



For the Year ending 30th June, 1932.

TO THE GOVERNOR AND SUBSCRIBERS:

Financial.

Your Board has pleasure in submitting its Seventy-fifth Annual Report and Balance-sheet for the year ending 30th June, 1932.

The Income for the year was £13,173/8/3, and the Expenditure £18,140/10/-, leaving an overdraft of £408/1/4, against that of £440/19/7 on 30th June, 1931.

Home.

The daily average of indoor relief for the year was 258.565, and the number of inmates in the Institution on 30th June, 1932, was 252, a decrease of 28 on last year's figures.

Average Annual Cost.

The average annual cost per head for maintenance was £36/13/5, against £36/10/10 on the previous year—an increase of 2/7.

Outdoor Relief.

The amount expended on Outdoor Relief was £208/15/10, compared with £1,182/1/4 last year, being a decrease of £873 5/6. The average number of recipients weekly for the year ending 30th June, 1932, was 117.076 against 316.519 the previous year. The total number of visits for the year ending 30th June, 1932, was adults 1,687, children 2,396; total 4,083. In the previous year the totals were 14,506, a decrease this year of 10,423. Last year this Home provided relief for many of the unemployed, who were quite destitute. When the Government Sustenance Allowance became operative our numbers returned to our average yearly demand. The Committee of this Home exceeded the proper function of a Benevolent Institution by taking the unusual course of relieving unemployed. The urgent need, particularly in cases of families with children, justified us in rendering this help.

During the year a large number of men passing through Ballarat have been supplied with bread, sugar and tea. These, a total of 2,005, are in addition to the outdoor relief cases assisted locally.

Life Governors.

The following Life Governors have been recommended for appointment during the year—Cr. Geo. Bolster, Messrs. H. McKenzie, E. Todd, Stan. Jones, W. King and P. Dodgson.

Office-Bearers.

At the Annual Meeting it will be necessary to elect a President, two Vice-Presidents, Hon. Treasurer, and five members of the Board, who retire by effluxion of time, and offer themselves for re-election, and to elect the Hon. Solicitor, Hon. Medical Officers, Hon. Dentist, Hon. Oculist, and two Auditors.

Proposed New Women's Hospital Ward.

Notwithstanding our persistent effort to begin the erection of a new Hospital Ward for the women patients, we have been unable up to the present to secure the approval in writing of the Honorable The State Treasurer. It is hoped that the required authority will be forthcoming shortly.

Commercial Travellers' Social Club.

This fine organisation has again remembered the need of the aged and the infirm by forwarding a donation of £105. Ballarat is fortunate in possessing a body of self-sacrificing citizens such as the members of the Commercial Travellers' Social Club whose enthusiasm and well-directed efforts mean so much to all the Ballarat Charities.

New Bye-laws.

It will be necessary during the ensuing year for your Committee to consider the preparing of a completely new set of Bye-laws. The present Bye-laws were prepared before the Charities Act, incorporating the Charities Board, came into operation. There are several important matters which require attention. In this connection special reference should be made to the valuable services rendered by our Hon. Solicitor, Mr. H. G. Morrow, of the firm of Messrs. Cathbert, Morrow, Must and Shaw.

Charities Gala Day.

For the last few years a Charities' Gala Day has been held in the month of March in Ballarat. It is hoped that the claims of this Institution will be considered in future when allotting the proceeds of such a collection.

Ladies' Auxiliary Committee.

The valuable work done by the Ladies' Auxiliary Committee under the presidency of Mrs. W. J. Hoare, and the energetic Secretary, Mrs. J. Cole, can not be too highly extolled. It is safe to say that the aged folk who are dependant on this Home are considered in every way that makes for their happiness and comfort. This is due mainly to the almost daily voluntary attention they receive at the hands of these ladies. The service is personal and sympathetic and makes the lives of our old folk happy in their last declining days.

Late Mr. Wm. Palmer.

It is with deep regret that I have to record the death of our Collector, Mr. Wm. Palmer. This gentleman had been an Officer of the Staff in an important and onerous capacity for over twenty years. We learnt to rely on him, and his genial presence was familiar in Ballarat and District. Our sympathy goes out to his widow and family.

Retirement of Mr. James Drummond.

Owing to pressure of business Mr. James Drummond has found it necessary to resign from our Committee of Management. As a past president and on several important sub-committees the value of Mr. Drummond's experience has been felt. While regretting his decision to retire, I hope Mr. Drummond may enjoy many years of health and happiness.

New Collector.

Mr. Stan. Jones was appointed to the position of Collector in succession to the late Mr. Wm. Palmer. Mr. Jones has already shown himself to be a tactful and energetic officer.

Soup for Children.

Finding that a number of children attending State Schools are not receiving sufficient nourishment, I instituted a distribution of hot soup at the schools every day during the morning recess. We began this distribution at the end of June, and purpose continuing throughout the winter. The soup is prepared in our kitchen and conveyed to the schools by cars. In this way we ensure the delivery of the soup in a hot and palatable condition. The co-operation of the head teachers and their staffs enables us to supply the children who are most in need, and it is a refreshing sight to see how eagerly the soup is expected and consumed by the little children. I desire to thank the car owners who have helped by attending at the Home daily and conveying the soup to schools.

Entertainments.

The "Lederman" Hall has proved itself a valuable adjunct to this Home for the purpose of providing entertainments for our Old Folk. Various societies, clubs, and concert parties have visited the Home and given the old people enjoyable concerts. This is greatly appreciated, and I desire to record our thanks to one and all for the kindly help in this way.

Christmas Tree and Other Treats.

In addition to the Annual Christmas Tree and distribution of gifts by the Ladies' Auxiliary, which provides a beautiful Christmas treat, the old folk have had many extra teas and suppers given by kindly disposed ladies and gentlemen. Our thanks are due to all of these.

Religious Services.

The Ministers of the various religious denominations have held suitable services throughout the year to the edification of the inmates.

Honorary Staff.

We are fortunate in our Honorary Staff, and on behalf of this Committee I desire to extend hearty thanks to all who have thus given voluntary service.

Paid Staff.

Mr. Gale and Matron Gent are most attentive to the requirements of all in the Home, and, with their staff, keep the old folk happy and contented. The Medical Officer, Dr. A. Guymer, is assiduous in his visits and kind to the bedridden cases. Miss Jopling, Assistant Secretary, is a valuable officer and most obliging and attentive.

President's Thanks.

It would be ungracious of me to omit reference to the cordial co-operation of the Committee of Management. Owing to the difficult times we have experienced the duty of distinguishing between the deserving and the lazy hanger-on among our outdoor relief applicants has been more than usually hard and responsible. This is, among other duties, the work of the Committee of Management. It has been done with sympathy and discretion and has greatly helped me in my work.

Mrs. Hoare joins me in expressing our thanks for the privilege you have given us in permitting us to help the aged and the infirm, and also the deserving indigent, during the last twelve months.

The work lies very closely to our hearts. It is a great privilege to be associated with such a Home as this. We are very proud of the great humanitarian work of charity carried out by the Ballarat Benevolent Home.


In conclusion, I must thank the members of the Committee, one and all, for their invariable courtesy and helpfulness.




