Auditor or Auditors. And also it shall be competent for the President, or in his absence, a Vice-President, at the request of not less than ten duly qualified Subscribers, to convene by advertisement a meeting of Subscribers, at any time for the purpose of electing Auditors if any emergency arise to warrant the same.

5. The Board of Management shall include all officers named in the second rule; it shall direct the collection and distribution of funds; appoint and dismiss all paid officers and servants; frame regulations for the management of the Institution; present a report to the Annual General Meeting; and conduct the affairs of the Institution generally; and may from among themselves, from time to time, appoint committees for any purpose which, in their opinion, would be better regulated and managed by means of such committees; and it may fix the quorum of such committees, and may continue, alter, or discontinue such committees.

6. The Board shall meet for general business, once at least in each month, and for special business whenever requisite; such meetings to be convened by the Secretary at any time or place that may be ordered by the Board, the President, a Vice-President, or upon the requisition of not less than three members of the Board. At any meeting seven members shall form a quorum, and in the absence of the President or Vice-Presidents, one of the members present shall be elected to act as chairman.

7. That every contributor of £25, in one sum, shall be a Life Governor also, any person nominated by any Society that has added a sum of not less than £25, or the executors to a Will, by which a sum of not less than £100 has been added to the funds of the Institution, shall be Life Governors; and the Board of Management shall have power to add to the List of Life Governors such persons as it may deem expedient for eminent services rendered.

8. Every Life Governor shall have the privilege of voting at all meetings of Subscribers, and of recommending five in-door and five out-door patients in each year. And every contributor of £1 and upwards shall be entitled to vote at such meetings, and of recommending one in-door and one out-door patient for each pound subscribed during the year. Members of the Board are not to be limited in the number of patients they may recommend, but no person shall be qualified to vote at a meeting of Subscribers, unless he shall have been a Subscriber of at least £1 for the space of six months previous to such meeting, provided always that where a Subscriber shall have paid his subscription for the year immediately preceeding the year in which any such meeting shall take place, the payment of his subscription for the then current year at any time before such meeting, shall entitle such Subscriber to vote. Life Governors and Life Subscribers only entitled to vote by proxy.

9. That accidents, and cases deemed of decided emergency by the Medical Officer in attendance, be received at any time; in ordinary cases patients shall be admitted daily (Sunday excepted), at such hours as may be appointed by the Board on the recommendation of a Subscriber of at least £1 sterling for the then current year, and one member of Committee, and special cases shall be admitted at any time on an order signed by the House Committee and one of the Honorary Surgeons; but patients to the Benevolent Ward shall only be admitted, after due enquiry, on an order of the Board of Management.

10. That no female for the purpose of confinement, child under 5 year of age, insane person, or one infected with an infectious disease (with the exception of cases of accident or emergency, as per Rule 9), shall be admitted except by the express permission of the House Committee or Board of Management.

11. The House Committee shall at least once a week visit the Institution for the purpose of inspecting the arrangements thereof, and of enquiring of the patients if they are properly attended to, and shall report in writing to the next meeting of the Board any alterations or suggestions they may think necessary; such Committee to be selected by agreement amongst the members during the sitting of the Board.

12. If any member of the Board shall neglect his duty for the space of two months (the Trustees excepted), he shall suffer disqualification (unless upon a well founded excuse), and another shall be appointed in his stead if the Board think fit. And any contractor to the Institution, being a member of the Board, shall absent himself from its sittings while any subject relating to his contract is under consideration.

13. The Board shall have power from time to time to make, rescind, alter, or amend any bye-laws for the due management of the affairs of the

Institution ; but no such bye-laws shall be made, rescinded, altered, or amended, unless upon seven days' notice thereof being given to each member, and only upon being carried by a majority of two-thirds of a meeting consisting of not less than fifteen members of the Board.

14. That no alteration or rescinding of Rules shall be made except by duly qualified contributors, in public meeting assembled, of which the Secretary shall have given at least seven days' notice by public advertisement stating the business for which such meeting shall be convened.

#### HONORARY TREASURER.

15. The Honorary Treasurer shall receive all money on behalf of the Institution, and invest the same in such Bank or Banks as the Board shall direct to the credit of the Institution. He shall pay all accounts after the same have been signed by the Chairman of the meeting as having been approved of by the Board, by drafts on the Bank or Banks, which shall be countersigned by the President or one of the Vice-Presidents, and by the Secretary. He shall also keep an account of all money received and paid by him, and report the same at least once a month to a meeting of the Board.

#### HONORARY SURGEONS.

16. The Honorary Medical Officers shall consist of legally qualified Medical Practitioners, who shall be elected for one year. They shall have access to the Institution at all times, they shall assist the Resident Surgeon in the performance of all capital surgical operations—but no such operations shall be performed without previous consultations of the medical staff—and they shall regularly consult in all cases of importance or protracted continuance in the Institution.

#### RESIDENT SURGEON.

17. The Resident Surgeon shall be a duly qualified Medical Practitioner, who shall reside on the premises, and shall not be absent therefrom for any lengthened period without the permission of the Board. He shall be allowed private practice within the limit of the Borough of Stawell, provided such private practice does not interfere with his duties as Resident Surgeon.

#### SECRETARY.

18. The Secretary shall convene the Annual General Meetings in the month of January in each year, at such time and place as may be fixed by the Board, by advertisement in the local papers at least seven days previous to the meeting.

19. He shall convene Special Meetings of duly qualified Subscribers in the same manner, when directed by the Board, or on the written application of ten duly qualified Subscribers of at least £1 each, the subject of such meeting to be stated in the advertisement ; and shall give special notice to each member of the Board of such meetings.

**BYE-LAWS**

OF THE

**Stawell Hospital & Benevolent Asylum.**

## RESIDENT SURGEON.

1. The Resident Surgeon shall receive all applicants with properly signed certificates of admission (except they are disqualified by Rule 10), examine the nature of their cases, and decide on their fitness to be either in-door or out-door patients, and discharge all patients when he considers they are fit to be discharged (his actions in such admitting and discharging to be subject to approval of the House Committee); but patients in the Benevolent Wards to be discharged on special order of the Board, except in cases of misconduct, when the Resident Surgeon may discharge them immediately.

2. He shall have charge of patients in the Institution, and of their treatment; but in all cases of difficulty or danger, or long continuance in the institution, he is requested to consult the Honorary Surgeons.

3. He shall superintend and control all servants of the Institution, and in case of neglect of duty or insubordination, may suspend any of them, and report thereon to the House Committee.

4. He shall keep such account respecting the patients as the Board of Management may direct, in books to be kept for that purpose, and report to the Board such cases as he may think necessary.

5. He shall have charge of all surgical instruments, drugs and chemicals, carefully examine them both as to quality and quantity, and report any defects in either respect to the Board; make an inventory of the same in a book to be kept for that purpose; and keep an account of the receipts and expenditure, or loss and breakage of such instruments, drugs and chemicals; and he must, in the absence of a dispenser, perform such duties as would devolve upon that officer.

6. He shall enter regularly, in books kept for that purpose, the name of patients as they are admitted or discharged, together with the nature and history of their diseases while under treatment. He shall receive all money and other property belonging to patients, and account for the same to the Board when required.

7. He shall accompany the Honorary Surgeons through the wards, and report to them the state of the patients; visit each patient every morning and evening, and enquire if the treatment prescribed has been attended to; and if any cause of complaint exist, immediately remove the same, or report it to the Board at its next meeting.

8. He shall perform all surgical operations and *post-mortem* examinations; keep the key of the dead-house; and give due notice to the Honorary Medical Officers when a consultation is to be held, or an operation to be performed; but in all cases of emergency he shall act to the best of his judgement.

## SECRETARY AND COLLECTOR.

9. The Secretary and Collector shall keep the minutes, accounts, and records of the Institution; compile all reports; conduct all correspondence; attend all meetings; and bring all business before the same; carry out their resolutions, and perform all clerical duties that may be ordered by the Board.

10. He shall collect subscriptions and all moneys due to the Institution; in all cases give a receipt for the same, and pay to the Treasurer, at least once in every month, all money he may have received, and render an account of the same to the Board.

## NURSES.

11. The Nurses shall live at the Institution, and shall not leave it for any length of time without the permission of the Resident Surgeon; they shall obey the orders of the said officer; be regular in their attendance; behave with tenderness to all patients; and with civility and respect to strangers.

12. They shall pay great attention to cleanliness, personally, in their respective wards, and in all things entrusted to their charge, particularly to the bedding of the patients, and have it changed as often as may be necessary, taking care that it is thoroughly dried and aired.

13. They shall administer to the patients the medicines and diet at the time and in the manner directed by the Resident Surgeon, and not permit them to take any which have not been prescribed; they shall be careful to explain to the patients the instructions of the said officer, and watch attentively the state of symptoms of the patients, and report the same to the Resident Surgeon.

14. They shall not permit patients to receive from visitors medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor allow any portions of the medicines or diet, nor anything to be removed from the wards by the patients or visitors, without an order from the Resident Surgeon.

15. They shall be careful to collect and carry all empty phials, gallipots, bandages, &c., to the dispensary, at which they shall attend at the time appointed to receive medicines and instructions.

16. They shall not admit any stranger without permission from the Resident Surgeon, except during the hours appointed for that purpose.

17. They shall be obedient to the regulations of the Institution, and report immediately to the Resident Surgeon any impropriety of conduct or infringement of the rules by any patient, visitor or other person; and if such complaint is not properly attended to, report the same to the Board at its next meeting.

## PATIENTS.

18. The patients shall conduct themselves in an orderly manner, strictly observe all the directions of the Resident Surgeon and Nurses, take their medicines and diet at the time directed, and not take any other than those prescribed; neither shall they conceal or put away any portion thereof.

## GENERAL.

32. Any officer, nurse, servant, or other person in any way connected with the Institution, who shall receive directly or indirectly, any fee, reward, or gratuity, shall be immediately disqualified and dismissed, and not be permitted in future to hold any office or appointment belonging to this Institution.

## MEMORANDUM:

The friends of the Institution are informed there is a library for the use of the patients, and that donations of books, periodicals, &c., will be thankfully received; as also OLD CLEAN LINEN *calico* and *blankets*.

Each patient should, if possible, be provided with a change of clean clothing, particularly with cotton and flannel shirts and stockings.

19. They shall not leave their ward and go into another ward, leave the house; or remain out for a longer time than may be granted, or introduce visitors, or receive medicines, victuals, liquor, tobacco, nor anything without the express leave of the Resident Surgeon.

20. They shall not gamble, spit on the floor, deface or injure any part of the ward, furniture, bedding or clothing; nor sing, blaspheme, nor use rude or indecent language; neither shall they smoke without permission from the Resident Surgeon.

21. Any patient having any cause of complaint shall make the same known to the Resident Surgeon, whose duty it shall be to remedy the same; if not remedied, the complaint may be made to the Official visitors, or to the Board at its next meeting; but if complaints are not made before a patient leaves the Institution or within two days after leaving they cannot be entertained.

22. Patients deemed able by the Resident Surgeon to assist in the work of the Institution shall, at his request, so employ themselves.

23. Patients shall not sit up after eight p.m. in the winter, or nine o'clock in summer; and all patients considered by the Resident Surgeon able to do so shall rise at seven a.m. in the summer, and eight o'clock in the winter.

24. Out-door patients shall attend at the Institution between 9 and 12 o'clock a.m. on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays, and must observe the rules relating to In-door Patients, so far as may be practical. In-door Patients, in ordinary cases, shall be admitted daily (Sunday excepted) between the hours of 10 and 12 a.m.

25. Paying patients may be admitted, provided the wards are not all occupied by ordinary patients.

26. The admission tickets of paying patients to be signed by two Members of Committee, and the charge of admission shall be fixed by the House Committee, subject to the approval of the Board of Management.

27. Paying patients to receive the same treatment as ordinary patients as they must abide by the same rules, it being left to the Resident Surgeon to place them in any ward, either separate or with ordinary patients.

#### PATIENTS AND VISITORS.

28. Patients and Visitors are requested not to give any fee, reward, or gratuity to any officer, nurse or other person connected with the Institution.

29. Visitors are admitted daily between the hours of two and five o'clock in the afternoon, except persons from a distance who may be admitted at any time by the permission of the Resident Surgeon; but no visitor will be allowed to remain more than one hour, except ministers of religion, who may visit the patients at any time; but all visitors must retire when requested by the nurse.

30. Visitors shall not give to or leave with any patients, medicines, victuals, tobacco, or liquor of any kind, nor any other thing, without the permission of the Resident Surgeon; nor interfere with the nurses, nor disturb the patients by loud talking or unnecessary noise.

31. Any visitor or patient violating any of the Rules of the Institution, or behaving with impropriety, will be compelled to retire or be dismissed, and will not be re-admitted at any time without special leave from the Resident Surgeon or the Board.
