# FROM THE ACTING C.E.O.'S DESK

#### ACCREDITATION

I am pleased to be able to announce that the Hospital has received confirmation from the Australian Council on Hospital Standards, that as a result of the recent Accreditation Survey Ballarat Base Hospital has received full accreditation status of 3 years.

This result could not have been achieved without the complete co-operation and dedication of staff at all levels. There were a lot of people who worked for a long time in the preparation phase which set the scene to achieve this magnificent result. With all the other activities going on within the Hospital during the past 12 months, especially the capital works changes that were being undertaken at this time this is a most gratifying result. May I congratulate and thank all staff for their hard work in contributing towards our success. There will be press announcements and media coverage after the Board Meeting on 18th July, 1988 advising the Community of the Hospital's success.

#### FOUNDATION

Mr. David Karmouche, interim Chairman for the Hospital Foundation, has held more meetings with

interested people in becoming Members of his Committee and it is hoped that his Committee will be announced in the next addition of the Communicator. We extend our very best wishes to David and his Committee in their future endeavours in this new venture for the Hospital.

#### REDEVELOPMENT

Planning and preparation for the Redevelopment Program is progressing satisfactorily. User Group Meetings are now drawing together vital information for detailed planning to take place within the next few months. The Architects will be advising space allocations for the redevelopment within the next few weeks to enable some firm decisions to be made.

#### 24 HOUR STRIKE

The Hospital was involved in the 24 hour strike on Wednesday, 6th July as a result of industrial action taken by the Hospital Employees Federation No. 1 Branch. I am pleased to advise the Hospital was able to function with patient services with little disruption. The food services section was the main area affected, and management staff from all divisions of the Hospital were able to provide the necessary food services to the patients. I would now, through the Communicator, again like to say thank you to all those who assisted the Hospital in any way during the strike period. I believe it was a real "Team Effort" and I thank all those involved for a job well done.

During the last few weeks a number of long serving staff of the Hospital have retired. 
#### SECURITY

### BOARD OF MANAGEMENT

I have read with interest the previous editions of the "Communicator" and would like to congratulate all who have put much time and effort into providing information on many facets of this hospital's activities, and I thought I would make a few comments about events that have been occurring here recently.

With the announcement of the large grant approved by the Government for our redevelopment program, a new air has blown through the hospital, refreshing everyone. There has been no time lost in commencing the preliminary tasks - after detailed interviews and earnest consideration, the project manager, architects, quantity surveyors and structural and service engineers have been appointed and they are already busily at work. As well, committees have been formed within the hospital mainly composed of staff from whome input is essential. It has been decided that regular bulletins be made available to all staff as to the progress of the revelopment program. This is particularly important while there is no visual evidence of progress.

Besides this, there have been a number of areas that have been upgraded; the most obvious are those that make a visual impact, and include the new outpatients' entrance and waiting room, the main entrance foyer, entry to the Q block, carpets in Yuille House corridors and most recent of all, the ambulation training track, which is looking very pleasant.

I believe that a number of these measures come from suggestions put forward by staff members as a result of the seminar held at Hall's Gap and I congratulate those who participated.

Also I would like to thank all staff for their lovalty and hard work, despite the difficulties that have been faced in the recent past. I hope we will all be able to enjoy the benefits of our new buildings when they are completed, and continue to provide the same wonderful care that has been the hallmark of this hospital, albeit in better equipped and more spacious surroundings.

We look forward to this.

### GREEN THUMB

#### THE MISUSE OF LIME

Hello, been doing any fertilizing lately? Don't make the all too common mistake of heading for a bag of lime as though it were some sort of garden cure-all. It is NOT a fertilizer unless your soil happens to be grossly acid. a most unnatural circumstance in this district. The local soils are mostly somewhere near neutral in their acid/alkaline balance. Descendants of the humble Mustard weed however do like lime. Over the last five hundred or so years these came to be recognize as separate vegetables with characteristics of their own. such as the Cauliflower with its huge embryonic flower. The Kohl Rabi with its excellent fat stem, the cabbage with its heart of blanched leaves, the Kale with its dark, strongly flavoured leaves so rich in iron, and some others such as Broecole, Broccoli, modern Mustard. Brussels Sprouts and some lesser known varieties, all of which like lime and sodium molybdate applied annually. Carnations like it too, but in their case it is to help prevent "collar rot".

### SECURITY

RFFRCTIVE UTILISATION OF

SECURITY STAFF WITHIN THE

ACCIDENT AND EMERGENCY

#### DEPARTMENT

Hospitals fortunate enough to have Security Officers on staff will normally utilise these personnel when violent or disruptive behaviour is encountered



in the Accident & Emergency (A & B) Department. When Security staff are summoned, the question of appropriate response arises because, in general, they are not summoned until the situation has deteriorated to the extent where medical and nursing staff are unable to cope. Violence has either occurred or is imminent.

How this situation arises is secondary; tempers become frayed, inebriated or drug-affected patients or visitors become stressed. Added to the volatility of emotional pressure, fear and uncertainty (so common to trauma situations) can and frequently do contribute to the situation becoming explosive.

Summoning of uniformed Security personnel should be considered. Certainly the hospital Security Officer is going to appear periodically in the A & E Department and this visible present can have positive and beneficial results. Importantly, a potential troublemaker will be made aware of the presence of

Security personnel and may be deterred from causing trouble and, if the Security Officer is sensitive to the prevailing atmosphere, s/he may be of considerable assistance to medical and nursing staff.

If A & B staff are aware of waiting patients or visitors who have expressed irritation or concern at having had to wait or are uncertain as to what is happening, the Security Officer may be the ideal intermediary between a puzzled, frightened and possibly hostile patient or visitor.

If the medical and nursing staff have sufficient confidence in the Security Officer as a mature and sensitive person, the officer may be made privy to the reason for the one hour wait in the Department, or why little Billy has to have a gastric lavage. The Security Officer can then bit and talk - in strictly non-medical terms - to the people whom A & E staff believe may be potentially disruptive.

Disruptive behaviour is unpredictable, yet there are warning signs and, human nature being what it is, staff working within A & E may identify the signs of impending violence and cross their fingers in the often forlorn hope that nothing will happen. When the violent situation does arise they predictably and sensibly, call for the assistance of the Security Officer.

How much more direct it would have been to admit that the situation was likely to occur, and act in a manner which would have prevented the crisis occurring. Hospital Security Officers consider public relations as part of their job. By joining the A & E team as a "back up" member, they can take a lot of the "heat" out of working in the Department on a hectic Friday or Saturday night.




### AMBULATION TRACK




### RON TONKS

SUPERANNUATION

- 1. Application for membership of the Old Hospitals Superannuation Board Scheme have closed. Details of the new scheme should be available shortly. Basically the new scheme involves at retirement only a lump sum payment, not a lump sum and pension as the old scheme.

  The 3% productivity increase relating to Superannuation areas that the employer pays the 3% not the staff member.
- 2. Staff members who joined the fund prior to approximately 1979 will have received an Election to Vary Contributions Form from the Hospitals Superannuation Board. Staff who joined the pension fund when it began in 1978 were eligible to pick up past service for pension entitlements, e.g. If you joined the hospital in 1968, the 10 years between 1968 & 1978 were counted towards years of service towards the pension scheme. For being able to pick up this past service staff had to pay extra contributions, in most cases an extra .1% to .6%. Therefore instead of 6% contributions, as staff employed since 1978 do, staff picking up past service paying say 6.2% or 6.5%.

With the new scheme this can be reduced to 6% by signing the form you have received. Your pension entitlements will not be affected if you reduce your contributions to 6%. Unless you wish to transfer to the new scheme DO NOT sign for either 3% or Nil. The forms have to be witnessed by a J.P., Commissioner for Affidavits etc. It is suggested that you bring the forms to the Personnel Officer who will witness them and forward them on. If you are unsure of any aspects or wish to elect to contribute either 3% or Nil, see the Personnel Officer to have the position explained.

EXTRACT FROM PERSONNEL UPDATE.

#### DIRECT BANKING

One of the conditions of the 2nd Tier Wage increase was that hospitals introduce Direct Banking for payment of salaries and wages. It is hoped to proceed with this as soon as is practical, possibly August/September. Pays can be deposited in either of the major banks - A.N.Z., National Australia, Westpao, Commonwealth or State Bank or the Ballarat Base Hospital Credit Union. At this stage it is not possible to have direct credits to Building Societies other credit co-ops or banks. Some of the features of the change to Direct Banking are:-

- 1. Pays can only be credited to one bank account.
- 2. Co-op deductions can still be made as at present.
- 3. Funds will be oredited to Bank Accounts by Wednesday morning.
- 4. Accounts do not have to be at the Ballarat Head Office Branches, they can be at whatever branch is most convenient to you.
- 5. There will be a change in procedures as to holiday pays.
- 6. There will be a change in procedures as to holiday pays. Staff will now have their holiday pay in the bank on the pay day before they go on holidays. The pay for the week(s) worked just prior to going on leave, will be processed with the next normal pay.
- 7. Cheques will only be available for limited occurrences. E.G. When a timesheet is not submitted in time for the pay run.
- 8. Staff banking with the Co-op will, as at present, be limited to cash withdrawals of \$200 per time, however cheques of any amount may be withdrawn and cashed at the A.N.Z. Bank opposite the hospital. Further information sessions will be held to explain the new procedures to staff and Departmental Heads. Please complete a form at the pay office as soon as possible.


#### ENTITLEMENTS AVAILABLE TO SOCIAL CLUB MEMBERS
