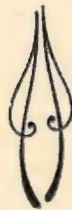

74th ANNUAL REPORT

— OF THE —

STAWELL AND DISTRICT HOSPITAL

To Life Governors and Subscribers

Ladies and Gentlemen—

In presenting the 74th Annual Report and Balance Sheet, the Board of Management again wish to express gratification at the splendid support accorded by the people of Stawell and District enabling us to close our financial year with a credit balance of £402/10/5.

As we commenced the year with a credit balance of £296/8/5, this means our profit on the year was £106/2/-. The Government Grant was increased by £60.

MAINTENANCE

The receipts amounted to £2363/4/6 and expenditure £2257/5/6.

BUILDING

Receipts for the Building fund totalled £948, including the Government Grant of £500 and expenditure £1080/18/10. The total amount we now hold on behalf of the Building Fund is £9127/5/7.

BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

There have been no changes on the Board during the year, and all members have shown a lively interest in the welfare of the Institution, as shown by their unflinching attendance at all meetings. The number of which for the members of sub-committees has increased by 50 per cent.

LADIES' AUXILIARY

The members of the Auxiliary have been untiring in their work for the patients and staff. All mending and making has been attended to by a band of earnest workers under the presidency of Mrs. James Young. The amount of £86/17/9 has been paid over by the Auxiliary. A Jam Appeal was also held during the year. The jams donated during the year totalled 199 lbs.

BENEFACTORS

Under the will of the late Mrs. Isabella Stapleton we received a bequest of £20. It is very gratifying to have the hospital remembered in this manner.

PATIENTS

420 patients were treated during the year, of which 80 were intermediate cases, and 340 public hospital. Last year we treated a total of 391 patients of which 63 were intermediate.

SPECIAL ASSISTANCE

The Hospital Ball was again a great success. A return of £71/6/- was handed in, and special thanks are due to the President (Mrs. R. H. McCracken) and the secretaries (Mesdames James Gibson and Alex Neil, and Mr. Walter Fleetwood-Smith) and their hard working committee. £15 from the Swimming Carnival committee was received and Mr. H. L. Taylor made a Life Governor in recognition of this and last year's contribution. £10 was received on 15th May as a birthday gift from Mr. F. J. Cato. £3/19/2 was received from the Empire Day committee and £3/19/1 from the Aerial Pageant committee, £2/6/- from the Fleetwood-Smith Tennis Cup entries; £2/2/- from Girl Guides per Miss Allen for operating theatre tray; £2 from Ladies' Guild of Glenorchy for equipment for Glenorchy S.S. bed; £2/5/2 collection at the football match per Messrs. Haase and Cowman.

RE BUILDING OF HOSPITAL

AND CHANGE OF SITE

During the past three years the solution of the building problem has taxed the minds of members of committee to the fullest extent. The problem of a new site more centrally situated was approved, but the infectious wards on the present site seemed to be a sheet anchor against change. It is fitting to record the manner in which a solution was effected.

At the request of the Board of Management, the President (Mr. L. C. Phillips) visited Melbourne in September, 1932, and interviewed the secretary of the Charities Board, who informed him that a £4000 grant was available for building purposes—renovations and additions. The President asked would it be possible for another Government service to take over the old institution and provide compensation so that a new building on a new site could eventuate.

In response to this enquiry the Charities Board pointed out that provided the present institution was suitable for their requirements, the Chief Secretary's Department might be able to make use of it. After inspection of the buildings, the Inspector-general of Mental Hospitals (Dr. Jones) fully approved of the scheme, and the Government made available £2000 for a new infectious block and £500 for the preparation of a suitable site.

After numerous meetings and conferences a general meeting of subscribers and Life Governors unanimously decided to hand over the present institution to the Chief Secretary's department for use as a benevolent mental home, the Government in return to provide a new site and an infectious ward to replace the one presented by the widow and family of the late Dr. W. H. Syme.

The Board of Management decided with Mrs. Syme's approval, still to call the new infectious block—"The W. H. Syme Ward." Also in view of the liberal donations in the past, it was agreed to call the new operating theatre the "Edward Wilson (Argus) Theatre."

In consultation with Messrs. Stephenson and Meldrum (the hospital architects) Mr. C. L. McVilly, secretary of the Charities Board, and Dr. Thomson, chairman of the Country Hospitals' Association, the Board of Management unanimously agreed to the old St. George battery site as the most suitable location. Tenders were immediately called and the site was levelled at a cost of £275 by E. A. Watts.

Immediately plans for a thirty bed hospital on a community basis were prepared by Messrs. Stephenson and Meldrum.

The successful tenderers, Messrs. Thompson and Chalmers (£15,963 15/6) for the structure, and Messrs. A. E. Atherton and Sons (£1452/14/3) for the mechanical services, commenced work on the site during the latter part of May, and at the time of this report the building is proceeding rapidly.

At this stage of the report, the Board of Management wish to include for record purposes an appreciation of the action of the President in making

to the Charities Board the suggestion which was responsible for the solution of site and building difficulties alike.

To enable the building to be financed at the above costs, the government approved of a loan of £3000 from Commonwealth-State Joint Loan Fund.

It has been arranged that the laying of the Foundation Stone of the New Hospital will take place on 3rd September, 1933, and the committee has unanimously conferred the honor of laying the stone on the President (Mr. L. C. Phillips) in appreciation of his efforts in connection with the new building, and in recognition of his

long and valued services to the institution. Mr. G. H. Robson, monumental mason has kindly presented to the committee the foundation stone, suitably engraved.

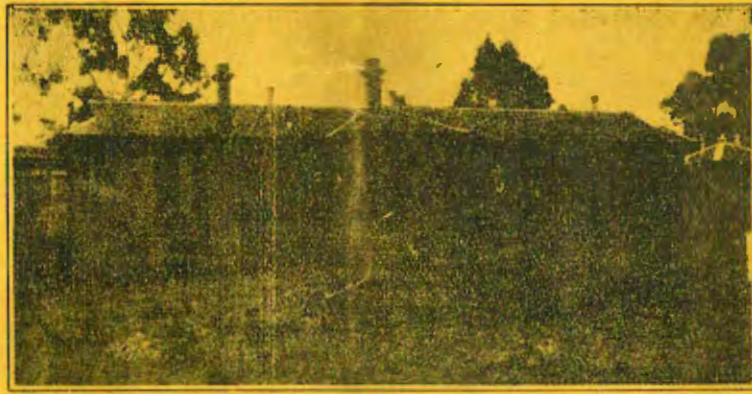
