Pebble, Rock, Boulder Approach

Pebble

Simple, quick-fix issues that can be addressed immediately with minimal resources.



Rock

More complex challenges requiring coordination, planning, and moderate resources to resolve.



Boulder

Major, long-term issues needing significant resources, strategic planning, and policy changes.

Identifying OA-Related Issues

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Financial Sustainability

Open access journals often require authors to pay article processing charges (APCs) to cover publication costs.



Predatory Publishing

The open access model has been exploited by predatory publishers who charge authors APCs without providing proper peer review or editorial services.



Quality and Credibility Concerns

Some publications may not adhere to rigorous peer review standards..



Equitable Access

While open access aims to make research freely available, there are still disparities in how different institutions and regions can access and contribute to open access publishing

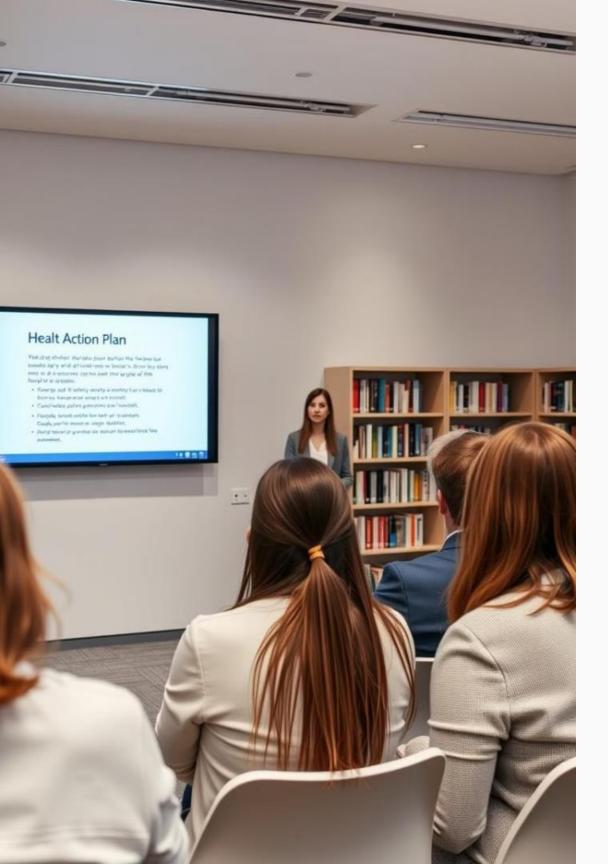
